Registration

Schedule of Events

Madison's feminist bookstore, A Room of One's Own, will host its annual **reception** honoring authors attending WisCon (6 P.M. Thursday, 307 W. Johnson St.). Both Guests-of-Honor, China Miéville and Carol Emshwiller, will give readings at the reception.

Afterward, you are welcome to join many WisCon concom members and attendees gathering for supper across the street at the Angelic Brew Pub. Or gather your own group together and sample one of the many fine nearby restaurants.

Friday. Pre-registered writers will divide into small groups and critique one another's manuscripts during the Friday morning writers' workshop. Sorry, the workshop is already filled this year.

Everyone will be able to register and pick up their name badges at 2:00 P.M. Friday. From 2 to 5:30 P.M., the Gathering will open its doors. We invite you to enjoy games, demonstrations, exhibits, massages, make-overs, tarot readings, and much more in the two ballrooms that will be devoted to the afternoon's entertainment. You can stroll around the room stopping at booths along the way, or you can pull up a chair in the lounge area in the middle of the Gathering and enjoy a cup of tea (or coffee or juice and maybe a cookie) with your friends as you catch up with them and watch for the arrival of new attendees. We hope you will have fun at this event. We'll be eager to hear your comments about this first time attempt at a sociable sort of Friday afternoon programming. All profits raised at the Gathering will be donated to Broad Universe and the Carl Brandon Society.

Opening ceremonies will be held at 7:30 P.M. Friday night. The ceremonies will be fun and lively in the best fannish tradition, welcoming the guests of honor and officially kicking off the weekend with laughter and bad acting.

Parties will open their doors on the sixth floor at this time and one of them will be a **Carl Brandon dancing party**. It should be a fun evening! Don't stay up too late though! Programming starts up again at 8:30 A.M. Saturday morning.

Saturday. Baked goodies will be available for \$1 a plate at the **Tiptree bakesale** Saturday afternoon, with all proceeds donated to the **Tiptree** Award. Ellen Klages will entertain and raise money for the **Tiptree** Award at Saturday night's **Tiptree auction** (7:30 P.M.). Parties on the sixth floor will also be open at this time.

Sunday. Sunday night will feature speeches by Guests of Honor Carol Emshwiller and China Miéville. Following the speeches, John Kessel will accept his 2002 Tiptree Award and be serenaded by the Tips' rendition of this year's Tiptree song.

A dessert salon will precede both the GoH speeches and the Tiptree ceremony. If you haven't already ordered a dessert ticket, we urge you to do so now. We expect to sell out before the convention. Send WisCon a check for \$9 per ticket by May 15, 2003, so we can process your order before we need to give a final count to the hotel. The GoH speeches and Tiptree ceremony are open to everyone; you do not need to purchase dessert salon tickets in order to attend. (Tickets will guarantee a better seat however.)

Monday. The last program on Monday afternoon will be followed by the traditional dead dog party. Details will be announced at the convention.

A schedule of programming will be available on the WisCon web site sometime in mid-May. Its posting will be announced in *eCube*. Excel files, readable with a Palm Pilot, will available at the convention.

John Kessel will be honored at Tiptree Award ceremony at WisCon!

The James Tiptree, Jr. Award will present \$1000 in prize money to John Kessel for his novella, "Stories for Men." Kessel won the 2002 award with M. John Harrison, whose novel *Light* has already been honored at the first 2002 Tiptree ceremony at Seacon in Hinckley, England, on April 18. Since John Kessel was unable to attend that ceremony, he will receive the award in an unprecedented *second* Tiptree ceremony. Kessel will also receive a fabric cake created by artist Zhenne Wood. 

Child Care

We are pleased to have been able to hire professional child care providers for daytime child care for infants and toddlers (ages 0-6 yrs.). This service is fully subsidized by WisCon. No fee will be charged for child care services for any child in the care of a registered WisCon member. However, parents or guardians MUST have registered for child care by April 30, 2003. Child care will be open 10:00 A.M. to 5:30 P.M. Friday through Monday. Parents will be responsible for removing their children from the child care room for meals or for providing hottles for infants. Snacks will be provided.

Hotel Information

The Concourse Hotel has already filled up. although it is possible that a few rooms may be made available through cancelations. Unreserved rooms from a few small non-WisCon room blocks will be released in early May. Reservations made before the official close of WisCon's block on May 5, 2003 will be at the WisCon rate. Room prices will increase after that date.

The Concourse (1 W. Dayton, Madison, WI 53703; 1-800-356-8293 or 608-257-6000; www.concoursehotel.com) is the main convention hotel. The room rate is \$89 per night for up to four people; \$114 for Governors Club rooms. Check-in time is 3:00 P.M.; check-out time is 12 noon. Be sure to mention "WisCon 27" when you reserve your room.

The Concourse does have a swimming pool (open till 1:00 A.M.!) so bring your suit. There is also a whirlpool, steam room and exercise equipment.

The hotel has one bar (called "The Bar") and one restaurant. The Dayton Street Cafe and Bakery is open from 6:30 A.M. to 2 P.M. We've

Parking

Free underground parking is available to all registered guests. You can unload in the hotel parking garage and take the elevators up to the lobby. Clearance in this ramp is low! Just 5'6". Additional parking for vans and other vehicles is available in the public parking ramp a half block down Dayton St. at Carroll St.

Restaurants

Getting to Madison

By Air

This is easy, since Madison has only one airport. There has been no special discount arranged for air travel to WisCon. Ask your travel agent whether Midwest Airlines has flights from your airport—it's a smaller company that provides excellent, comfortable service.

Flights into Milwaukee (90 miles away) or Chicago (150 miles away) are often much cheaper, but you'll need to take a bus into Madison. (See: "By Bus" below.)

The Madison airport is small, with eight gates plus a commuter gate for the puddle-jumpers. There are two baggage claim carousels right next to each other. Outside the baggage claim area and slightly to the right is the taxi rank. See the section "Getting Around Madison: Cabs" for, you guessed it, information about cabs.

If you arrive by plane and are staying at the Concourse, use the express courtesy phone in the airport baggage claim area to call for the hotel's courtesy shuttle. Allow 15 to 20 minutes for it to arrive; meet the shuttle directly outside the baggage claim area. Runs from 7 A.M. to 11 P.M.

Madison Metro Bus #16 stops at the Madison airport terminal on weekdays only, 6:17 A.M.– 8:38 P.M. Getting to the Concourse from the airport by bus involves making a transfer. Contact the Madison Metro for more information. (See "Getting around Madison: Metro Buses."



By Bus

Van Galder (800-747-0994; www.vangalderbus. com) runs regular service from Chicago's O'Hare and Midway Airports and from the Chicago Amtrak station to the Memorial Union in Madison. The bus also stops along the way in Rockford, IL, Beloit, WI, and Janesville, WI. One-way tickets (\$22) can be purchased from the bus driver.

Badger Coaches (608-255-6771; www. badgerbus.com) make trips from the Milwaukee airport (Mitchell Field) and Madison, dropping off at both the Memorial Union and Badger Bus Depot. Tickets cost \$14 one way, \$25 round trip.

Once at the Union you may call the Concourse to catch a ride on the hotel's courtesy shuttle (257-6000). This service is usually only for guests arriving at the airport but they will pick you up if they're not busy. If you feel like walking one mile up State Street to the hotel, follow the map on the next page. By Car

From Chicago: north on Hwy 90 to Hwy 12/18 West (also called the "Beltline"). Take the John Nolan Drive exit north—you'll get a nice view of the skyline and eventually pass underneath the Monona Terrace Convention Center. From Minneapolis: south on Hwy 90/94 to Hwy 151 South, which becomes East Washington Ave....

From lowa: East on Hwy 151 to Hwy 12/18 East (also called the "Beltline"). Take the John Nolan Drive exit north—you'll get a nice view of the skyline and eventually pass underneath the new Monona Terrace Convention Center. At the first traffic light after the Center, continue straight through the light onto Blair (look at the downtown map). After two blocks, turn left onto East Washington Ave.... 
...head down East Washington Ave, toward the Capitol building. (See downtown map on next page.) Admire the skyline. Two blocks before the Capitol turn right onto Webster St. (almost everyone will: two lanes go right and one goes straight); after two blocks turn left at traffic light onto Dayton St. (90° angle to Dayton; don't take Hamilton which is a 45° angle to Capitol Square); the Concourse is on your left after two blocks between Wisconsin Ave. and Carroll St.

By Train

The nearest Amtrak station is in Columbus, 25 miles north of Madison on Hwy 151. There is no direct transportation from there, so be sure to make plans to have someone pick you up in Columbus.

Road construction (Wisconsin's second season, the first being winter) will be happening on the near west side of Madison. Be careful, bring a map, and leave a little earlier if you need to travel by way of University Avenue (MS) or Johnson Street in this area of town!
