

Membership Information

Memberships

Noreascon Three has two types of memberships: Attending and Supporting. Both include voting privileges on the Hugo Awards and on site selection for the 1992 Worldcon. Members registered before the convention will receive copies of all our major publications. This includes all magazine-style progress reports, all newsletter progress reports published after the time you join, the Program Book, and any post-con publications. An Attending Membership also gives you the right to attend the convention and the World Science Fiction Society business meeting.

Conversions

A Supporting Membership may be converted to an Attending Membership at any time by paying the difference between the Supporting price (\$20) and the Attending Membership rate at the time you convert. If you plan on attending Noreascon Three and currently have only a Supporting Membership, you should consider converting at this time, since the rates will only increase.

Membership Rates

All of our rates are in U.S. dollars. You can send U.S. funds to us, or the equivalent amount in the local currency to our agents (see page 2 for addresses). Canadian members can send us the equivalent amount in Canadian funds (we have opened a Canadian bank account and can deposit checks directly). We also accept MasterCard or Visa. Through July 15, 1988, our rates are:

Attending	\$60
Children's Admission	\$40

Supporting Memberships: \$20 at all times.

Conversion from **Supporting** \$40 to **Attending** Our rates have been set only through July 15, 1988. We don't yet have the detailed rental fee schedule for the Hynes Auditorium, which we'll need for our final budgeting. The rates after July 15th will be sent to the newszines and published in *Progress Report 4*, due out in July 1988. We intend to do preliminary budgeting before that time and will do our best to keep our rates low.

Children's Admission

Children who will be less than 12 years old at Noreascon Three have three options:

- 1: Attend as a kid-in-tow.
- 2: Buy a full Attending Membership.
- 3: Buy a Children's Admission.

Children who stay with their parents/ guardians throughout the convention are considered kids-in-tow and pay no attendance fee. Such children may use babysitting, by paying a fee which will be enough to cover our costs. However, they may not attend any convention activities alone and may not participate in Children's Programming.

1939 WORLDCON SPECIAL

Members of the first Worldcon, and those excluded from it, will receive free memberships in Noreascon Three. Please write us if you plan to attend.

Children can, of course, buy full Attending Memberships. This gives them the same rights as any other member. They can vote for the Hugos and future Worldcons and will receive all publications. They can attend any event (including Children's Programming) on their own. In addition, they can use babysitting with no additional charge.

The third option is to buy a Children's Admission, which may be purchased only in conjunction with someone else's Attending Membership. Currently, Children's Admissions cost \$20 less than full Attending Memberships. Children's Admissions entitle children (under 12 at the convention) to take part in any at-con activity on their own and to use babysitting for free. The difference from Attending Memberships is that the children do not receive any publications (including the Program Book), nor do they have the right to vote on the Hugos, or site selection. (Note that since they will not be able to vote on the 1992 site selection, they will not be eligible for any special voter rate.)

A Children's Admission may be converted to an Attending Membership at any time, by paying the difference between the price originally paid for it and the current Attending rate.

Transfers

We can not give membership refunds; however, a membership may be transferred. We would appreciate a letter signed by the original member giving the name and address of the membership's new owner. To avoid errors, please include your membership number in the letter.

Facilities Division Manages Space Utilization

With Noreascon Three less than two years away, our plans for convention facilities are beginning to firm up.

Function Space

With over 75% of our function space, the John B. Hynes Convention Center will be the hub of Noreascon Three.

Based on our needs and the availability of the Sheraton's function space, we have reserved two and a half of the renovated Hynes' three floors of space. This includes three exhibit halls of over 35,000 sq. ft. each, a 5,000-seat auditorium, a 24,000-sq. ft. Ballroom, over 30 additional function rooms, an over 10,000-sq. ft. registration area, plus lots of wide hallways and prefunction spaces.

The Hynes renovations are continuing on schedule. By the time this Progress Report is mailed out, they should have held a convention or two on the first floor and by May of 1988 all three floors are scheduled to be in use. The Hynes is going for a whole new look, similar in many areas to that of a first-class hotel.

In the Sheraton-Boston Hotel, we have reserved all function space including the Grand Ballroom and over 16 other areas, many of which are subdividable, totalling over 40,000 sq. ft. The Sheraton-Boston shares a common wall with the Hynes Convention Center and you can walk directly from the Conference Level of the Sheraton to the Second Level of the Hynes.

The third facility where we have reserved function space, just across Dalton Street from the Sheraton, is the smaller Back Bay Hilton hotel. We have reserved all function space at the Back Bay, including the Belvidere Ballroom and 12 other areas totalling over 14,000 sq. ft.

With over 90% of our function space under one roof in the Hynes and Sheraton, and the rest just across the street, all of our convention facilities will be concentrated in one area. You can be assured that you won't have to take a shuttle bus to get from one program item to another.

Program Allocation

Until we have seen how the new Hynes Convention Center actually works with a large convention on multiple floors, you should consider all of our continued on page 12

The Services Division comprises two kinds of convention services: internal services and member services.

As the overseer of internal services, the division is in charge of many of the behind-the-scenes activities that help the convention run smoothly:

Logistics:

Moving things into, around, and out of the convention Insurance:

Office:

Central committee message service and communications area

People Mover:

Coordinates and allocates gophers to the other areas

Gopher Hole and Den:

"Getaway" areas for the gophers and committee to meet and relax in

Internal Newsletters:

Supplying information for those working on the con

Computer Nets:

Improving computer communication among the committee and between the committee and fandom.

Many member services are also part of the Services Division (though a number of others are part of Nameless Division). Publications is part of the division. This includes progress reports, the Program Book, advertising, any special convention publications, and *The Mad*

Program Division Starts Planning

The Program Division is beginning the planning for what we anticipate will be a varied and interesting program. In addition to all of the traditional topics in areas such as Science Fiction, Fandom, Science, etc., we will be developing a program that focuses on our Guests of Honor, and a theme of the 50th Anniversary of the Worldcon.

Any suggestions or comments about the program are, of course, welcome.

Extravaganzas Division Runs Major Events

The Extravaganzas Division was created to find a home for Noreascon Three's landmark events. Our team will concentrate on a few, large areas, which will excite and enlighten. We will concentrate on the primary events of the convention: Opening and Closing Ceremonies, Hugo Ceremonies, Masquerade, and Films. We will cooperate with the Program Division in planning and carrying out any Guest of Honor events in the Convention Center. For films, we plan to concentrate on hard-to-get items which few people have seen elsewhere. We will be holding the Hugo Ceremonies on Saturday night and the Masquerade on Sunday night. Look for more details in future progress reports.

We are already considering other new ideas, and welcome more. Ideas for any events which you want to see at a Worldcon can be addressed to us or discussed in *The Mad 3 Party*.

the opportunity to vote on the Science Fiction Achievement Awards (Hugo Awards) for the best SF and related work of 1988. Currently there are twelve Hugo categories: Novel, Novella, Novelette, Short Story, Non-Fiction Book, Dramatic Presentation, Professional Editor, Professional Artist, Semiprozine, Fanzine, Fan Writer, and Fan Artist; the Hugo Ballot will also include the John W. Campbell Award for the best new writer of 1987-88. The Hugo nomination ballot will be distributed to all members at the end of 1988, probably with Progress Report 5; you will be able to make up to five nominations in each category. The final ballot, listing the five nominees in each category that receive the most nominations, will be mailed in Spring 1989 and due back in July. As always, the winners will be announced at the Hugo Awards Ceremony during the Worldcon.

While the voting is a year away, it's not too soon to start keeping track of Good Stuff that you might want to nominate. Please let us know if you have any questions about eligibility—especially as to which year a given work is eligible in. Note, however, that the WSFS Constitution, which includes the Hugo rules, will be distributed with the nomination ballots.

WSFS Business Meeting

A Business Meeting is held at every Worldcon to consider changes in the WSFS Constitution (which includes the Hugo and site-selection rules) and related business. Any member may attend and/or submit business.

Art Show


The Noreascon Three Art Show will be the largest SF and fantasy art show in the world during 1989, with 2500 or more pieces of art on display. Most of them will be available for sale (by written-bid auction) to the convention attendees, although the prices of the best work will be high (some minimum bids of over \$10,000 have been seen at recent conventions).

The show will operate similarly to the Noreascon Two and Boskone art shows,

1992 Site Selection

All members of Noreascon Three will be entitled to vote on the location of the 1992 World Science Fiction Convention. Ballots will be distributed in the spring of 1989 (along with the final Hugo ballots); members may cast their site-selection ballots either by mail or at Noreascon Three. Payment of the voting fee automatically makes the voter a supporting member of the 1992 Worldcon; the fee will be \$20, unless a different amount is agreed to unanimously by all the bidders and the Noreascon Three Committee.

Committees bidding to hold the 1992 Worldcon must file their bids with the Noreascon Three Committee, no later than the close of the 1988 Worldcon. As described in Article III of the WSFS Constitution, these bids must include (1) the proposed location and committee, (2) evidence of an agreement with the proposed site's facilities, and (3) the rules under which the Worldcon committee will operate. Eligible to bid for 1992 are all locations in the Eastern region of North America (except within 60 miles of Boston) or outside North America. While no bids have been formally submitted at this time, we are aware of bidding campaigns for Orlando, Florida, and Washington, D.C.



Of course, a great Worldcon needs more than great facilities. Also essential is a capable, dedicated con committee. We're confident that we have that, too. Our committee members have held top positions in past Worldcons, and founded and chaired major local and regional conventions.We have acquired a wealth of useful experience, and continue to do so. (For example, committee members worked at Conspiracy and at CactusCon, serving in various capacities.) While **MagiCon**, like all other modern Worldcons, will recruit its staff from all over the country, our solid local base gives us the vital foundation for a first-rate con.

Growing Like MAGIC

That's what we're doing. We are fast approaching 700 presupporting memberships. T-Shirt sales have sky-rocketed, and we've had to go to a second printing of the first issue of our bidzine. The bid parties we threw at Worldcon and NASFiC were our most successful to date, due in large part to the unbridled enthusiasm of all who attended. Our thanks to those who showed their support.

The **MagiCon** bid is not the only thing that is growing the entire Orlando area is too. By 1990, Orlando will be host to two motion picture production studios, Walt Disney World Village's new Pleasure Island nighttime entertainment facility, and Typhoon Lagoon, a 50 acre, 50 Million dollar water thrill park. These are in addition to the theme parks that have already made Orlando famous.

we will provide some tables and chairs for eating areas.) We'd like your suggestions for other things that we can do in this space. We're also holding a "Name That Mixing Area" contest, since we haven't thought of a good name for it yet either.

Information

We intend to run the Information Area a bit more dynamically than it's been done in the past. We will have a corps of roving reporters who will be scouting out things that Information and the newsletter should know. While there will still be a central Information desk, we will also have roving informers who will go out and find questions to answer. We realize that most of the convention members will be from out of town and we will make a strong effort to have lists of local restaurants, bookstores, museums, stores, and whatnot, as well as maps and public transit schedules. Information will also be the place for convention members to go with problems, since it will be the central point for members to contact the convention committee.

Exhibits

We want to have lots of interesting exhibits of sf-oriented material. This includes fan memorabilia, bidders' displays, special interest group material, and club material. Exhibits which

The Hucksters' Room will be in a separate, nearby exhibit hall in the Hynes Convention Center. We intend to set aside a special section of this (maybe in a separate room) for smallscale used books sales. This will have tables which can be rented for only part of the convention. (This is meant more for book collectors who want to sell some of their duplicates than it is for professional book dealers.) Please write to us if you would be interested in tables on this special basis.

We are also considering having a discounted rate for dealers who provide their own setups (which we would need to approve in advance) and who do not need us to provide actual physical tables for them. Please write to us if you would be interested in renting space on this basis.

There will be some restrictions on the material sold in the Hucksters' Room. While these have not been finalized, we certainly will not permit the sale of any items which cannot legally be purchased, used, or carried in Massachusetts. This includes weapons.


We are not yet ready to set rates or to start accepting reservations for any hucksters' tables or spaces. We have been maintaining a list of all inquiries and we will continue to do so. We will send out a mailing including rate information to this list in late spring or early summer 1988. function allocations to be tentative. We do have a straw-man plan, described below, that calls for the main film program to be in the Sheraton-Boston and all of the other large program items and areas, including registration, to be in the Hynes.

On the Plaza Level of the Hynes (see figure) we plan to put the Hucksters' Room in Hall B and to have registration in the designated area. On the Second Level, we plan to use the Auditorium for the big events, including the Hugo Award ceremonies, Guest of Honor events, Masquerade, opening and closing ceremonies, and any block-buster film presentations. Hall D, which is double height, is the planned location for the Art Show and major exhibits. Hall C, which is the most centrally located of all our areas, is planned to be a combination mixing area and con suite, the heart of the convention (see "Name That Division!" write-up). The Third Level includes the Auditorium balcony and has the Hynes Ballroom, which is planned for the largest program items outside of the Auditorium, and any large catered events. In the Sheraton-Boston, the Grand Ballroom is the planned location of the main film program.

Hotel Rooms and Reservations


In addition to our 1,000 rooms at the Sheraton-Boston, we have secured large room blocks at the Boston Park Plaza Hotel and Towers, the Back Bay Hilton, the Lafayette Swissotel, and a number of others. With commitments for over 3,000 rooms in the vicinity of the Hynes, we are confident there will be no shortage.

We expect to be negotiating special convention room rates, for which only members will be eligible. We plan to have a reservation form and full information on all of the participating hotels in Progress Report 5, to be published in January 1989. Because of the number of hotels involved, we will process reservations centrally and allocate them to hotels. We hope to make it possible for affinity groups that so request to be blocked in the same hotel. In any case, we guarantee that a prompt acknowledgment will be sent to you as soon as we get your reservation form.

Please do not try to reserve directly with any of the hotels at this time.

Parties

A key question on our room reservation form will be whether you anticipate running a party in your room open to Noreascon Three members. There will be a strict separation of open party areas and quiet areas. A variety of suites and



party rooms will also be available for those interested in running an open party that either is too large for their room or would not be allowed in their room (because they want a quiet-area room).

Other Facilities Areas

There are several other areas that the Facilities Division is responsible for. These include Technical Services (sound, lighting, construction, and electrical) and Facility Operations (coordination of contractors, professional and fan security, elevator management, etc.). We have also taken it as our special responsibility to be sure that enough ice is available.


