New to WisCon? Old to WisCon? Hungary? Then you won't want to miss the First WisCon Dinner!


This event is open to both first-time WisCon attendees and those who have been coming to WisCon for years. In other words, everyone is welcome to attend this event!



More interesting, however, is the way in which Rowling has adapted Science--natural philosophy--to accommodate her characters and their activities. In doing so, Rowling has assumed power over a subject in which men have traditionally had authority.

In Le Guin's Left Hand of Darkness, perpetual winter and a lack of nationalism help to create this world. In the eyes of an observer, this could be seen as a perfect place, save for the unusual sexual cycle of its still very human inhabitants. Through this novel, Le Guin posits that without reliance upon gender roles and their influence upon hierarchies, a better place, even if not a utopia, could be created.



Wiscon attendees thronged to the Gathering on Friday afternoon for one of the first events of the weekend. The event was organized by members of Broad Universe, an organization dedicated to the promotion of women writers of science fiction and fantasy.

Proceeds from the Gathering will go to support Broad Universe and the Carl Brandon Society, a group that promotes science fiction writers of color.

Broad Universe Treasurer Grace O'Malley greeted attendees at the registration table, where they could both purchase tickets for the various activities and purchase or renew memberships in Broad Universe. Memberships in Broad Universe will be available for purchase throughout the weekend.

Activities included a massage table, tarot readings, divination card readings, numerology, balloon hats, custom namebadge necklaces, custom buttons, postcards and memory books, and Mary Anne Mohanraj's special blend of Sri Lankan curry powder.

Strange Horizons editor Jed Hartman manned the massage table for part of the Gathering. Katherine Mankiller, a writer from Atlanta, said that she attempted to propose marriage to Hartman but was informed that more tickets would be required. Alas, Katherine did not have enough tickets to convince Jed to give himself up in matrimony.

At the tarot table, Jennifer Pelland, a writer from Boston, was informed that she will be able to make a living as a writer, but it would be beneficial to find a mentor. Interested applicants should contact Jen via the message board.

For the price of two tickets, Chicago attorney Deb Stone purchased a custom button that reads, "Since when did unquestioning obedience to corporate interests become patriotic?" Deb's button will be on display throughout the weekend.

Author and perennial Wiscon favorite Pat Murphy graced the crowd with her balloon hat stylings. According to Murphy, who herself sported the "simplest of turbans," metallics are the trend in balloon hats this season.

website, for everyone who has supported her and her partner, Deb Mensinger, through a difficult time - and giving us all some GOOD news:

"Surely you are aware that samesex couples will be allowed to get legally married in Massachusetts starting May 17. Deb and I will be applying for a marriage license on that day, and will be married on Saturday May 22.

"(Although it seems a bit absurd to call the woman I've lived with and loved for 18 years my fiancée, there's a lot of absurdity going around here lately--for example, the fact that our marriage could be undone by a popular vote to change the state constitution in two years time, and we would get instead the booby prize of a civil union.)

"However, given my beloved's many years of chronic illness and my own recent brush with death, we both are feeling very fortunate to still have each other.

"It will be a while before I can haul heavy boxes, work the ground (I am gardening only in containers), take a long car trip, or walk and hike my usual four miles a day, and as Deb often can't do these things either, we continue to rely on volunteers and hired helpers.

"Deb is the one who breathed for me when I lay unconscious in my driveway...but there are many other ways of keeping a person breathing.

"Thanks again to everyone whose contribution of time and money has helped us through!"

Oh, and what a surprise. Emshwiller made the list. Emshwiller, Shmemshwiller. Like she needs the spin. How about a bone for the little guy? The unknown, untried, unloved, unschooled, unprincipled,

ungrammared, unwashed. Me. Too Mad Magazine maybe?

Okay, you say you're open minded. Maybe you are pure of heart and looking for new talent and unknowns and stuff that might be different. There's bug up your tails for another reason. Perhaps you've been influenced by those rumors of my pandering to the Wisconsin crowd. So not true. Sure that Green Bay Packer joke was about as subtle as a Coke product placement in a Tarzan movie, but admit it, you laughed. And I'll bet you didn't even notice all those cows, huh? Or the weekends at the Dells. the Oshkosh overalls, the cheddar cheese knots used as legal tender. Camouflage. babies, most high honorable judges, I mean. I'm smooth with the subliminals

That leaves me wondering how this ugly slighting occurred. It could, I suppose, be the fault of my publisher. Perhaps he forgot to send out the requisite copies to the committee members. Maybe he did it on purpose even. I could certainly believe it. He's a cheap bastard. And crabby. Manually setting type and hand cranking copies out of a Gutenberg Model A brings out the worst in people. Not to mention he's up to his elbows in lead everyday. That's gotta drive him nuts. But I seem to recall him sending me a mimeographed copy of the letter he packed up with the books. Wish he hadn't misspelled the title like that. (I'd fire him if he wasn't my son.)

But considering all the weak verbs, dangling participles, misplaced clauses, and grammatical faux pas' in the book itself, who'd focus on one little missing initial cap?

So it wouldn't be that. Maybe it's the unpaid for licensed cover artwork. You, the esteemed and learned members of the Awards Panel, don't want to get caught up in that. I understand, but, please, don't worry your pretty little heads over some petty bourgeois red tape sent down to us from The Man. Give a proletariat a break. Throw me-the unloved, unwashed, unknown, untried. untrue-a bone. Or forget the frailties of the messenger for the mo'. Dig the message. That's what's important. Not so much the words, but the meaning behind the words. You say you couldn't find any message in the book? It was seemingly put together on a whim with flimsy imagination and not much thought. And details were unexplained. Characters introduced in the second chapter carried totally different tags by the third. Physical laws were disregarded. Well known science facts flouted. The beloved Periodic Table nothing short of micturated upon. On top of that the story was dull: the aliens looked like humans, the empire was won half an hour into the story and the quest was dropped by the middle.

You don't agree I fear. And now you've gone and missed the whole point of the book because of a few weaknesses in plot, characterization, grammar, theme, and spelling. That's sad because in all honesty I followed the James Tiptree criteria to the letter. The spirit of the award even. The mandate. The reason for its being. That time-honored (time being a matter of a decade of Star Trek-influenced science fiction writing) device: shape-shifting. I love the idea of shape-shifting and agree it's a phenomenon worthy of an award, a ceremony, a whole bunch of hoopla surrounding it. It deserves its own TV slot and logo with attendant focus groups in place. Idealists should be discussing its merits at three in the morning after poetry readings downtown.

I spent long afternoons in the library studying shape-shifting, trying to understand all of its nuances and shadings. I poured over polyhedral transference research, molecular disassembly theories, particle deceleration diagrams, and every version of "The Fly" ever made (Jeff Goldblum's atrophied thing in the medicine cabinet gets funnier every time.), followed by lengthy sessions with psychedelics and an action shot of Odo in front of me the whole time. All that work. What a waste if the Tiptree short list remains unattainable by the likes of me.

And for why? Because the publisher can't spell the name?

I'm asking you, begging you, the celebrated and sought-after for advice and cookie recipes members of the most honorable and technically correct James Tiptree committee, to take another look at MurineWorld and me. Compare and contrast us to your own decree as written on the website:

"The James Tiptree is awarded to a work of science fiction or fantasy that is predominately

of a gender-ben..."

What the...?

I didn't...?

You said ...?

Never mind.



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


Tiptree Auction

The Tiptree Auction, one of WisCon's most popular fundraising events, was held on Saturday night starting at 7:30 p.m. Proceeds from the auction support the annual James Tiptree, Jr. Award.

The auction is hosted each year by science fiction writer Ellen Klages, who this year appeared in a yellow chicken costume after losing a bet with Eleanor Arnason, one of this year's guests of honor. Ellen was permitted to take the chicken head off after five items had been auctioned, and was later convinced to allow audience members to strip her of the remainder of the outfit for a fee.

While most members knew that it was Ellen underneath the feathered façade, audience member Jennifer Pelland was fined \$5.00 by Ellen for expressing her shock that it was not in fact author China Miéville inside the chicken suit. Jen didn't mind paying the \$5.00, though, because the image

- \$475.00 for a signed 1st edition of Eleanor Arnason's "Women of the Iron People" (winner of the first Tiptree Award) with a variant cover designed by Ellen and showing the title and blurb for "Women of the Ironing People"
- \$250.00 for a framed cell from Ms. Space 2003, authenticated by Cabal Studios


In addition, \$504.00 was raised to buy the Jane Austen Book Club for New York Times bestselling author Karen Joy Fowler by passing the chicken head through the audience. Ellen thought Karen could use the Book Club (a paperback Jane Austen novel on a stick) to fend off the paparazzi in the wake of her new-found fame.

Other, more bizarre items included \$50.00 for the rights to sponsor a "full contact rock-paper-scissors smackdown" between Campbell-nominated writers Jay Lake, David Levine and Tim Pratt. Lake himself won the bid on this item and is favored to win.
