1994 race underway Deadline extended

It's not too late to vote in the 1994 Down Under Fan Fund race. The candidates are: Alan Stewart of Melbourne, Donna Heenan of Melbourne, Ron Clarke of Sydney and Lucy Sussex and Julian Warner of Melbourne. Ballots are enclosed.

Although early ballots were released with a postmark deadline of April 30, that deadline has been extended to May 25; ballots must reach us by May 31 (we will accept ballots until the later date.).

The winning fan(s) will receive DUFF funds toward a trip to North America and attendance at Conadian, the 52nd World Science Fiction Convention, Sept. 1-5, in Winnipeg, Manitoba. Winners are also charged with fund raising and administering the fund for two years after their trip, and are supposed to publish a report about their travels.

Nominations in this race were held open two weeks past the initially announced deadline due to a delay in the distribution of *DUFFacto* 1 in Australasia.

Any individual active in fandom for a year or more is welcome to cast a ballot. We don't claim to know everyone in fandom, so if you don't think we know you, please provide the name of somebody, not a candidate, who can vouch that you meet this criterion. Write-in votes will be counted.

As you can see from the financial reports later on, funds are short, especially in relation to the high cost of trans-Pacific travel. Money from both sides of the Pacific will be needed to support the trip of the 1994 delegate. Please - send an extra donation with your ballot.

1995 nominations open

Nominations are now open for the next DUFF race, which will help to send a North American to Thylacon, the 1995 Australian National Convention, June 10-12, in Hobart, Tasmania.

All nominating materials must reach an administrator by Sept. 14, 1994. Nominations may be delivered in person or by mail, electronic mail, fax or any other means at your disposal.

Candidates must be eligible as DUFF voters and must provide:

- 1) A 100-word platform.
- 2) A brief statement of any previous visits to the host continent and fannish contact while there. (For example: "My mother took me to Melbourne for two weeks in 1954, when I was 5. We didn't meet any fans." Or, "I was in the US for four months in 1978 and two in 1982, attended Iguanacon and Chicon IV, and visited fans in Los Angeles, Denver, Seattle, Cincinnati and Milwaukee.")
- 3) Five nominations from fans eligible to vote in DUFF: three from their own continent and two from the hosting one. (Couples can count as one or two, as they choose.)
- 4) A non-refundable bond of US\$25 or A\$40.

Trip reports still needed

The Southern California Institute for Fan Interests (SCIFI) is still offering US\$500 to DUFF for each trip report published. In addition, George Flynn writes that Massachusetts Convention Fandom Inc. (MCFI) is offering \$50 per completed report to the fund. George notes: "We set aside \$500 in 1981 from the Noreascon 2 surplus -- for both TAFF and DUFF -- and it still hasn't been used up!"

Perhaps those of you with long overdue reports would care to donate \$550 to the fund instead?

Dick and Leah are still willing to handle publishing for any laggard DUFF-report writers. All you need to do is type the thing up, and they'll take care of printing and distribution.

The offers extend only to *published* reports, so slide shows aren't eligible for the bounty. However, if anyone who did a slide report will lend the pictures to Dick and Leah along with a transcript of their talk, they'll take care of transforming it into a publication.

And yes, they are working on their trip report!

Double for DUFF

Once again, we urge fan organizations in the habit of splitting donations evenly between TAFF and DUFF, to up the percentage they send Down Under. Both funds deserve your support, but DUFF needs the money more.

Jeanne Bowman, North American TAFF administrator, reports that the Trans-Atlantic Fan Fund is pretty healthy right now, and that they plan to skip their 1994 race in order to send a North American to Intersection in 1995. So please consider the price of traveling between North America and Australasia, and for every \$1 you give TAFF, give DUFF \$2.

I see you are finally making official some of the biases inherent in both DUFF and TAFF. Besides the prohibition on second trips I suggest that you also point out to potential candidates that if they have a job (folk with real jobs aren't probably phaanish enough to go, middle class need not apply), they are probably too rich to be worth considering. They *must* be publishing a fanzine or they can forget it. They should move to an area with a large phaanish community are slim to none that they will have a chance. What you do in the SF community is immaterial unless the above conditions are met.

There is no "prohibition" on second trips. Art Widner had been to Australia twice before his 1991 DUFF trip. John Berry had also visited Australia before he won DUFF, and made that clear when he ran. However, many voters do take previous travel into consideration, so we are giving them the opportunity to make an informed choice.

Dick and I certainly consider ourselves "middle class" (is there any other class in America?) and we were both employed when we decided to run. As the fund has never, to my knowledge, had enough money to cover anyone's entire trip, I think it would difficult for any seriously destitute fen to go even if they won.

And it certainly not necessary to live in a faanish community to ψ in -- Chicago is anything but.

I've never been of the opinion that fan fund delegates have to be fanzine fans, and Australia would need to up its supply of them quite dramatically were such a criterion to be critical to DUFF. Indeed, see below for quite the opposite complaint.

I have asked a couple of fans to consider standing -pleaded with them is more accurate -- but I've been knocked back by both of them on the same grounds: "No, DUFF seems to want people who are party-goers and gladhanders, and that's not me." One of these people has been publishing fanzines for 30 years; the other has been around fandom for 15. I think it is a pity that that impression has been created.

It's also a pity because I think Australia needs a DUFF administrator who can walk and chew gum at the same time, which has been quite beyond the capacity of the last few.

The ideal DUFF delegate would be an inveterate fan who is: a prolific publisher with lots of contacts on both continents, a great writer, gregarious, a brilliant conversationalist, good in crowds,

an active con fan (most of the funding comes from cons or events at cons), indefatigable, industrious, well-organized, and a persuasive fund raiser with lots of time to devote to DUFF activities. But how many fans do you know who fit that description?

And truly, a stereotypically shy, socially awkward fanzine fan would have a rough time -- I'm not exactly a shrinking violet, but sometimes it took a real effort to be friendly and outgoing rather than hide in my room. (Fan fund winners who do hide are usually considered snobbish.)

I enjoyed meeting everyone, but I found our trip emotionally and physically exhausting, and we only went to a Swancon, not a Worldcon. One recent TAFF delegate was either in tears or moaning about how miserable she was on every occasion I saw her. It isn't necessary to be the life of the party, but someone who can meet crowds of people with equanimity is going to have a much better time and be better thought of than someone who can't. That's just how it is. DUFF is about meeting people.

On the care and feeding of fan fund delegates

From time to time I hear kvetching from people who claim they never get a chance to meet fan fund delegates --"they never come to our town," they say, or "there's too big a mob at the Worldcon" or "they spent all their time with their friends."

But further questioning usually discovers that the complainer did not actually go so far as to invite the delegate to visit their town nor make an effort to attend the panel or other event that most Worldcons feature the visiting delegates on. While I agree that it is difficult to meet people at Worldcons (and we hope to try to rectify that, in regard to the 1994 DUFF winner, with a party or other special event at Conadian), I can't emphasize strongly enough that the way to get to see the fan fund winner is to invite him or her to visit.

Most people feel kind of awkward inviting themselves over, and the fund does not provide enough money for hotels, so unless a delegate is invited to stay with somebody in a particular city, he or she may skip that one in order to go elsewhere. On the other hand, Dick and I arranged our itinerary specially to include Canberra because Kim Huett wrote with an invitation before the race was even over. Although you may live in a large fan center, or host a major convention in your city, don't assume that the winner will "naturally" visit there.

Even if you have no spare bed or have had no previous contact with the delegate, you can still extend an invitation. Be honest about your accommodations, but don't assume that just because you can't offer luxury, no one will want to visit you. Nor is lack of previous contact is grounds for holding off - part of the point of these funds is meeting new people. Some delegates may prefer the floor at the home of someone they've had previous contact with to more comfortable quarters with strangers, while others may be grateful for a comfortable bed even when they've never before heard of its owner. And even if you've had no previous contact with the winner, your invitation may be the only one from your town issued and the only way the delegate can visit your town.

So write, right away – as soon as you know who the winner is, or even beforehand. Airlines often require advance booking for the best rates, and if you wait until the delegate arrives in North America it may be too late to rearrange an itinerary. Dick and I will be happy to convey generic invitations to whoever wins, or you can contact the candidate of your choice directly.

And if you can't or don't want to offer the delegate a place to stay, you can still invite him or her or them out for a meal during a con or sightseeing in your town, or perhaps you can host a party in the delegate's honor. Once again, the earlier you issue such an invitation, the better.
