Introducing Little Nemo Robert Jennings


October 15, 1905 marked the first appearance of *Little Nemo in Slumberland*, one of the most influential comic strips ever published. Created by Winsor McKay, this full-page full color newspaper appeared in the Sunday *New York Herald* and dealt with the adventures of Nemo, a young boy, and his dream adventures. Rendered in detailed *Art Nouveau* style, the comic strip featured unique panel developments, a brilliant range of colors, and a surrealistic fantasy style that make it instantly captivating, particularly to adults.

The strip dealt with Nemo's dream adventures as he is summoned to meet the Princess of Dreamland to be her playmate. Constant problems develop along the way, and the page always ended with Nemo waking up, sometimes by falling out of bed, sometimes by making so much restless noise that Nemo's parents wake him to ask what the problem was.

It took a long time following many months of story lines before Nemo was actually able to meet the Princess. His quest was often interrupted by Flip, a green faced, cigar smoking clown who was determined to thwart Nemo's plans. As the story progressed Flip became Nemo's friend, but his bungling and rude behavior often led to Nemo waking up at a critical point in the weekly adventures. Several years later the pair were joined by an African Imp, who was mute, but whose rambunctious behavior always caused trouble for Nemo.

The art style, the fantastic adventures, the visual symbolism and the whole surrealistic tone of the feature made it an immediate hit with the readership of the New York Herald and propelled its creator to international fame.

Born in either 1870 or 1871, Winsor McKay was an exceptional artist who developed his artistic skills and focus at a very young age, despite the efforts of his parents to guide him into a business education and a career in retailing. McCoy could draw very fast, and had an almost photographic memory which enabled him to draw scenes and faces he had only briefly seen. He drew portraits of customers at dime museums, carnivals, and sideshows, graduating to doing posters, advertising, promotional flyers and anything else involved with art. He married young; to a fourteen-year-old girl he had met and fallen in love with at first sight while he was drawing portraits at a sideshow. They had three children. His young son Robert became the model for Nemo.



After several years of skipping around the north eastern part of the country involved in many types of art jobs, McCay landed a staff position at the *New York Herald* in 1903.

McCay did all kinds of art for the *Herald*, including editorial cartoons, newspaper sketches, and advertising along with illos for their features and fiction sections. He had created several comic strips for the New York Herald before he invented Little Nemo. The most successful of these were "Little Sammy Sneeze", an innovative strip that features the bizarre consequences of a younger's inability to control when and where he might sneeze.

"The Dreams of a Rarebit Fiend" that followed was even more popular, offering panels of unusual fantasy adventures set in the real-life world. When the protagonist woke up, he always attributed his dream to having eaten Welch Rarebit before bedtime. "The Dreams of a Rarebit Fiend" laid the groundwork for *Little Nemo*. "Rarebit Fiend" continued running at the same time *Nemo* was being published, only ending in 1911 when McCay left the *Herald*.



At the turn of the 20th century the *New York Herald* had the best color publishing processes in the country, and McCay made full use of them to add remarkable mixes of color to his *Little Nemo* comic strip. He personally handled all the color separations and provided detailed notes on exactly how and where different screen and overlays were to be used to produce the exact color effects he wanted.

McCay was a restless creative genius who used his artistic abilities to create acts for vaudeville, and was a significant pioneer in the development of film animation, doing almost all the artwork himself. His most successful animation was *Gertie the Dinosaur*, which used a rear-projected film animation of a Brontosaurus that McCay interacted with in his on-stage vaudeville act.

Over the following years he produced many additional animated films, including one based on *Little Nemo*, but they often failed to return the cost of making them due to erratic distribution or dated subject matter. For example, his animated film about the sinking of the *Lusitania* was initially very successful, but as world news events moved on the public quickly lost interest in the film.


Viewing the prodigious amount of artwork he produced, as well as his work in animation, and his vaudeville and special stage acts one wonders when the guy had time to sleep.


In 1911 McCay left the *Herald* for the Hearst newspaper *The*

New York American, at a much larger salary. He took the characters from Little Nemo with him. The Herald held the copyright on the strip, but McCay successfully sued and retained the rights to the actual characters. At the American the strip was titled In the Land of Wonderful Dreams. Under that title the feature ran until 26 July 1914.

The Hearst editors were more demanding than the people at the *Herald* had been. McCay drew lots of editorial cartoons, often expressing sentiments he did not agree with. The editors demanded he stop appearing in vaudeville shows except around the New York city and immediate vicinity, claiming it interfered with the quality of his work for the paper. When McCay objected, Hearst boosted his salary to make up for the loss in income. Hearst wanted McCay to appear at the office every day to get assignments for the daily editorial cartoons and work with the other members of the newspaper art staff. McCay did not get along with some of that art staff or a few of the editorial staff who had little respect for mere artists. The Hearst editors were furious when they discovered McCay was spending a lot of his time at home working on more animated films, and gave him additional advertising assignments to help fill up his time.

McCay left Hearst in 1924, reportedly because he did not receive a promised \$5,000 bonus. He returned to the *New York Herald Tribune* who welcomed him with an even more generous salary and immediately made plans to resume *Little Nemo* in its Sunday papers. Unfortunately, McCay seems to have lost interest in Nemo.





He continued to be fascinated by animation, and with vaudeville in which he invested most of his time. The revived *Little Nemo in Slumberland* still used innovative colors but the panels were laid out in solid blocks, the same every single week, and the stories were more pedestrian, with Nemo himself often an observer rather than the focus of the feature, and there was no continuity story plots. The public response was lackluster, and the feature was discontinued in early January 1927. Because of the lack of interest McCay was able to buy the rights to *Little Nemo* from the *Herald* for one dollar.

In 1928 McCay rejoined the Hearst *New York American* staff, at an even higher salary, and with more freedom. The paper was interested in using his art talents to illustrate hot-topic news features where photographs might not be available, or even allowed. One of his big successes in that area was his realistic drawings of the scene of the Lindbergh kidnapping made from his visual observations. No photographers were allowed at the crime location, but McCay and Hearst's son Bill had arrived before the police declared a news blackout and erected a media barricade.

In 1929 an executive for the American Tobacco Company offered McCoy a contact to draw magazine and newspaper ads for a major cigarette ad campaign they were planning, promising him a payment "in excess" of the total yearly salary he was receiving from the *American*. When McCay informed the paper of the deal they immediately objected to his participating, pointing out that his contract specifically forbade him from taking on any outside work. That executive decision lasted less than a week. The representative from American Tobacco stormed the *American* offices and told the editor he would pull all of the American Tobacco advertising from all the Hearst papers unless McCay was allowed to do advertising work for them. A signed contract was speedily drawn up specifically allowing McCay to do work for American Tobacco.

McCay had enjoyed continued good health for his whole life, but suffered a cerebral embolism on 26 July 1934 while at home. He died a few hours later with his wife and family at his bedside. Thruout his life McCay had lived a lavish life style. The amount of money in his estate was far smaller than his family had been led to expect. His widow sold their home in the early 1940s and was living with their daughter in the mid-1940s.

Young Robert was an artist in his own right, but was certainly not as talented or as prolific as his father. After Winsor McCay's death Robert tried to revive Nemo in syndication using old art proofs and new artwork, but found no success. In the late 1930s and 1940s he was working as a comic book artist at the Harry "A" Chesler syndicate where he turned an updated *Little Nemo* into a comic book feature for assorted comic books contacted thru or published by Chesler. At one point he was cleaning out his home and offered full page artwork his father had done for the original Nemo strip to anybody at the studio who wanted it, for free. Nobody wanted it. He threw the art away.

Thru the years other artists and creators have tried to relight the spark of genius that *Little Nemo* created with new cartoon strips, animated movies, TV specials, juvenile cartoon shows, picture books, and more. None of them have been particularly successful. Yet the long-term influence of *Little Nemo* on the world of art, and particularly on the world of fantasy literature and comic strip/comic book art cannot be underestimated. Vast numbers of artists and writers have specifically named McCay and Little Nemo as one of their most important life influences.

Today all of the *Little Nemo* comic strips from the 1905-1914 period have been reprinted in handsome hardback graphic novel format. But fans do not have to spend a single penny to experience this remarkable work of genius. The GoComics website offers the original *Little Nemo* comic strips for free, posted every week along with a wide variety of other comic strips both new and old. If you are not familiar with the feature, check out their weekly offerings, and discover for yourself why *Little Nemo* will always be considered one of the most influential comic strips ever created.

They are energetic, quirky and very, very funny. They are writers, artists, con runners, Worldcon bidders and fan fund winners. Join us and learn more about their secret origins, fannish impact and what they are doing now.

Dear Mindy:

You had pneumonia, and you're still pubbing your ish? Respect!

You mention "there are plenty of fandoms, conventions, and everything in between ..." When I became involved, people talked about "fandom" as if it were one thing, but in the 1980s you could already see different interest groups fissioning off. I am resigned to this; the sheer population growth in fandom meant that people would meet their social needs more easily in single-interest, rather than general-interest groups. But I miss fannish fandom as it used to be.

There are some serious drawbacks to the change. There seems to be no regular flow of fans coming into fanzine fandom; presumably fans now meet their need to communicate with blogs and social media. There seem to be few general-interest conventions in Canada now, and rather fewer even in the United States than there are single-interest conventions. This could represent a difficulty for fan funds, which help fans from one continent visit fans on another continent, mostly at conventions; how many anime or furry or comics fans know anything about fan funds? I am already facing this difficulty in Canada, trying to maintain the Canadian Unity Fan Fund - intended to assist fans from one half of the country to see fans in the other half - as I have difficulty finding an interested convention where a delegate might go. And then there are the issues with getting out the vote, for fan-voted SF awards.

So, I'm thinking a lot about motivation and promotional factors.

Are you getting my personalzine, *The Obdurate Eye*? The September issue includes a 2024-2025 calendar of Canadian and Pacific Northwest upcoming conventions.
