CONVENTION DINING GUIDE

The Biltmore is located in the center of downtown Providence, and is surrounded by dozens of restaurants of various styles and price ranges. The following list is offered to provide some suggestions, although the fact that you don't see a place listed is not a slur on its cuisine. Similarly, we decline to be responsible it you don't have a good time at one of the establishments below. Consult the handy map on the next page prepared by our crack art staff.

IN PLAIN SIGHT

Stepping out from the Biltmore's main entrance, you should see

1. Haven Brothers. This old fashioned lunch-wagon, specializing in hot dogs and hamburgers, has driven into Providence every right at dusk and stayed till dawn for decades. The mayor has decided he doesn't like it near City Hall and a legal battle is now in progress. Take a peek in the evening and see if late night snacks will still be just a few teet away. The Havens swear they'll be there

 The Ming Garden, 141 Westminster St. 751-1700 Traditional Mandarin tare, most entrees under \$10. The all-you-can-eat buffet is a good deal for hearty appetites. Try the wings The entrance you see is NOT on Westminster.

EASTWARD HO

Proceeding past the Ming, continue through Kennedy Plaza to a second traffic circle containing a huge phallic symbol erected to honor the dead. To the left past this rotary you should spot.

3. 3 Steeple Street, 125 Canal St., 272-3620 Featuring both a casual bar area and a dining room. Soups, salads, sandwiches, etc. at under \$5, and good, substantial dinner specials usually under \$10

4. Alforno. 7 Steeple St. 273-9760. Just a lew steps past the previous listing, this infimate, somewhat avant-garde Italian restaurant features unusual and tasty food, but it's not cheap, so be prepared

5. The Bluepoint, 99 North Main St. 272-6145. Just around the next corner to the left, this somewhat arily seafood place sometimes features fancy recipes like fruit on, fish, but many locals swear by it. Many entrees are over \$10, and along with nitty appetizers like oysters or shrimp this can run into money.

6. Hemenway's, 1 Old Stone Square, South Main St., 351-8570. To reach Claus von Bulow's favorite restaurant, wander toward the right when you reach the second traffic circle. Across the street there's a big square building with neon seashells on the ground floor A glossy seatood place, with big bill potential unless you order carefully.

BACK OF THE BILTMORE

Providence's principal downtown area is behind the Biltmore, with the four principal streets running parallel behind it like whatever it is that streams out from behind Biltmores. Take a right as you exit the hotel's main door, take another right at the corner, and you're on Washington

7. Winkler's. 63 Washington St., 521-4626. This steak house is a local favorite, with entree prices running in the neighborhood of \$13. A ta carte.

 Mark's Deli, 73 Washington St. 861-6061. A nearby place for breakfast and sandwiches, this is handy and inexpensive. It closes early though so don't expect to get dinner.

9. Anthony's, 70 Washington St. 273-2350. The closest place to sample the Italian cuisine so popular in Providence, this somewhat posh restaurant features entrees in the \$15 range. A la carte

10. Shepard's. 80 Washington St. 351-7770. A new restaurant, upstairs in a former department store, featuring native American dishes, with Cajum cuisine a specialty Around \$12 per entree.

11. The Arcade. 65 Weybosset St. There's also an entrance, a block closer to the hotel, 115 Westminster St. Running the width of a city block, this 19th century indoor mail has its entire first floor devoted to inexpensive fast food of every kind. from Mexican to Greek, from croissants to of every kind. for Mexican to Greek, from croissants to inerankfurters. Eat for two bucks and up, but be warned that most places here close around 5 pm. A good cheap lunch though.

12. Pot Au Feu, 44 Custom House, 273-8953 Just off Weybosset, around the corner from the Custom House Tap, this French restaurant has a downstairs bistro where you can do yourself quite well for under \$10 Upstairs. things get pricter

13. Raphael's, 207 Pine St. 421-4646 Gola few blocks, down, Weybosset to Empire St. whose west side forms almost a barricade marking the end of downtown. Take a left at the church with the gold dome and Empire becomes. Chestnut St. Just a lew steps down at the corner of Chestnut and Pine is Raphael's, a rather ritzy and expensive lialian restaurant that has garnered some good notices since its recent opening. Menu changes daily. Bring money-

14. Leo's, 99 Chestnut St. 274-3541 Continue down Chestnut to this favorite hangoul for local artists and writers This bar and restaurant leatures generous drinks and lasty deserts. Meals include chili, ribs, salads, burgers, and daily dinner specials that run about \$8. Lunch on weekdays only, weekends after 5 pm with the risk of excessive civilian interlopers.

15. McDonald's, 132 Fountain St. Turn left as you leave the hotel, take a left at the corner and find Fountain St. Proceed past the Civic View strip joint and find your McNuggets.

16. Burger King, 186 Fountain St. Just about a block past McDonald's is this other popular place for low budget fast food. Take your pick. There's also a somewhat closer Burger King at 180 Westminster, but it closes at 8 pm.

ITALIAN STYLE

Proceed up Fountain till you spot the Holiday Inn, pass it, and you're on Atwells Avenue, the center of the city's Italian section. Pass under the concrete arch with the giant pine cone and chow down

17. The Old Canteen, 120 Atwells Ave., 751-5544 This popular Italian restaurant features entrees from \$6.50 to \$22.75, with most around \$12.

 Galleria de Gera. 134 Atwells Ave., 521-9459. This glossy, glassy Italian restaurant has a good reputation here, and offers entrees from \$8.75 to \$17. 19. Angelo's. 141 Atwells Ave., 621-8171. Small, funky, with a decor like a cateteria, Angelo's is nonetheless a local favorite because of lasty, homestyle food and low prices. Entrees are usually under \$6 Try a side dish of pasta made on the premises. Often crowded and closed at 8:30 pm Also closed on Sundays.

20. Tarantino's. 141 Atwells Ave., 751–3333 Lots of veal and pasta, with prices ranging from \$6.95 (lasagna) to \$16.95 (lobster). Closed Sundays.

ETC.

It never hurds to call to make reservations or just see how things are going. Most of these restaurants are a five to ten minute walk from the Bittmore, but a trip to Atwells Avenue will take a bit longer. You can find other places to eat by just wandering along. Washington, Westminster, and Weybosset, including a Japanese restaurant (145 Washington), a late night pizza emporium (199 Weybosset), and even a Dunkin Donuts (183 Weybosset). Let your conscience by your guide. Your hotels also have restaurants that will be happy to serve you. Wear more expensive clothes to more expensive places.

EMERGENCIES

Liquor stores at 94 Washington and 123 North Main, closing at 10 pm. Closed all day Sunday.

DEATH THREAT

Providence drivers are eccentric and erratic. There are countless annoying one-way streets and roads to nowhere. Right turns are legal on red lights, which the natives interpret to mean they should cruise through without looking, and at substantial speeds. Never assume that it is safe to cross a street here.
