BoskLone as a substitute for Boskone XVII was officially born last May when a NESFA member who shall remain nameless added this name to a list of thirty or forty suggested for our alternative science fiction convention. Since then we've done our best to live up to the name——a convention in the best tradition of previous Boskones but with its own special character. We aren't a relaxacon in the usual sense of the word; in fact we've deliberately kept many of the popular activities of previous years such as strong programming and movies, Punday Night, and the costume party. What we've cut back on are the items which take huge amounts of work before and behind the convention——the art show, the play, and the dealers' room.

We're very happy to have as our guests this year Spider and Jeanne Robinson; they've attended several past Boskones and we've always enjoyed their company. With the scaling-down of this year's convention we don't have a Boskone Book as we've had in the past several years, but we look forward to seeing more of their work commercially published.

The smaller size of this year's convention has also meant the one-time absence of an Official Artist and a Science Speaker, though we still have an interesting science panel and some fine artwork from Victoria Poyser and Stu Schiffman. We've also brought up for your entertainment the folk/filk/singalong group Clam Chowder; they'll be playing at the Costume Party and at various times and places around the convention. We would like to say a special thank you to ABBASOUND who have kindly loaned us their sound equipment. Though it will be a while before we have another convention like this one, we'd like to hear what special features of this convention you enjoy and what you miss from our more conventional Boskones. We're glad you're here; we're glad we're here; and most of all, we're glad BoskLone is finally here.

GUESTS OF HONOR

Once you meet Spider Robinson, you begin to believe that Callahan's Crosstime Saloon really exists. Spider must surely be one of the regulars in that highly irregular watering spot. He will tell you strange stories and sing you strange songs. But strangest of all are the Robinson puns, strange because they are invariably good. And who ever heard of good puns before? Obviously, Spider has practiced in the big leagues, at Callahan's Punday Night.

Way back when, he was an almost normal American teenager and went for a while to Syracuse University, where he had his given name changed by committee vote to 'Spider' as denotative of his extreme thinness. He has since transferred residence to Nova Scotia, where he lives with wife Jeanne and thousands of review books in Halifax. Jeanne is a dancer, and has received recognition in the form of grants for following her profession. With Spider, she helped write the brilliant winner of the 1978 Hugo for Best Novella, "Stardance". Earlier, Spider received the John W. Campbell award at the 1974 Worldcon for best new writer, sharing honors with Lisa Tuttle, who had also attended Syracuse University.

Both Spider and Jeanne laugh a lot. I think this occurs because Spider has funny thoughts bubbling in his head all his waking hours and ungrudgingly shares these with whomever is lucky enough to be nearby. There's no doubt of it, Spider is one of the handful of truly humorous persons ever to become pros in science fiction, along with Bob Tucker, Bob Bloch, and Isaac Asimov. He has singlehandedly devised the humorous science fiction book review as an art form. And he has added the Punday Night contest to science fiction's armamentarium against the dreariness of the outside world. I firmly believe that if Spider didn't exist, someone would have to invent him. Not for science fiction's sanity, but for its pleasure.

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THE RADISSON FERNCROFT

On the following pages are maps of the various areas of the Radisson Ferncroft, BoskLone's hotel. On the first floor, the hotel can be divided into three parts. Upon entering the front door you enter the middle section which includes: the Greenery (a Coffee Shop); the Running Board Restaurant and Lounge; the elevators to the tower upper floors; and, the front desk.

The right-hand section includes: the Pro Shop; a beauty and barbershop; the Craftsmen's Gallery (Giftshop); and Play Me (a pinball game room), as well as the Ferncroft East and West rooms (main programming and films); the Foyer (Information Desk, bulletin boards, and mural); and, an open coat room.

The left-hand section includes: the Garden Court atrium (registration, costume party and Sunday brunch); the swimming pool and Jacuzzi; and, the Garden Court rooms (artists, hucksters, NESFA table, and babysitting.)

The tower elevators, or stairs, will take you to the second floor where you will find the Middleton Room (People Mover, operations, and headquarters), Danvers Room (Fanzine programming), Hawthorne Room (games), and Topsfield Room (Filksing and Regency Tea).

Most of the sleeping accommodations will be on the tower floors 3 and up. Each room is provided with a 'Guest Services' directory. This directory will give you most of your hotel information, but, as we are taking over the hotel, there have been some changes.

CHECKOUT TIME: This is one item the hotel is firm on.

Checkout time is noon. You can stay up to 5 PM
by paying a half-day's room rent and some late
check-out may be allowed. However, any deviation
from the noon check-out must be arranged on an
individual basis before your expected checkout.

SWIMMING FOOL & JACUZZI: These will be open 24 hours a day. There is no life-guard. The Jacuzzi will

not be heated in the morning from 7 AM to 10 AM so that the swimming pool can be, as it is not possible to heat both at the same time.

BEAUTY SHOP: Open from 9 AM to 5 PM.

The Greenery: This is a Coffee Shop located on the first floor. It is open from 6:30 AM to 10 PM. The Running Board: Open 6 PM to 10 PM. This is a formal dining room.


Room Service: Available 6:30 AM to 10 PM.

times will be posted.


ICE & SOFT DRINKS: These machines are located next to Room 36 on each floor and near the swimming pool and Garden Court areas.

REGENCY TEA

The Regency Tea combines two functions which have crept into Science Fiction Convention Fandom thru one of the many back doors which science fiction seems to hold open to fringe interests. These functions are regency dancing and the Georgette Heyer Tea, both of which find their wellsprings in the writings of that British novelist. Georgette Heyer Fandom and Science Fiction Fandom overlap for reasons which are not completely clear, but chiefly perhaps because both are concerned about societies which provide greater scope to the individual - especially in terms of variety of costume and personal adornment - in marked contrast to what is generally perceived as a twentieth century strait—jacket of drab uniformity.

Sometime in the late 1960's, a group of science fiction fans - principally Sue Lewis, Anne McCaffrey, Marilyn (Fuzzy Pink) Niven, Marsha Jones (then Brown), and Cory Panshin - discovered in casual conversation their common interest in the novels of Georgette Heyer and some of her immitators. Perhaps out of a desire to see their men-folk in plumage more grand than either business mufti or the casual dress of the day, and certainly because they all considered the opportunity to display fancy dress one of the main drawing cards of science fiction conventions, they decided to form a subsidiary fandom, modelling their fanac after the formal gatherings in Almack's Assembly Rooms in London during the regency of George IV. They called their group 'Almack's Society for Heyer Criticism.' Its functions were open to all who could display some knowledge of Miss Heyer's books, plots and characters, and who were willing to make at least a good stab in the direction of period costume. Over the years, these costumes have tended to become more and more colorful and authentic - no mean feat indeed, since men's costume in particular called for a rather high level of competence with cloth, needle, and thread.

TEA..CONTINUED

This splinter fandom has burgeoned, particularly on the There, some of the original founders and West Coast. some of the newer members - particularly Adrienne Martine and Elayne Pelz - took the next step of adding the dancing and music of the English Regency to their science fiction convention activities. To teach them, they secured the assistance of professional and semiprofessional teachers who were antiquarians of dance. These dance forms, which are forerunners of both modern ballroom dancing and contemporary folk dancing, although they are not 'called', require much of the same dexterity and memory for pattern as modern round and square dancing. They are simultaneously challenging and graceful - thus providing a profound contrast to disco and its immediate forebearers. activity has become so popular that entire conventions are now held annually under the auspices of the 'Friends of the English Regency, ' a West Coast group whose interest springs from, but now goes far beyond, enthusiasm over the writings of a single British author.

The Regency Tea at BoskLone will be presided over by Peggy Kennedy in her personna as Lady Castlereagh, - one of the patronnesses of 'Almack's - with the assistance of her husband, 'Lord Patrick of Ailsa.'

Formal dress, preferably of the period, is required.

THE SKYLARK

The Skylark is the annual award given by the New England Science Fiction Association, Inc., in honor of the late E. E. 'Doc' Smith. The award was conceived by the committee of Boskone I, in September of 1965, when they were informed of the death of the man whose writing inspired the name of the convention, but not awarded until Boskone II.

The award is given to the person who, in the opinion of the association, has contributed significantly to science fiction, both through work in the field and by exemplifying the qualities which made 'Doc' so well loved by all who knew him.

THE HOST OF BOSKLONE

And now for something incompletely different.

Actually, this is not the first time the format of the NESFA regional convention has changed. Since 1940 and the National Fantasy Fan Federation, the character and attendance of Boskones has grown. Back in March, 1971, NESFA held a 285 person relaxacon due to the presence of the World SF convention in Boston later that year (Noreascon I), but even that format change was known as Boskone - Boskone VIII to be precise. This year is the first time a 'Boskone' has not been held since 1965 (Boskone I).

Legally, we are known as Boskone XVII D/B/A BoskLone, so next year will be Boskone XVIII. The name BoskLone was coined specifically to identify this one-time mixture of tradition, relaxation, and innovation.

Some of the Boskone changes which have taken place over the years include: The conception of the Skylark Award in 1965 and its first presentation at Boskone II in 1966; presentation of Boskone's first art show in 1970, (Boskone VII); the first local fan opera in 1972, (Boskone IX) which was also the first appearance of the Boskone book series; two track programming and the first costume party originated in 1974 (Boskone XI); a fannish play and Punday became Boskone regulars in 1977 (Boskone XIV); and attendance went from 66 at Boskone I in 1965 to 1900+ at Boskone XVI in 1979.

For BoskLone we have tried to retain as many of these 'Boskone' traditions as possible while eliminating the usual heavy workload they cause since many of our members are already heavily involved with Noreascon II. Though things have been changed/eliminated, we still anticipate that this year's BoskLone will create its own happy memories.

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
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
