Project is the official formation of a new N3F Committee for International Correspondence and Excannge or something of the sort, which will have as its function the encouragement, sponsorship, planning and, where necessary, monitoring of a program of correspondences, round robins, fanzines & prozine exchanges & correspondence between American fen and fen in non-English speaking countries of the world... WITH PARTICULAR ATTENTION TO THE SOVIFT UNION AND ITS ASSOCIATED COUNTRIES!

The desirability of such a program should be obvicus from a moment's thought, and IVE SOUNDED OUT THE U.S. STATE DEPARTMENT ABOUT IT with VERY ENCOURAGING RESULTS. They said the U.S. entered a scientific & cultural exchange with the U.S.S.R. in Jan. 1958 which provided for many similar (tho' largely weightier) exchanges, and that if sponsored by a "responsible, nationally recognized organization in the field of Science Fiction".. they'd examine and approve such a plan and assist its being officially approved by the U.S.S.R.... the only country that would require such official approval.

COSMIC Butterfly: - Business week has just min on ad of the American Bosch Arma Corp. thusly entitled. I think I'll use the theme of the pic as a coverant piece in a future ish of something or other. It is a type of spaceshir, that is powered by the use of solar energy to quote: - "Each of the fifty-foot parabolic mirrors in the vines concentrate the Sun's rays on a boiler at its focal point. Steam is developed, which drives a 200kw turbogenerator in the base. Cooled by frigid cuter space in heat diffusers, the steam reverts back to water and is pumped back to the boilers to be used over and over again - The current thus generated drives the main propulsion unit, an ion rocket in which powerful electric field accelerate charged particles, shooting them from the rear of the rocket exactly as the electron gun in your TV set bombards the percent, punlight, then, is the power source, whereas cesium is the propellant while the recoil thrust is relitively small, the weightless behicle is operating in a vacuum and the rush is enough to enable the Butterfly to reach interplanetary speeds. RITGFFIELD, Conn. (AP). Scientists are using radio-type energy to make simple life-forms obey commands. Tiny one-celled animals, such as paramecia and euglena, are forced to so in only in east-west direction when exposed to one particular frequency. A higher frequency makes them sudded by start swirming in north-south directions. -- Staphyl code bacteria exposed to another frequency line up like soldiers. EXPULSIONS.

Resume of letter from Faul Harold Rehorst: - March 12th., 1959.

The expulsion has not settled the issue, it merely brought out into the open, the actions of a distatorial directorate bound and determined to silence all thought-ful opposition, specially when this opposition takes a positive stand against communism. The expulsion is not final, for if the directorate refuse to reverse the exculsion, an appeal through Paul's zine, FROM THE BORS,'s MOUTH will be made. He assures me that his correspondence indicates that while many opposed his candidacy, they equally refuse to endorse the expulsion because of his honest efforts to speak out on issues that though controversial in nature, are within the limits of free speach and in accordance with the world situation. He gives assurances that the membership will reverse the decision, if it is forced to that extreme. He believes that no more than 20 would vote against his re-instatement is for fueds, well, the discussions, arguments, on the pro or con of the expulsion, he claims, will do the club more harm than any debate that could have been engendered by the proposals he has brought forward.

He contrasts his open and public approach to the problem with the secret manner in which the Directorate expelled him without preentation of charges, and/or giving him the opportunity of refuting the charges. One in the directorate has informed Paul that the petition taken up had nothing to do with their decision, and that it had few signers, save for the same ones, he claims, who have been screaming for his scalp since the Susan Mosher-Moolston fued of 1955

He claims that he will be back in NJF shortly. Friends of his will send him copies of all publications, including my publications. He claims he can be expelled in name only, and that his zine will keep his name before the membarship and that his huge personal correspondence will keep him up to date on current affairs. He claims that he will continue his WC work on the side, and that he will not held it

against me, my support of what he claims is a near-criminal action, once he's back in N3F officially.

(I tried to present Paul's view as much as they were as possible, without letting my own views colour the presentation. I asked Paul for permission to reprint his letter in full, but the present list of new members dictates that this issue be sent out without delay, so I tried to give a brief run-down of the letter- tah).

Ralph L'. Holland:-

Feb. 28th., 1959.

(This is also a resume, I did get permission fromRalph, but the length of the letter presents its full presentation, but, the parts presented here are unted almost exactly as sent to me - jah).

"I've been as busy as a one-armed paper hanger -- mostly on this Rehorst thing. The Directorate finally custed him -- for the second time. The first time was last fall, and the thing was dropped before it was ever officially reported. I will take the blame for dropping it at that time. I felt that Faul was actually a sincere Neffer, only a bit off-side on the "red" thing, and that his sledge-hammer technique might merely be his idea of political campaigning. I felt ouite certain that the membership would turn down his proposals (which they did) and that when he saw that no one (or very few, at least) were in favor of his policies, he might quiet down. But no go, so the new Directorate had to do the job over again, and this time I had to gree with them so did not try to get them to hold off. So, as of January lst, 1959, Rehorst is no longer a member of the NFFF. The vote of the Directorate was unanimous, has to be under the constitution.

Frankly, I would have given a lot if some other way could have been found to handle the situation. After all, Eaul is a sincere fan, and I don't actually think that he intends to do the NFFF any harm (altho he did do it a very great amount of harm), and finally, he has been a member since 1948. And so, altho I am the big bad wolf in Faul's letters now-days, I am sincerely sorry that things had to come to such a pass. But, as I told the members on at least two occasions, if any member threatens the good and walfare of the NFFF, it is my duty as Prexy to slap them down to the limit of my ability, even if they are my best friends. The Directorate did not name any specific acts of wrong-doing against him - they could ace no good reason for blackening his name unnecessarily -- as neither do I. So the charge and reason was merely general incompatibility -- that he just couldn't get along with other members.

The situation is that we have an aim and objective, as outlined in the Preabble to the Constitution, and members ought to at least aim their activities in the general direction of these in their club activities, that is. Shat they do outside of the club is none of my official business. To accomplish this, they have to be able toget along reasonably well with other members. Therecan, and must be, vigorous discussion and debate of fandom's issues -- but those taking part must stick to issues. Personalities, mud slinging, and attempts to blacken the character and integrity of their opponents by means of poison pen letters and irresponsible charges of illegal acts and contemptable motives are out. The same goes for criticism -any officer or member's acts or proposals may be criticized, but again the critic must refrain from personalities or character assassination. If they must fight, they will have to take their fight outside -- we don't want blocd all over our floor.

As regards Paul's anti-communist proposal -- I did not think it wise. I did not see where it was needed, since we already have an organization which is doing a fair to middlin' gob of watching reds here in the U.S. -- the F.B.I. - I could not see where it would do any good if we did get a red in our club -- they would have no objection to taking an oath and signing a statement saying that they were 500% loyal Americans -- lying and trickery is all part of their stock in trade. In spite of all this, however, I must point out that I did support Paul's right to bring it before the membership is he chose to do so. There are two ways this can be done under cur constitution - by having the firectorate propess such a limitation - marked of ship - or by submitting a membership petition. In either case, the proposal would have to go to a membership vote, since it would require an amendment to the Constilation to do it. I had secured legal advice on the subject to the effect that the Directorate bas power to reject any individual application for membership, but that they could not astablish a blanket requirement which is not in the Constitution. The Firectorate expressed themselves as being opposed to such a requirement. Hence they could not be expected to sponsor such an amendment. I therefore advised Paul that the only way he could get it before the membership bould be to have a petition signed, as provided in the Constitution. I sincerely hope that Paal can get his thinking straightened out some day, so that he will be willing to again turn his talents toward building the NFFF up instead of trying to to fight everyone in sight. If so, I will be many the first to propose that the Lirectorate then in power vote to remove his disability, so that he can be re-instated.

Until recently, I remained almost completely neutral in the disputes of the organization. I joined MSF during a dispute, have seen a for come and go, and remained out of them. I can no longer do this. I must state my position in such terms as to assure that no one can mis-interpret my position. I am not in an elected position, I am in an appinted position, but, I will give my views, and the gang of you can decide the next step. I will await your decision before I take the next step.

Largely because I has comparatively neutral. I was in on some of the doings on both sides, though I wasin the dark on a lot of things, only now coming out. But, during that time, I kept suggesting that the petition method be used, to find out what the membership wanted I did not think that merely making something a part of a political platform was sufficient for a real decision, since that was not sufficient authorization for a constitutional emendment.

Paul replied that he wasn't as ignorant as I seemed to think, that he knew show he was doing something legal or illegal, and that he would be the one to decide the method he would use (he claimed what he was doing was legal, and live never ourstioned that point) to achieve the goal he had set for himself. He assured me, before that he was retiring from the club polities, since he saw that the members obviously did not wort him in the executive, and that he was tired always being called to justify the legality of whatever he did.

The members of the WC are aware from the last issue of MENORITOR that the first mention of the expulsion came to me when I received the financial statement from Janie 'amb, and that I asked for more information. At the time, Paul had requested re-admission (he had been dropped proviously, at his own request), but I held up the confirmation until T could hear officially what the score was. Ralph Holland's letter came in response to that query.

I've maintained correspondence with Faul since then. I've given you a resume of the last letter I received from Faul, and I expect more letters to come from him. I have heard that Beck has resigned, and Ralph Belley has informed me that he has resigned, the resignations being confirmed by Janis Famb.

Here's how I stund: - I want someone to start using the constitutional sections to get what they want. I've admised in the latest letter, three petitions.

(1) That it be proposed that all present members, all future members, be requested to sign to the effect that they are not members of a communistic organization, are sympathetic too, have no intention of becoming a member of, any communistic organization and that the proposal be presented as a revision, amendment, or whatever one wishes to call it, of the constitution. At the same time:-

(2) A Petition calling on the Directorate to appoint someone else as the official editor of the TNFF, and that every effort be made to make sure that TNFF comes out as scheduled.

When these two have been settled, a third can THEN, and not before, be presented:-

(3) A request to the Directorate that since it has been shown that the constitution can be used demoncractically, that the expulsion of Paul Harold Rehorst be rescinded.

I was going to be more adamant in my views, but, as you will find elsewhere in this issue, there is a proposal before the membership, not an actual motion, but neverthless a proposal, to the effect that an Overseas correspondence committee be set up, with the specific intention of direct exchange of correspondence with Russian and Communistic sphere contract citizen with SF interest, that it has been presented to the U.S. states department, and that under the conditions named, the U.S. State Department is not only willing to support, but to help achieve the proposal.

Anyhow, when the three motions I we mentioned are brought up in the order named, I am willing to VOTE FOR ALL THERE. I will not sign a petition to any of them, except #3, and in the case of #3. I will only sign when I have seen that the other two have been disposed of.

Now, why should I, a member who is not in an elective position, be calling f or cartain actions on the part of other members, and upon the Directorate? Well, to sum it up, let us see.

In the first article of this series, we pointed out that every human being has, residing in his brain, a super computing machine of fantastic capacity. We discussed some of the amazing shoot incredible powers of this supercomputer, and explained that there were two basic reasons why the supercomputer is so little used, and indeed, is anknown to the average person. The first is the lack of scientific knowledge about how the supercomputer works and how to narness its powers. The second is the existence of <u>impedances</u> -- patterns of perception, feeling, thought, and action which greatly slow down and interfere with brain function. The existence of these impedances is also largely unknown -- and certainly few til now have appreciated their wast exient we also suggested a simple experiment for demonstrating the existence of this supercomputer.

in this article, we introduce the reader to synergetics tools. These are simple, easy-tolearn procedures for activating the supercomputer and applying its powers. They are used for two general purposes. The first is to promote synergy. The second is to eliminate impedances.

Synergetic tools are a bit like logic or mathematics, but a great deal easier to use. Each too consists of a set of operations, performed by the individual. These operations are simple mental or physical acts. Sometimes they are done in a definite order, or sequence. Sometimes, they are done simultaneously, in-a-flash.

It should be emphasized that these are precision tools. A certain amount of care and comron sense is required for their use. If they are so used, a definite flow of synergy is produced. The supercomputer turns on, and functions to a certain degree.

It should also be explasized that the repeated use of these tools is meeded for full effact to be achieved. Just using a synergatic tool once will produce some sinergy, but nothing compared to the synergy that is produced when the tools are used repeatedly. Everything that has been said about the fantastic powers of the superconduter has been based on what happens with the repeated use of synergetic tools. If these tools are used only once, or without care and commons sense - very little will happen.

But, if they are used repeatedly, with care and common sense — something amazing fill happen. The supercomputer turns on — but at first, no more than it has in the past. Then, it starts to function with a steadily growing efficiency. The indisidual is amazed at the lucidity of his thinking, how easy problems become, how quickly and abundantly ideas flow into his mind, how much more he gets done. This is the phenomenon we call "Overdrive" — an indescribably delightful experience. Most people have felt it on rare occasions. The synergetics, it becomes a common experience, and reaches new peaks as well as plateaus of sustained performance.

An important provise must be made here, however. Unforturately, most people have impedances This is in no way derogatory, it is simply a statement of fact. You do not realize how extensive these impedances are, until you have functioned in "Overdrive" for a while. Then, their presence becomes quite clear, and you realize how much more you could do, how tremendous your abilities would be, ware it not for these impedances. They cluiter up signal flow something fiere

Fortunately, synergetic tools exist for eliminating such impedances permabently. These will be described in later articles of this series Now let us consider a particular synergetic tool. This is the CENA sequence (pronounced "sadeh" sequence). This stands for four operations:-

Now each of these operations has a definite technical meaning in synergetics, which may dif

Consider means to formulate two or more possible courses of act ion. For example, you might fail read a book (b) go for a walk. The important points about the "Consider" operation are: (1) The possible course of action should be feasible actions you can readily do, that are not beyond your known capacilities, or that would not be blocked by circumstances.

(2) The possible courses of action should be considered without bias. Very often, you may have a preconceived preference for one action over unother; if so, this preference should be eluminated, and each action viewed afrash.

(3) At least two cossible courses of ection should be considered. This is important for allor operations of the CETA sequence. It also leads you to consider things you might othervise overlook.

Evaluate means to satisate the probable curvival value to you of the cossible courses of action you have formulated. Here, we are taking use of an important principle: the supercompeter is not like a calculating mechane, it is a part of a living organize, and its prime directive is to promote the survival of the organize. By evaluating in terms of survival value, therefore, you sill naturally tend to ansage the powers of the supercomputer.

Secondly, in avaluating, estimate not only the probable survival value to yourself alone, but also to other individuals or groups sho may be affected by the action. Here, the important desiratem is to promote symercy if feasible -- to promote the survival of others as well as yourself, and to impede the survival of no one if this can be avoided. (But don't secrifice nown survival just to avoid impeding others -- each person is responsible for his own survival. The aim here is maither selfishness or uncelfishness, but synergy.)

Third, the evaluation is an estimate take the best guess you can with the time and data svailable, but se prepared for this estimate being in error, and especially be ready to change course to correct error instantly also, don't take too much time in evaluation -- go on to Devision and Action

Decision means to select one of the courses of action on the basis of your evaluation.

Action means to follow the course of action decided upon.

The CERA sequence introduces precision and order into the decision anking procedures. It is a rational guidance cattern for of limits, the powers of the brain. Spangetics consists of the precise and skillful use of tools such as these, and may be regarded as a generalization of logic and mathematics. In logic on use rational coldance patterns(such as the syllogism) to trans consistant conclusions from a set of premises. In Eachematics, we use rational guidance patterns (such as the computative law in algebra) to colve croblems involving mathematical quantities and relations. In syncropoles we use rational guidance patterns for solving probables related to survival, and for activating and syncropoles involving the section of the supercomputer

The CEDA sequence, used by itself, produces intelligent rational decisions and actions; and it synergizes the functions of thought, secision making and action. But its true power is not revealed until is used <u>repeatedly</u>. To can guide our thought and action by a train of CHT, seouences: CFPA - CEDA - CEDA - etc. This production is called Tracking.

SYNERGETICS: Seth Johnson: - It got its start when some with an SF convention decided that Dianetics, which was the craze at the time, wasnot the answer. Actually, Synergetics consists of a variety of tools, or loaded questions and matheds of thought or approach

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ing things that serve to clear out theimpedances, or engrans, as Hubbard would call them, from the human psych. Two tools of Synergetics are B.A.M. and C.S.D.A.

THEME- TRUTH: Bruce Pelz: One of the most famous of the Sophists of ancient Greece, Georgias, based his philosophy on three premises: (1) There is no absolute Truth; (2) If there is, no one will be able to find it; and (3) If some do find it, he will never be able to communicate it to others. I think this may have some bearing on the treatment of wisdom. Georgias reasoned that all truth is relative and that the every man might find the Universal Truth, if there was one. He then reasoned that it would be impossible for that man to prove that his was a Universal Truth since it would be indistinguishable from the many other "truths" held by everyone else. And, each would be unwilling to believe that someone else has a Universal Truth, making his false.

WOM M: F. Zwicky: - There are countries where women don't use cosmetics, but not because they are pretty enough without them, it is because they can't afford them. And in such countries, women look like the things they are, overworked, underbathed, illiterates. There is more to beauty than more appearance, and American girls have it. There is poise that comes from the knowledge that they are individual human beings, there is education, there is the training of cleanliness and good grooming. There is freedom from false restrictions that prevent them from talking to men as equals. I've seen suropean girls and you can have them. The Sophis Lorens type are no more typical than are our movie Actresses.

COMMITTLE FOR INTERNATIONAL CORRESPONDENCE AND EXCHANGE. Exerpts from letter of April 10th., 1959.

I plan on getting out an all-membership questionnaire fairly soon to obtain a definitive analysis of the membership reaction.
