

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
Welcome to WisCon!

Whether this is your first WisCon, your sixth WisCon, or your thirty-sixth WisCon, we're glad to welcome you to another weekend of the world's leading feminist science fiction convention. With panels on topics as diverse as artistic theft, reproductive justice, science fiction on Broadway, and even an imaginary book club, plus parties ranging from a goblin masquerade to a genderfloomp dance, and an auction where anything goes, this year's WisCon is sure to be an unforgettably exciting weekend!

We'd like to extend a special welcome to our two guests of honor, Andrea Hariston and Debbie Notkin. Andrea Hariston is the Artistic Director of Chrysalis Theatre, as well as an award-winning playwright and director. *Mindscape*, her first novel, won the Carl Brandon Parallax award, as well being shortlisted for the Tiptree and Phillip K. Dick awards. She recently published her second novel, *Redwood and Wildfire*.

Debbie Notkin has been a science fiction bookseller, book reviewer, editor at Tor Books and elsewhere, and much more. She works with photographer Laurie Toby Edison, doing body image activism; together they have produced two books of photography: Women En Large: Images of Fat Nudes and Familiar Men: A Book of Nudes, plus the blog Body Impolitic. She has cochaired WisCon twice and been on the ConCom for more than a decade. There may be an honor in the science fiction field more important than being guest of honor at WisCon, but she says she couldn't tell you what that honor might be.

A WisCon Etiquette Guide

A few tips to make everyone's con experience run smoothly

Who Do You Think You Are? If you're not wearing your name badge, not only do we not know your name, we don't know if you even have a WisCon membership. Please always wear your name badge while at the con—it's a matter of safety (on top of helping the cool people you just met remember your name).

Tipping–It's Not Just For Cows! In this region, it's standard to tip servers 20% of your bill (if service is truly poor, speaking with the manager is more effective than leaving a low tip). Bartenders likewise get 15-20% of your tab, or a minimum of \$1 per drink. Cabbies typically get 15%. House-keeping usually get \$2-\$5 per room (more if messy). Bellhops usually get \$1 per bag.

Authors Just Wanna Have Fun! So please let them enjoy their convention as much as you enjoy yours. Please save your autograph requests for the SignOut on Monday, or after an author's scheduled reading.

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
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

At half a dozen panels WisCon 36 will be pilot-testing a new system for obtaining feedback from the audience while the panel is in progress. Audience members can use their handheld devices (smartphones, tablets, or laptops) to provide silent feedback to the panelists. The panels are:

- 118: Girl Cooties
- 180: Before Self-Publishing, I Wish I...
- 197: How To Make WisCon Affordable
- 198: The Future of School Part 2
- 212: Ethical Reasons for Self-Publishing
- 214: Pseudonymously Yours

Any items that go to auction WILL be sold. At the very end, when the auctioneer is tired and most of the audience has left to go to parties, we'll take a break, and there will be 10 minutes of lightning-fast, last-ditch paper bidding. The highest written bid when the bell rings will be the winner.

2) Pay for your items at the auction, or at the Art Show Sunday morning. Please don't make us track you down...

Proceeds from the auction, and Buy-It-Now sales all go to support the Tiptree Award. The money you spend supports a worthy cause, and is also tax-deductible (for any \$\$ over fair market value).



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

Hotel Reservations for WisCon 37

Whether you prefer to make your hotel reservation in person with a friendly face, on the phone with a friendly voice, or online, you can secure your room for the 2013 convention starting at 9:00 Sunday morning, May 27.

The link for WisCon's room block will be posted on WisCon's website at http://wiscon.info at 9:00 am Sunday, when the Concourse's online reservation system will be activated for WisCon 37. You can also stop by the concierge desk in the hotel lobby to make your reservation in person, or call the friendly folks in the Concourse's reservations department. The Concourse has scheduled extra reservations agents for Sunday morning to ensure that everyone's request is handled as expeditiously as possible.

Room rates at the Concourse Hotel for WisCon 37 will be \$101/\$111 single/double for a Concourse-level room, and \$173/\$183 single/double for Governor's Club rooms. If you make your reservation in person or by phone, be sure to tell them you want a room in the WisCon 37 room block to get these rates.

After you get your hotel reservation lined up for 2013, stop by WisCon's Registration/Information desk in the second floor lobby area to get your membership for the 37th annual World's Leading Feminist Science Fiction Convention! The committee is already in the planning phases of what will be yet another fabulous four-day marathon of spirited dialog, thought-provoking readings, and just plain fun, so make sure you have your membership secured.



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Worldcon Membership Discount at WisCon!

Chicon 7, the 70th World Science Fiction Convention (Worldcon), will be offering a special membership rate discount for all Adult Attending membership purchases made on Memorial Day, May 28.

For 24 hours only, Adult Attending membership rates will be lowered by \$20, to \$195. Anyone joining or upgrading their membership online will automatically receive this special discount. The offer will also be available to fans buying Chicon 7 memberships at conventions held over the weekend — look out for Chicon 7 representatives at WisCon!

Chicon will take place at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in downtown Chicago from August 30 - September 3, 2012.

Jo Walton is a writer and reader, or possibly the other way around.

She has published nine novels, which are: The King's Peace (Tor 2000), The King's Name (Tor 2001), The Prize in the Game (Tor 2002), Tooth and Claw (Tor 2003), Farthing (Tor 2006), Ha'Penny (Tor 2007), Half a Crown (Tor 2008), Lifelode (NESFA Press 2009), and Among Others (Tor 2011). She has also published two poetry collections, Muses and Lurkers (Rune Press 2001) and Sibyls and Spaceships (NESFA 2009). Her next work will be a collection of her Tor.com pieces about books, with the title What Makes This Book So Great.

She won the John W. Campbell Award for Best New Writer in 2002, the World Fantasy Award in 2004 (for *Tooth and Claw*), the Prometheus Award in 2008 (for *Ha'Penny*), the Mythopoeic Award in 2010 (for *Lifelode*) and the Nebula in 2012 (for *Among Others*). *Lifelode* was also listed as a Tiptree Honor book.

She comes from Wales but lives in Montreal, where the books and food are more varied. She reads a lot and writes about old books on Tor.com. She is married to Dr Emmet O'Brien and they live together in a charming but cluttered apartment in walking distance of the metro. Her grown up son and his girlfriend and two cats live in their own apartment nearby. Joan Slonczewski researches bacteria in extreme environments and writes hard science fiction about women of color as scientists, and diverse sexualities. Her latest book, The Highest Frontier (Tor Books, September 2011) depicts a Cuban-American woman going to college in a space habitat. Frontera College is run by a male couple, while on Earth a lesbian is running for president. Slonczewski's Campbell-award winning classic, A Door into Ocean (Tor Books, 1986; Campbell Award) creates a world covered entirely by ocean, inhabited by an all-female race of purple people who use genetic engineering to defend their unique ecosystem. Brain Plague (Tor Books, 2000; Arc Manor, 2009) shows intelligent alien microbes that invade our brains. The secret of these unique addictive microbes is discovered by a human-gorilla woman scientist in The Children Star (Tor Books, 1998; Arc Manor, 2009). Slonczewski's books show a bisexual perspective, including human-ape hybrids and humans married to intelligent machines. Her early work was inspired by the works of Ursula Le Guin, Octavia Butler, Anne McCaffrey, and Tanith Lee. Slonczewski teaches biology at Kenyon College, including the notorious course "Biology in Science Fiction."
