Ellen Klages is a curious writer. Her fiction, often set in the past, poses intriguing questions as she pieces together the stories history ignores. Her novelette, "Basement Magic," won the Nebula Award in 2005. Her short fiction has appeared in a variety of online and print anthologies and magazines, including The Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction, Black Gate, Strange Horizons, Rending the Landscape, Firebirds Rising, and a few Year's Best volumes. She is a graduate of the Clarion South Writers Workshop and has been a finalist for the John W. Campbell, Hugo, Nebula, and World Fantasy Awards.

Her first novel, The Green Glass Sea (Viking, 2006), won the 2007 Scott O'Dell Award for Historical Fiction. A sequel, White Sands, Red Menace (Viking, 2008), was published in 2008, Portable Childhoods, a collection of her short fiction, came out from Tachyon Publications in 2007.

Before turning to fiction, Ellen wrote four nonfiction science activity books

(with Pat Murphy, et al.) for the Exploratorium Museum in San Francisco. Many of you also know her as a member of the Motherboard of the James Tiptree, Jr. Award, and as the renowned (notorious?) auctioneer/entertainment at the Tiptree auctions at WisCon.

Geoff Ryman

Geoff Ryman is an SF&F and surrealistic or "slipstream" fiction writer. He was born in Canada, university-educated in the US, and now resides in London and teaches Creative Writing at the University of Manchester. His most recent novel, The King's Last Song, is set in modern and historical Cambodia (in the Angkor Wat era), reflecting his long-standing interest in history and the Cambodian people. Geoff's previous book. Air, fascinated readers and rightfully garnered numerous awards (our very own James Tiptree, Jr. Award, and the John W. Campbell, Arthur C. Clarke, Sunburst, and British Science Fiction Association Awards). He has received 9 additional awards, including the Arthur C. Clarke, British Science Fiction, John C. Campbell, Philip K. Dick, and World Fantasy Awards for some of his other fine works, such as The Unconquered Country, The Child Garden, and 253. In addition, Geoff has been a Hugo and World Fantasy Awards nominee.

Geoff and others founded "The Mundane Movement" at a Clarion workshop in 2002, inspired by Julian Todd. Mundane stories recognize that our most likely future is limited to only ourselves and our planet Earth, and use only technology and science that exist at the time the story is written.

Programming

One of the programming committee's most recent accomplishments is the debut of a new interface for entering program ideas as part of a brand-new database system. To access the form, please go to www.wiscon.info/programming.php and click on the link to the program idea submission form. We hope you'll find the idea submission process smooth and easy.

We hope the track system (retooled last year) continues to inspire, and that the program idea interface is easy to use. Our tracks/topic areas include: The Craft and Business of Writing Science Fiction; Reading, Viewing and Critiquing Science Fiction; Science and Technology; Power, Privilege and Oppression; and Spirituality, Organized Religion and Politics. You can also submit ideas for The Gathering (see page 5). We welcome academics presenting on topics of interest to WisCon (see page 6). We hope that some of the track descriptions, which are found on the idea submission form, will serve as a spring-board for programming ideas. Remember, anyone can submit an idea. We've already been getting in lots of great stuff—keep it coming!

The last day to submit programming ideas is Friday, February 7. On that date, idea collection closes. After a two-week period in which we polish everything up a bit, we'll invite everyone to peruse the final list and tell us which items you're dying to participate in. You have the opportunity to volunteer to be a panelist or a moderator. Program sign-up will open on February 22.

Most "regular" programming will continue to be in panel format, with 3 to 5 panelists per item. It's a format that works for lots of different topics. However, we continue to be eager to explore other formats that are more effective, more (or differently) interactive, or that otherwise "think outside the panel." If your program idea could work well with an alternative format, make sure to let us know!

Writers' Workshop

The Workshop is a unique part of the WisCon weekend that focuses on the needs of novelists and short story writers. We invite established professional novelists, short story writers, editors, and agents to lead small critique groups at the con. To participate, you must first register for the con, then submit a manuscript for critique to workshop33@wiscon.info by April 5. You will not be considered registered for the Workshop until your manuscript is received. The preliminary list of pros will be published shortly before the manuscript submission deadline, and you will be matched to a pro and group after all manuscripts are received. Also note: the workshop starts bright and early on Friday morning, so please make travel plans accordingly! For more details, contact us at workshop33@wiscon.info.

Readings

Authors at WisCon usually read in self-organized themed groups in 75-minute sessions of four to six readers. This year we will also have an open pool for people who do not wish to form their own groups. These authors will be randomly assigned to a group, and then asked to come up with a catchy title/theme. Each reading session will contain at least four readers but may have up to six; therefore each person will have only **10–15 minutes** to prepare and read.

Every year, the number of people wishing to read exceeds available space. We will give priority to authors who are promoting a new publication (both for groups and individuals). The process is not first come, first serve, however; you must sign up within the designated time period. Watch the **Wiscon.info** website for dates.

Author readings

Sign up!

Step 1: Form a group of fellow writers to read selections that have a common theme, style, or premise.

Step 2: Decide if you would like to join "the pool" of individual readers and be assigned to a group.

Step 3: The most important step of all. Go to the "Readings" page under programming and follow the instructions on how to sign up. Each member of your group must sign up individually.

If you are not able to access the online instructions or have any other questions, please send an email to readings 3@wiscon. info. Be advised that we might not be able to respond immediately. We are volunteers and, like you, lead busy lives.

Step 4: Encourage people to come to hear you by letting them know when you're going to read. Make posters, promise chocolate, or find another fabulous way to promote your reading.

Academic programming

Not just for academics! Honest!

To those WisCon devotees who don't label themselves as academics, it is important to be aware that the academic track has a long history of welcoming scholarly work from both academically affiliated and independent researchers of feminist science fiction, fantasy and fandom. We have discussed whether to rename the academic track, because it's not who presents on the track that's important, it's how they prepare for and present on the track that's just a bit different from other panels. Unfortunately, the renaming hasn't quite come to pass yet, but we want to be very clear that this is the track where three people share 75 minutes to present focused, in-depth research on topics dear to WisCon attendees' hearts. Over the years, people have presented papers on fantasy, horror, and science fiction literature, media and fandom. They have examined issues of feminism, gender, sexuality. race, and class, among many others.

So if you're not normally in the habit of attending events labeled academic, please don't be put off by the label. The work presented is the result of intensive research and it often springs from genuine love and appreciation of genre fiction and its communities. Consequently, its presenters are passionate about communicating their work with an audience that will really appreciate the significance of their chosen topic—and also about avoiding the worst excesses of academic jargon. They come to be challenged and informed by their audience too. First-time presenters almost invariably comment that they have learnt more from the WisCon audience than they have from any other audience they've shared their work with. Do help us continue that positive feedback loop.

The deadline for submitting ideas to the academic track for WisCon 33 is **Monday February 16th**, with decisions going out to participants by Saturday February 28th. Academic programming works in parallel with the rest of programming, but the idea submission process does work just a little differently. Hotel

We've done it again: the Concourse Hotel's WisCon room bloc is sold out. There **are** alternatives though!

We have a large bloc of rooms at the Best Western Inn on the Park. Three blocks away, the Inn on the Park has rates of \$124 for a room with one bed for one or two people, \$134 for a room with two





beds for up to four people, \$154 for a two-room suite with a wet bar. One free valet parking space per room is included in the rate. There is no extra charge for a refrigerator, but you *must* request one when making reservation. For more information, call their reservation desk at 800-780-7234 (US and Canada) or 608-285-8000 for the rest of the world

The Concourse does not maintain a waiting list. However, cancellations do make rooms available as we get closer to the event so we encourage you to call the hotel. 800-356-8293 from within the US and Canada; outside the US, call 608-257-6000.

Please also be aware that, since our room bloc is full, the Concourse is currently booking people at the much pricier, non-convention rate. The con rate is no longer available.

Remember—Inn on the Park's WisCon room rate is considerably cheaper than the Concourse's standard rate.

Please be sure to cancel any "extra" reservations as soon as you know you won't need them. Not only does this open up space for others, it also avoids the possibility that you might be charged for a room you're not using. Known Barriers: ubiquitous fluorescent lighting; no sign language interpreters or captionists; smaller program rooms are not miked; no wheelchair-accessible public family restroom in hotel; Gathering and Dealer's Room feature perfumes, incense and decades of reading materials.

Access on-site

Breathing: smoke-free city, request members eschew fragrance unless risk to own health. **Mobility:** ADA-conforming hotel, no stairs required; manual wheelchair for short-term loan. **Fatigue:** Safety enables queue jumping/seat locating when needed. **Hearing:** center front seats for speechreaders; sound amplification in larger program rooms. **Reading:** electronic versions of con publications; large print/Braille pocket programs (reserve by **May 1st**). **Stress Management:** inventory of serene environments to melt sensory overload, including Quiet Place (brain/body oasis on program floor)

Child Care

Child care is baby-sitting for little children—ages 0–6. It's available for the nominal charge of \$1 for children in the care of any registered WisCon members during daytime programming hours. Use baby-sitting as much or as little as you want. But you must contact WisCon by April 30 and get your child's name on the child care list! WisCon hires professional child care staff, and we need to know the number and ages of children to expect.

Children's programs

Children' Programs are for older children—ages 7—12 and teens. Children who are not yet 12 need to be signed in and out by a parent or responsible adult. Older children and teens can come and go without parents. This is a separate track of WisCon programming aimed especially at children. Expect craft activities, supervised swimming, story-telling, and games. We also plan to have some discussion groups and interaction for the teens.

Volunteers make WisCon go round

Wiscon is an all-volunteer convention with many different ways to lend a hand. We're dedicated to helping everyone find a meaningful way to volunteer. Never volunteered before? Not sure how you can help? We have a volunteer opportunity for everyone—many are "no experience necessary." Got skills you want to use? Let us know and we'll try to match you with an appropriate opportunity. New to the convention, or have a hard time meeting people? Volunteering is a great way to make new friends. Worried about the time commitment? We have a wide range of opportunities that can last as little as an hour. Teens

Teens are welcome to participate in children's programming, but also have a separate room for more complicated activities, puzzles, gaming, videos, music, and video games. Teens will help develop the activity schedule for their room. The teen room will be open from 8:30 P.M.—11 P.M., as well as during the regular children's room hours. The teen room provides space for teens, and, except for the room moderators, is off-limits to both adults and younger children.

Registration limited to 1.000

If you have not already done so, we strongly urge you to register for WisCon now! Registration will be capped at 1,000 attendees. The hotel (and the ConCom) simply cannot handle more. All program participants must register for WisCon in advance. No at-the-door registration will be available after we have reached 1.000-attendee limit.

Sustainability

Last year we began working on making WisCon environmentally sustainable, We'll continue to make changes in the convention this year and to look for ways to continue improving in the future. We encourage everybody who attends WisCon to do the



- same. Some of the things we're working on include:
- reducing the quantity and size of some publications, to reduce paper waste (and using more sustainable inks and other technologies for the publications we create)
- cutting down on energy use at the hotel (for example, by more efficient art show lights) and getting that energy from wind or solar sources
- letting you know about lower-emission ways to get to WisCon, and ways to offset the emissions from that travel
- reducing waste at the convention (in the Con Suite, freebie table, etc.) and making sure that materials thrown away get recycled where possible
- trying to find good, affordable food for the Con Suite that's also local, reducing food miles while ensuring food safety
- encouraging programming that investigates connections between feminism and environmentalism

This is a continuing effort, as we try to balance the perfect with the practical, but we think it's an important one. Art Show

The WisCon 33 Art Show and Tiptree Award Auction items will be displayed in the same room.

Artists, please register now for participation in the Art Show at www.wiscon.info/artshow. php. Artists must have completed the Application Process and have received an acceptance notice in order to enter art into the Art Show.

We are doing things a little differently this year. In order to include more new artists, we are requiring all artists to submit an application and photos of their work to the Art Show Staff by February 15 of this year. We will start sorting through the applications then and notify the applicants of their status by February 28.

We'll hang the art on Friday and open the show for viewing only on Friday evening, And, starting when we open on Saturday morning, if you want a piece you can buy it. Right then, no hassles. Just bring the "purchase" part of the tag to the Art Show desk and give them your money. The piece of art is then yours!

As much as possible, we'd like to keep the art on display until Sunday evening so everyone can see it, but if you're only at the convention for a day, or you have to leave early, you can take your artwork with you when you go. So please come by any time during the convention, look at the art, and buy some.

Convention members will have the opportunity to vote on the Art Show awards again this year. WisCon 33's Art Show will continue to focus on feminist art, art by women, and art by Midwestern artists. The letter codes are all about your registration:

- P You're a past guest of honor
- Y You're a youth member
- C You're a child member
- **S** You're a supporting member who will not attend WisCon 33
- X You get in free for some other reason
