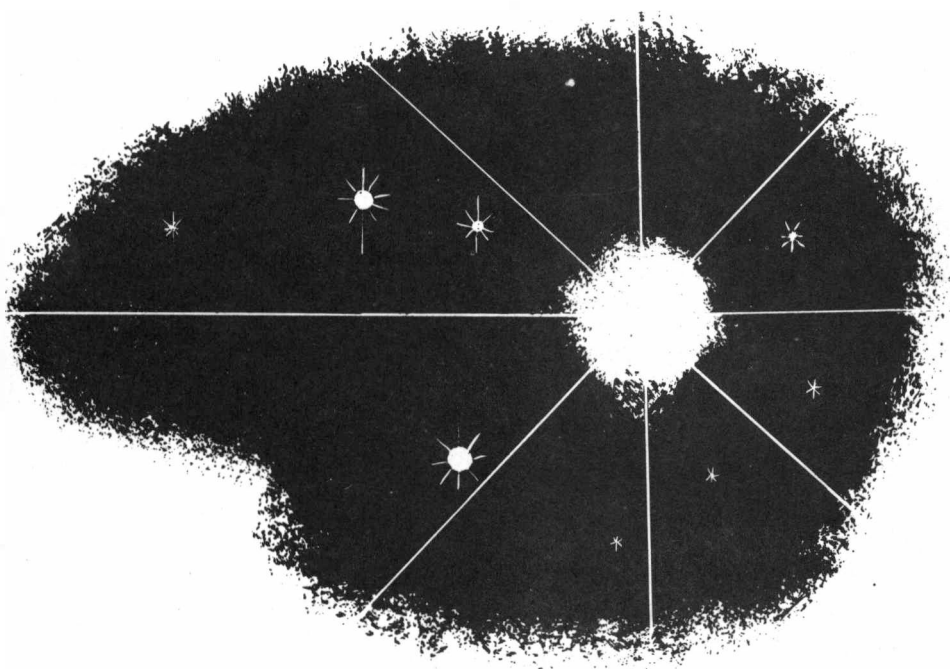

Achievement Awards!

 BESTOR'S "DEMOLISHED MAN" LEADING AS BEST NOVEL IN EARLY VOTING!
 FORREST J. ACKERMAN AND HARLAN ELLISON TIED FOR FAVORITE FAN!

In Progress Report Number Three we announced that awards in nine categories of Science Fiction Achievement would be made at the Convention, and we printed a ballot listing the nine categories in that Report so that each and every member of the Convention could vote for his or her choices. While it is still too early to predict outcomes, and only a small number of members have already sent in their ballots, we're reporting the "early returns" as a matter of general interest.

There is still time to (a) do a little campaigning to line up a solid bloc of votes for your favorites, (b) get some members ---every membership is a potential vote for your favorites, and (c) get your own votes in before our August 25th postmark deadline. In the categories of outstanding FAN MAGAZINE, COVER PAINTING, INTERIOR ILLUSTRATION and SHORT STORY OR NOVELETTE the field is wide open, with no front-runners yet. So far, Bestor's Demolished Man is leading in the NOVEL class, with Bob Tucker's Long Loud Silence in second place. Most votes for favorite FAN are divided between old-timer Forrest J. Ackerman and new-timer Harlan Ellison. Galaxy is just edging Astounding as favorite PRO MAGAZINE. Willy Ley's For Your Information. James Gunn's Philosophy of Science

Fiction, and Robert Madle's Inside Science Fiction are leading in the FACT ARTICLE category, and illustrator Ed Emsch, authors Philip Jose Farmer and Robert Sheckley are all choices for outstanding NEW DISCOVERY. Of course, returns in the next couple of weeks could considerably alter the above picture; we're sitting in a neutral corner hollering only "May the best fans win!"

We have received numerous requests, complaints, protests and general hell-raising from fans who don't want to mutilate (!) their Number Three Report, asking us to change the rules so that they may vote without having to cut the ballot out of that Report. To this end, we are enclosing postal cards which may be used instead of the official ballot. Just fill out these cards and mail them to us. Print or write plainly. 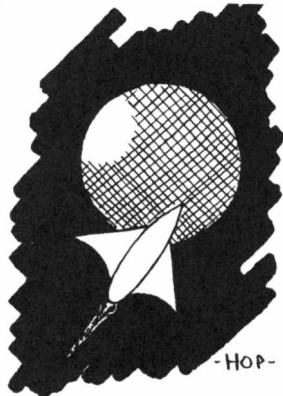

COMMITTEE REPORTS

PUBLICITY COMMITTEE

There has been a consistent change of Publicity Chairmen for the convention, starting with Tom Claerson--who left for a teaching position in Labrador Alan E. Nourse--who left on vacation in June, and ending with myself, Lyle Kessler. Nevertheless, the publicity has been exceptionally good. Both the professional editors and the fan magazine editors have kept a steady announcement of the convention in their mags. For this we cannot thank them enough.

But now on to the latest Publicity notices for the 11th World Convention.....

THERE WILL BE a Costume Party at the con! This will be sponsored by the New York Science Fiction Circle, and special "Certificates" will be presented to everyone coming in costume. Dave Kyle states that an attempt is being made to get a color photograph of the masquerade as a cover on a professional science fiction magazine.

As for outside publicity, Dave Eynon, well known writer for Weird Tales, is taking care of Newspaper coverage. Also, all the large national news and general magazines have been contacted. A few t.v. appearances and radio announcements are in the planning stage.

And finally after a long and certainly tiring year the publicity work is almost over. We would like to thank wholeheartedly the editors, fans, readers, and writers of science fiction who over the past year have helped to publicize the convention. To try to list all of these wonderful people would

be impossible; it would take up the whole Progress Report. But we want them to know that their help and advice has been greatly appreciated. We hope the next convention, where ever it may be, receives the same fine support that we have had.

ARRANGEMENTS COMMITTEE

The Chairman of the Arrangements Committee expected to be overwhelmed by an avalanche of inquiries concerning transportation problems and car-pools for distant fans. But there have been very few requests. Perhaps the more remote fans have perfected teleportation. Early arriving fen will be registered on Friday evening in the Convention suite. Be sure to report there, if you arrive on Friday. For general benefit of members, we will maintain an information booth in the main lobby of the hotel between sessions. You will find it handy for leaving and receiving messages, contacting friends, etc.

For those who will want souvenirs of what should be a great occasion, we have secured the services of Joseph Zinni, one of Philadelphia's outstanding photographers. Joe will be taking pictures all during the convention and in many cases will be able to turn finished

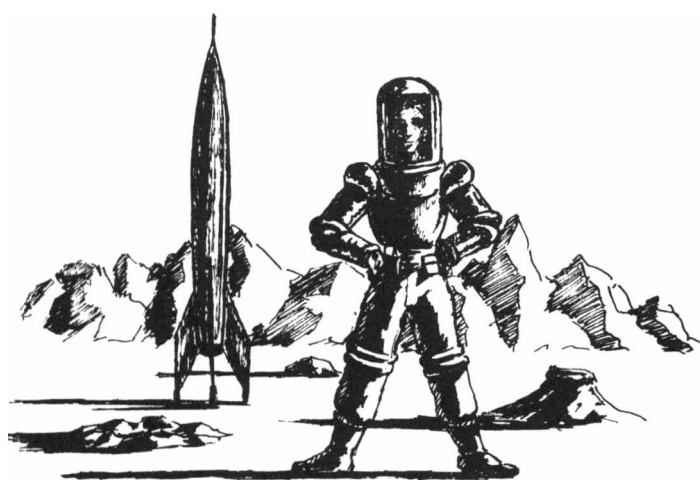

Young Translator To Attend Convention Of Science Fiction

(Reprinted from the English Edition of The Mainichi, a Japanese Newspaper, for April 27, 1953)

KOBE, Apr. 26---In order to attend the 11th World Convention of Science Fiction to be held in Philadelphia on September 5-7, Tetsu Yano, 29, translator of science novels of Kobe will leave here on April 27.

He will board the M.S. Kamikawa Maru of the Kawasaki Kisen Kaisha at Yokohama on April 29.

Prior to attending the world convention, he will participate in the West Coast Convention of Science Fiction, which will be held in Los Angeles on May 30-31.

The young translator is going to America on the invitation of Forrest J. Ackerman, noted novelist, critic and agent for novels, whose nickname is "Mr. Science Fiction."

Yano became acquainted with Ackerman through his short articles, which appeared in American magazines "Startling" and "Imagination" under the title: "Letter From Japan."

Visiting the Mainichi Kobe branch office this morning, the youthful translator said that he wanted to tour 24 states in America by a Harley Davidson motorcycle, covering a distance of 28,000 kilometers starting from Los Angeles.

In his recent letter to Yano, Ackerman said in part:

"If ever you should be able to get to California, be assured that you would be most welcome at any Thursday night meeting of our Science Fiction Club.

"In fact, you would be Guest of Honor. My wife and I would be most pleased to have you as a guest in our home, sleeping and eating here without charge, while you were visiting Los Angeles.

"I would try to arrange for you to visit a motion picture studio, and do anything else within my power to make your stay pleasant.

"Of course you would be welcome to look at all my s.f. books and magazines, and I would arrange for you to meet such important s.f. personalities as Ray Bradbury and A.E. van Vogt...."

On April 10 Yano received a telegram from Ackerman reading: "Guarantee your maintenance while in U.S.A. also departure." Accordingly, he made up his mind to visit America and to attend the international convention.

So you see Forry is helping to make this a really international convention by his one-man "East Meets West" campaign.

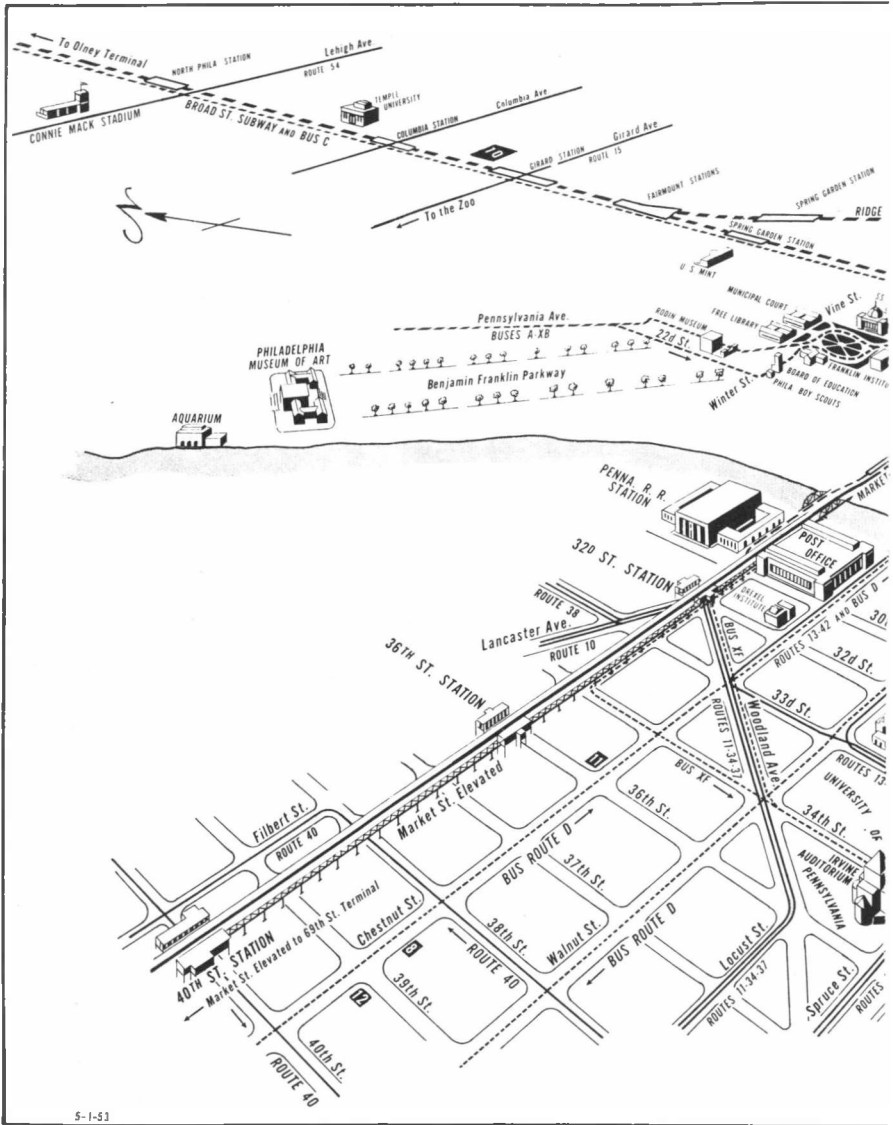
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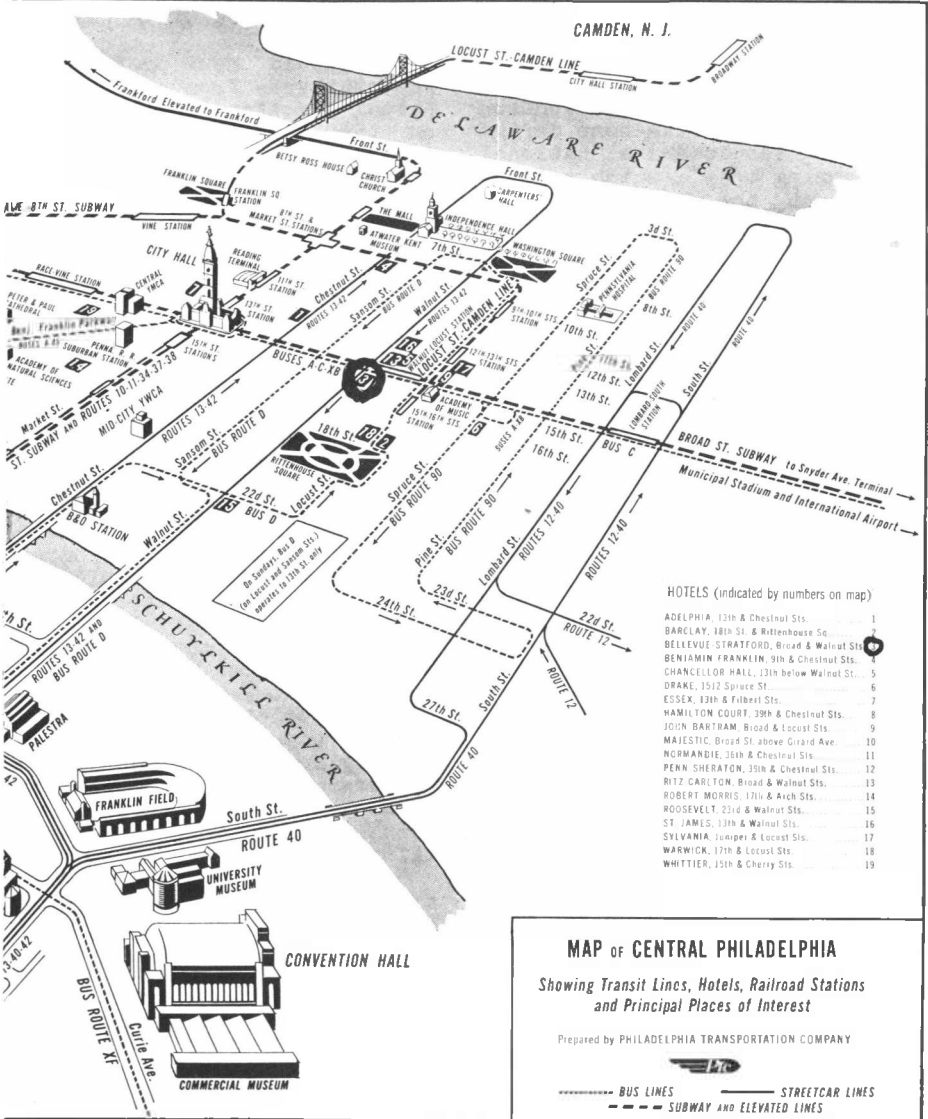

CA'S CONVENTION CITY

THE QUESTION OF A NATIONAL ORGANIZATION FOR S F CONVENTIONS

 WILL FUTURE SCIENCE FICTION
 CONVENTIONS BE HANDLED BY A
 NATIONAL ORGANIZATION?

This coming 11th Convention is expected to make some definite progress toward a "national sponsoring body", which a resolution at the 10th Convention in Chicago recommended for future science fiction conventions.

At the moment the question of what kind of "national sponsoring body" is wide open to suggestions. In order to permit everyone to offer ideas on this important subject, a sub-committee is compiling all suggestions for discussion at the Philadelphia convention. Much more interest in this vital problem is urged of all members --whether or not they are planning to be at Philadelphia.

Write down your ideas today and send them directly to David Kyle, 300 West 67th Street, New York 23, N.Y., who is chairman of the sub-committee on the National Sponsoring Body.

Dave, whose original resolution was passed at Chicago for the creation of such a body, says: "Every person in fandom, regardless of his age or experience, should make his ideas known to us. If ever there was a time when a fan was needed by fandom and responsible for its progress, that time is now. Please don't delay. Write that long letter or that succinct postal card to us today. You will be our guide to the decisions that must be made."

These questions in particular concern Dave's committee, and need your opinions and comments:

1. Should there be an Advisory Board to convention commit-

tees? How should the members be chosen?

2. Should there be fan representatives from each geographical section of the country on the convention committee? Should there also be representatives of other countries? How should they be chosen?

3. Should there be a permanent custodian-historian for all convention records?

4. Should there be a name given to the "national sponsoring body" which will be used year after year in order to give continuity and permanence to sf conventions? What name?

5. Should all former members of conventions be considered as "life members" of the "national sponsoring body" with current members of the current convention as the only "active members entitled to vote"? Should members who continue to demonstrate their interest year after year be given any recognition by using membership titles or grades of membership which carry no additional authority or voting power and remain completely honorary? Or should such members who earn such titles or grades be given increased responsibility? What responsibility?

6. Should fan clubs as units be asked to share in the burden of convention organizing? If so, should there be some sort of minimum requirement to determine which clubs are properly constituted? What requirements?

7. Should there be an official seal or insignia for conventions from year to year? Should there also be convention badges using such a seal?

Let Dave hear from you. What you have to say may greatly affect future sf conventions! you

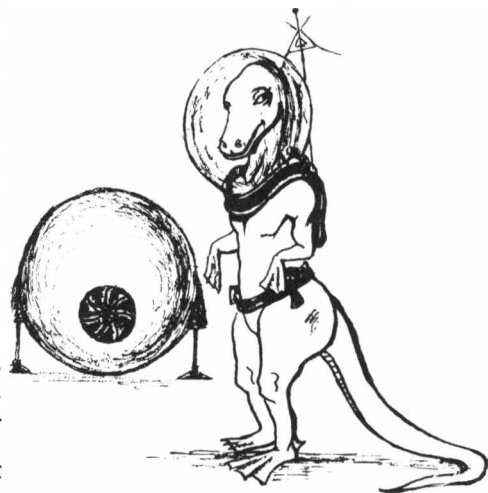

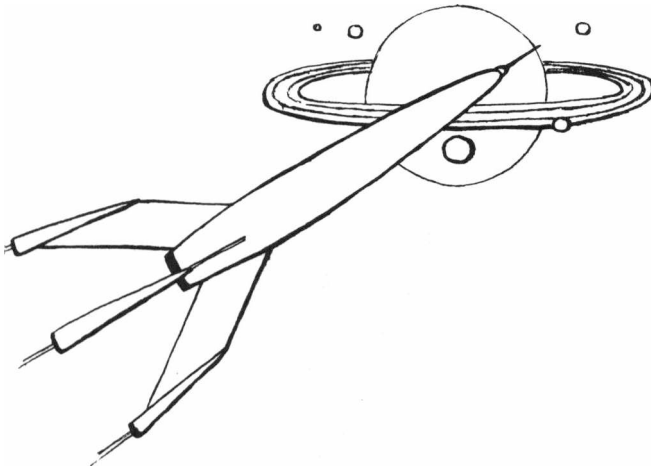
