he other side of this sheet will contain a report of any difficulties I may experience. OMPA should be honoured, in the knowledge that they will receive the first output of an immaculate and virginal machine.

As you can see, I've given the register a fairly tough & tricky job for a try-out. Then again, although I've done a good deal of dabbling with duplicator processes, I've never used a Roneo before. So I'll probably make a few errors on this for which the machine cannot be blamed.

Some difficulty I've already met in matching my spacing on the two stencils. This could be overcome by using the proper tracing plate for the job, but I currently do not have the spare cash for that.

Yes, it was easy to fit a sentence onto the "Y".

Well, that is page one done. I'm reasonably satisfied with the result. Most of the faults are mine - in fact, to be honest I imagine they're all mine. It is rapidly obvious that in spacing between "N" and "T" I missed a line, with the result that "TASY" is too high. And putting a rule down the side reveals that the first "S" and the "N" are in too far. One or 2 sheets are worse than the others, because I was playing with the register trying to get the best possible fitting. However, considering it took me exactly 9½ minutes to run 130 copies from both stencils, it ain't bad!

One hundred and thirty copies may seem a bit much for OMPA, but then I am sending this to FAPA also - I hope nobody minds, but I'm so far behind with my assorted affairs due to the move from Germany, and what not, that I'll be out on my FAPA activity requirement if I don't watch it. Hence a sheet like this will help to keep me in the running.

For the benefit of FAPA members, I might mention that OMPA stands for "OFF-TRAIL MAGAZINE PUBLISHERS ASSOCIATION", which is a new British organ—isation/similiar in purpose to, and modelled on, FAPA. Instignators of said assoc. are H.Ken Bulmer (President of the Assoc., and also known as a pro-author in these islands. He has an additional slight claim to fame as the High Nexus of Nirvana, the Unseen Fanzine); A.Vincent Clarke, for whom no introductory comment should be necessitipated; and C. R.
