

A protofeminist since childhood, L. Timmel Duchamp discovered both feminism and SF in the 1970s. Until her early adult years, she devoted herself mind, body, and soul to writing and performing music; her years of music composition continue to influence her work. The author of Love's Body, Dancing in Time, a collection of short fiction; The Grand Conversation: Essays; The Red Rose Rages (Bleeding), a short novel; and Alanya to Alanya, Renegade, Tsunami, Stretto, and Blood of the Fruit, the five-volume Marq'ssan Cycle, Duchamp is also the editor of Talking Back: Epistolary Fantasies and The WisCon Chronicles, Volume 1, a collage of diverse materials to document WisCon's 30th anniversary. She has been a finalist for the Nebula and Sturgeon Awards and has been included several times on the Tiptree Honor List. Her stories have appeared in numerous venues, including Asimov's SF, Full Spectrum, Leviathan, ParaSpheres, and



Bending the Landscape anthology series. Her critical essays have appeared in *The New York Review of Science Fiction, Extrapolation, Foundation,* and *Lady Churchill's Rosebud Wristlet*. In 2004 she founded Aqueduct Press, which dedicates itself to publishing challenging, feminist science fiction. Her website contains her thoughts about narrative, a complete bibliography of her work, and a selection of her stories and essays.

Maureen F. McHugh is a native of Ohio and has lived in New York City and Shijiazhuang, China. She has recently moved to Austin, in the Republic of Texas, which she finds almost as foreign as China. McHugh has published four novels: China Mountain Zhang (which won the 1993 Lambda and Tiptree Awards), Half the Day is Night, Mission Child, and Nekropolis, and more than two dozen short stories. Small Beer Press published a collection of stories, Mothers and Other Monsters, which was a finalist for the 2006 Story Prize. An earlier story, "Lincoln Train," won the Hugo Award in 1995. Recently, she was a writer on "I Love Bees" and "Last Call"—alternate reality Internet games—a strange, hidden new genre with a surprisingly large audience, and has been a frequent instructor at the Clarion science fiction workshops. McHugh's work



reveals a different vision of our world. [How many people remark that romance literature is pornography for women or call themselves the Nazi Evil Stepmother From Hell, after all?] She holds a master's degree in English literature from New York University and took on various jobs (office temp, creative writing instructor at John Carroll University, and technical writer) before becoming a full-time writer.

Programming

Please keep in mind that the last day to submit programming ideas is **January 31**. On that date, idea collection closes; after a two-week period in which we polish everything up a bit, we'll invite everyone to peruse the final list and tell us which items you're dying to participate in. For those of you reading this without a calendar at your side, program sign-up—otherwise known as "Ooh! Ooh! Pick me, pick me!"—will open on Valentine's Day, **February 14**.

Most "regular" programming will continue to be in panel format, with 3 to 5 panelists per item. It's a format that works for lots of different topics, and we believe in the "if it ain't broke, don't fix it" adage. However...we are particularly eager to explore other formats that are more performative, more (or differently) interactive, or that otherwise "think outside the panel."

The Gathering

Join us on Friday, 1:00—4:00 P.M., as we leave our travels and cares behind and begin our WisCon 32 experience. Writers' Workshop

The Workshop is a unique part of the WisCon weekend that focuses on the needs of novelists and short story writers. We invite established professional novelists, short story writers, editors, and agents to lead small critique groups at the con. To participate, you must first register for the con, then submit a manuscript for critique to workshop32@wiscon. info by April 5. You will not be considered registered for the Workshop until your manuscript is received. The preliminary list of pros will be published shortly before the manuscript submission deadline, and you will be matched to a pro and group after all manuscripts are received. Also note: the workshop starts bright and early on Friday morning, so please make travel plans accordingly! For more details, contact us at workshop32@wiscon.info.

Readings

Authors at WisCon usually read in self-organized themed groups in 75-minute sessions of four to six readers. This year we will also have an open pool for people who do not wish to form their own groups. These authors will be randomly assigned to a group, and then asked to come up with a catchy title/theme. Each reading session will contain at least four readers but may have up to six; therefore each person will have only 10–15 minutes to prepare and read.

Every year, the number of people wishing to read exceeds available space. We will give priority to authors who are promoting a new publication (both for groups and individuals). The process is not first come, first serve, however; you must sign up within the designated time period. Watch the Wiscon.info website for dates.

There are a limited number of party rooms available each night. WisCon assigns one room night per group or individual who want to throw parties open to all attendees of the convention for one night (Friday, Saturday, or Sunday).

Registration limited to 1,000

If you have not already done so, we strongly urge you to register for WisCon now! Registration will be capped at 1,000 attendees. The hotel (and the ConCom) simply cannot handle more. All program participants must register for WisCon in advance. No at-the-door registration will be available after we have reached 1,000-attendee limit.

SignOut

Book signings

Plan your travel well: Come to the grand SignOut party to meet the authors (11:30 A.M.—12:45 P.M.

Monday)! After spending the con discovering new authors and books (and buying them in the Dealers' Room), bring those books for signing. It's also a fine time to sign our friends' pocket program books and share goodbye hugs. Note: For the many fans of our GoHs, L. Timmel DuChamp and Maureen F. McHugh, WisCon will have other, earlier signing opportunities.

Author readings

Sign up!

Step 1a: Form a group of fellow writers to read selections that have a common theme, style, or premise.

Step 1b: Decide if you would like to join "the pool" of individual readers and be assigned to a group.

Step 2: The most important step of all. Go to the "Readings" page under programming and **follow the instructions** on how to sign up. Each member of your group must sign up **individually.**

If you are not able to access the online instructions or have any other questions, please send an email to readings32@wiscon. info. Be advised that we might not be able to respond immediately. We are volunteers and, like you, lead busy lives.

Step 3: Encourage people to come to hear you by letting them know when you're going to read. Make posters, promise chocolate, or find another fabulous way to promote your reading.

Academic programming

Not Just for Academics! Honest!

To those WisCon devotees who don't label themselves as academics, it is important to be aware that the academic track has a notable tradition of welcoming scholarly work from both academically affiliated and independent researchers of feminist science fiction, fantasy and fandom. Over the years, people have presented papers on fantasy, horror, and science fiction literature, media and fandom. They have examined issues of feminism, gender, sexuality, race, and class, among many others.

So if you're not normally in the habit of attending events labeled 'academic', please don't be put off by the label. The work presented on the academic track is the result of intensive research. It also, more often than not, springs from genuine love and appreciation of genre fiction and its communities. Consequently, its presenters are passionate about communicating their work accessibly with an audience that will really appreciate the significance of their chosen topic. First-time presenters almost invariably comment that they have learnt more from the WisCon audience than they have from any other audience they've shared their work with. Do help us continue that positive feedback loop.

By the time you receive this progress report, the deadline for submitting an abstract to the academic track—**Monday, January 14**—will likely have passed. The deadline for submissions is earlier this year than previously for two key reasons:

First, prospective paper-givers will be notified of acceptance by the **end of January**, giving them time to apply to their academic institutions for the necessary support.

Second, the information on the outline academic program will be passed to the main Programming committee early enough for them to see if there are interesting ways to offer complementary panels.

However, if you've missed the deadline and you really want to present on the academic track at WisCon 32, do contact academic32@wiscon.info immediately, just in case there is any space left in the program.

Hotel

We've done it again: the Concourse Hotel's WisCon room bloc sold out before the end of 2007. Never fear, though, we have alternatives for you!



We have a large bloc of rooms at our overflow hotel, the Best Western Inn on the Park. Three blocks away around the Capitol Square.



the Inn on the Park has rates of \$124/night for single or double occupancy, and \$154/night for a suite. For more information, call their reservation desk at 1-800-780-7234 (US and Canada) or 608-285-8000 for the rest of the world.

Please note that, while the Concourse is sold out, it is highly recommended that you ask to be placed on the waiting list. People frequently make reservations, then for a variety of reasons cannot attend; rooms do open up as we get closer to the event. To be added to the waiting list, call 1-800-356-8293 from within the US and Canada; outside the US, call 608-257-6000.

Please also be aware that, since our room bloc is full, the Concourse is currently booking people at the much pricier, non-convention rate. If you are able to squeeze into the room bloc there before May, you should be charged the convention rate (which is \$93/\$103/\$113/\$123 for single/double/triple/quadruple occupancy). After May 1, however, all bets are off, and you may be glad of having a room at the Inn on the Park, where the WisCon room rate is considerably cheaper than the Concourse's standard rate.

Please be sure to cancel any "extra" reservations as soon as you know you won't need them. Not only does this open up space for others, it also avoids the possibility that you might be charged for a room you're not using. Deadlines: right now: contact hotel for mini-fridge or wheelchairaccessible hotel room. **April 15**: reserve large print or Braille pocket program book; need for manual wheelchair loaner

Known Barriers: ubiquitous fluorescent lighting; no sign language interpreters or captionists; smaller program rooms are not miked; print-only versions of member-generated posters, flyers, etc; no wheelchair-accessible family restroom in hotel; Gathering and Dealer's Room feature perfumes, incense and decades of reading materials.

Access on-site: Breathing: smoke-free city, request members eschew fragrance unless risk to own health. Eating: Con suite pantry list, including Vegan items. Vegan & gluten-free choices at Dessert Salon. Mobility: ADA-conforming hotel, no stairs required; manual wheelchairs on short-term loan (sign up by April 15); marked wheelchair parking in program rooms. Fatigue: Safety enables queue jumping/seat locating when needed. Hearing: center front seats for speechreaders; sound amplification in larger program rooms. Reading: electronic versions of con publications; large print/Braille pocket programs (sign up by April 15). Stress Management: inventory of serene environments to melt sensory overload, including Quiet Place (brain/body oasis on program floor)

Child Care

Child care is baby-sitting for little children—ages 0–6. It's available for the nominal charge of \$1 for children in the care of any registered WisCon members during daytime programming hours. Use baby-sitting as much or as little as you want. But you must contact WisCon by April 30 and get your child's name on the child care list! WisCon hires professional child care staff, and we need to know the number and ages of children to expect.

Children's programs

Children' Programs are for older children—ages 7—12 and teens. Children who are not yet 12 need to be signed in and out by a parent or responsible adult. Older children and teens can come and go without parents. This is a separate track of WisCon programming aimed especially at children. Expect craft activities, supervised swimming, story-telling, and games. We also plan to have some discussion groups and interaction with the teens.

Teens

Teens are welcome to participate in children's programming, but also have a separate room for more complicated activities, puzzles, gaming, videos, music, and video games. Teens will help develop the activity schedule for their room. The teen room will be open from 8:30 p.m.—11 p.m., as well as during the regular children's room hours. The teen room provides space for teens, and, except for the room moderators, is off-limits to both adults and younger children.

Volunteers make WisCon go round

Wiscon is an all-volunteer convention with many different ways to lend a hand. We're dedicated to helping everyone find a meaningful way to volunteer. Never volunteered before? Not sure how you can help? We have a volunteer opportunity for everyone—many are "no experience necessary." Got skills you want to use? Let us know and we'll try to match you with an appropriate opportunity. New to the convention, or have a hard time meeting people? Volunteering is a great way to make new friends. Worried about the time commitment? We have a wide range of opportunities that can last as little as an hour. Sustainability

We're starting to work on trying to make WisCon environmentally sustainable. We'll be making some changes in the convention this year and looking for ways to continue improving in the future. And we encourage everybody who attends WisCon to do the



same. Some of the things we're looking at include:

- reducing the quantity and size of some publications, to reduce paper waste (and using more sustainable inks and other technologies for the publications we create).
- cutting down on energy use at the hotel (for example, by more efficient art show lights) and getting that energy from wind or solar sources.
- letting you know about lower-emission ways to get to WisCon, and ways to offset the emissions from that travel.
- reducing waste at the convention (in the con suite, freebie table, etc.) and making sure that materials thrown away get recycled where possible.
- trying to find good affordable food for the con suite that's also local, reducing food miles
- encouraging programming which will investigate connections between feminism and environmentalism.

This is going to be a continuing effort over several years, as we try to balance the perfect with the practical. But we think it's an important one. Artists, please register now for participation in the Art Show at www.wiscon.info/artshow. php. Artists must have completed the Application Process and have received an acceptance notice in order to enter art into the Art Show

We are doing things a little differently this year. In order to include more new artists, we are requiring all artists to submit an application and photos of their work to the Art Show Staff by January 31 of this year. We will start sorting through the applications then and notify the applicants of their status by February 15.

We'll hang the art on Friday and open the show for viewing only on Friday evening. And, starting when we open on Saturday morning, if you want a piece you can buy it. Right then, no hassles. Just bring the "purchase" part of the tag to the Art Show desk and give them your money. The piece of art is then yours!

As much as possible, we'd like to keep the art on display until Sunday evening so everyone can see it, but if you're only at the convention for a day, or you have to leave early, you can take your artwork with you when you go. So please come by any time during the convention, look at the art, and buy some.

Convention members will have the opportunity to vote on the Art Show awards again this year. WisCon 32's Art Show will continue to focus on feminist art, art by women, and art by Midwestern artists. The letter codes are all about your registration:

- P You're a past guest of honor
- Y You're a youth member
- C You're a child member
- **S** You're a supporting member who will not attend WisCon 32
- X You get in free for some other reason
