Getting to Madison

Madison is located in south central Wisconsin, and the city is accessible via several major highways. Madison is a :

- 1 ½ hour drive from Milwaukee (via I-94)
- 2 ½ hour drive from Chicago (via I-90)
- 4 ½ hour drive from Minneapolis/St. Paul (via I-94)


From the North via Interstate 90/94 (Minneapolis, LaCrosse, Wausau, Stevens Point, Portage): take I-90 to the Hwy. 151 exit (southwest) going toward the State Capitol. You will then be on E. Washington Ave.

From the Northeast via Hwy. 151 (Green Bay, Fox River Valley): follow Hwy. 151 toward the State Capitol. You will then be on E. Washington Ave.

From the East via Interstate 94 (Milwaukee): as you approach the city, follow Hwy. 30 into Madison, Take the "State Capitol" exit off of Hwy. 30, and you will then be on E. Washington Ave.

From the Southeast via Interstate 90 (Chicago, Beloit, Janesville): take the Hwy. 12&18 (Beltline) exit to Madison. Exit at John Nolen Drive and follow that drive underneath the Monona Terrace Center. Turn left at the second light onto E. Washington Ave.

From the Southwest via Hwys. 18 & 151 (Dubuque, Platteville, Dodgeville): take the John Nolan Dr. exit north and follow that drive underneath the Monona Terrace Convention Center. Turn left at the second light onto E. Washington Ave.



FROM E. WASHINGTON AVE. head toward the State Capitol. Two blocks before the Capitol turn right onto Webster St., after two blocks follow the traffic and turn left at the light onto Dayton St. (90° angle, don't take Hamilton). The Concourse is on the left after two blocks. Free parking is available under the hotel to all registered hotel guests. Additional parking is available in the public parking ramp a ½ block down Dayton at Dayton and Carroll St.

By Bus. Van Galder (1-800-747-0994) runs regular service from Chicago's O'Hare Airport and from the Chicago Amtrak Station to the Memorial Union in Madison, which is about 10 blocks from the Concourse. Tickets can be purchased from the driver.

Badger Coaches (1-608-255-6771) has service from the Milwaukee Airport to Madison, with a stop at the Memorial Union.

At the Memorial Union you may call the Concourse (257-6000) to catch a ride on the hotel's shuttle, take a cab from Union Cab (242-2000) or Badger Cab (256-5566), or walk about a mile up State Street.

By Train. If you make Madison your final destination, Amtrak (1-800-USA-RAIL) includes thruway motor coach service from Chicago in the ticket price (see by bus).

By Air. Dane County Regional Airport, located minutes from downtown Madison, offers more than 75 daily flights. Airlines that serve the Madison area include: American Eagle (1-800-433-7300), Comair (1-800-354-9822), Midwest Express/Skyway (1-800-452-2022), Northwest Airlines (1-800-225-2525), TWA (1-800-221-2000), and United (1-800-241-6522).

The Concourse runs a shuttle to the airport from 7 am to 11 pm for arriving guests, with a courtesy phone in the baggage claim area. Allow 15-20 minutes for it to arrive and meet it directly outside the baggage claim doors.

Hotel

The Concourse Hotel is located at 1 W. Dayton St., Madison, WI 53703; phone 1-800-356-8293 or 608-257-6000. Room rates are \$85 per night for up to four people. WisCon 22 filled up the hotel last year, and we expect that rooms will sell out again for WisCon 23, so please book your rooms early and mention "WisCon 1999" when you call.

The Concourse is a handicapped-accessible hotel; call for specific information about accessibility. Smoke-free rooms are available upon request. The hotel is located in the heart of Madison, so there are plenty of restaurants, shops, and interesting people and places within easy walking distance. The Saturday Farmers' Market on the Capitol Square is a popular choice for breakfast browsing.

Wisconsin DPI Clock Hours

What If: A film about Judith Merril

U.S. Premiere-Friday, May 28, 1999, WisCon 23

WisCon is proud to present the U. S. Premiere of What If A Film About Judith Merril on Friday, May 28, 1999 at WisCon 23, following opening ceremonies. A former resident of Toronto's notorious Rochdale College, Judith Merril is the candid, clever trailblazer of What If. She is credited with being one of the first writers to create believable women in SF stories.

What If is the passionate story of Science Fiction author, anthologist and activist Judith Merril. La Grande dame of Science Fiction's literary world for over 50 years, Merril pushed the boundaries of science fiction, a genre once dominated by men. Her first story—"That Only A Mother", brought her overnight success in 1948 with a harrowing tale about a seriously deformed child. Author Robert J. Sawyer had this to say about Merril, "she demonstrated with that one, simple, stark story that SF could be a vehicle not just for detached extrapolation about the future, but for powerfully moving explorations of the human condition." In What If Merril describes how science fiction was one of the only forms of popular culture where dissenting opinion could appear during the Cold War.

What If explores science fiction's Golden Age of the forties and fifties, as seen through the eyes of one of its shining stars. Actor Jackie Burroughs evokes the intensity of Merril's vision through dramatic readings of her intimate memoirs, Better to Have Loved.

What If was directed by award-winning filmmaker Helene Klodawsky and produced by Genie recipient Richard Elson.
