Fire! Fire!

We don't anticipate a fire in the hotel, but here are a few safety tips, just in case:

(1) As soon as you check into your room, count the number of doors you will have to pass to get from your room to the nearest staircase. This will help you find your way out in a lights-out or smoky situation.

(2) Do not use the elevators. If the power goes out, you're effectively in the architectural equivalent of a chimney. Use the stairs instead.

(3) Go down, not up. Heat rises, you shouldn't.

(4) Before leaving your room, feel the door. If it's hot, don't even try to leave. Instead, wet down some towels or bedsheets and pack the seams of the door to prevent smoke from entering. (Smoke, rather than flame, is by far the biggest killer in hotel fires.)

(5) Hang a sheet, towel, or other "flag" from your window and wait for rescue. Do not try to jump from higher than the second floor. You will not

survive.

- (6) If you notice a fire, immediately pull the local fire alarm to alert the other hotel guests. Then call the fire department (255-7272). Don't assume somebody else will do it; they all think that you've done it.
 - (7) Don't try to fight the fire yourself. Just leave as fast as you can walk.
 - (8) Don't run. Walk. Running can cause people to trip, fall, and be trampled.
 - (9) Don't stop for any of your belongings. They can be replaced; you can't. (10) Don't panic. You've read these tips, so you know what to do. Do it.
