P RESIDENT S 'MESSAGE

Message is an appropriate word. You get a lot of age when I become president. I feel confident that FAPA will be an even greater mess by the time there's a new president.

To begin with, my election has been attended by fraud, deceit and foul play. I have been elected under false premises, while I remained silent in full knowledge that my campaign organization was spreading big lies. To wit, I was touted for the office of president as one who had never held the post. This undoubtedly caused the creation of this massive outpouring of support. Would I have received sixteen times as many votes for president as Terry Carr, if I'd been man enough to come out and admit that I was FAPA president so long ago that I was still middle-aged at the time?

Moreover, I have not yet been formally notified of my election. All I know is what I read in Bob Pavlat's postmailing. We know from several FAPA precedents that no FAPA officer in the grand tradition heeds published statements, but instead waits for someone to write him a personal letter containing the same information. To get revenge for this indignity, I intend to remain silent for an indefinite period on the question of when I shall serve my term as president. The FAPA constitution, as far as I can decipher it, doesn't specify when a newly elected president begins and ends his term of office, so I suppose that I can take my time about deciding it for myself. If public relations experts can put such a false face on the various branches of the service, then I surely can strive to persuade some rich, red new blood that FAPA really isn't fandom's answer to the Over The Hill Gang.

I'm also going to make sure that we have candidate's for next year's election. If nobody files for a given office, I'll start persuading some people to run for it, and if persuasion is useless I'll resort to forgery. Be alert, or better yet, don't

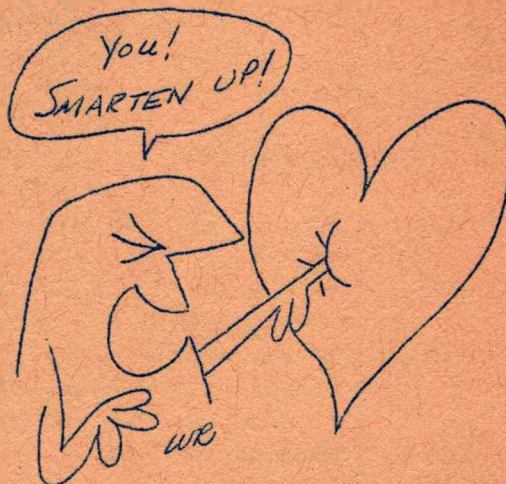
wait until next fall. You can file today for any office in FAPA by writing to the secretary-treasurer, for the constitution doesn't limit people to any specific time for filing candidacies.

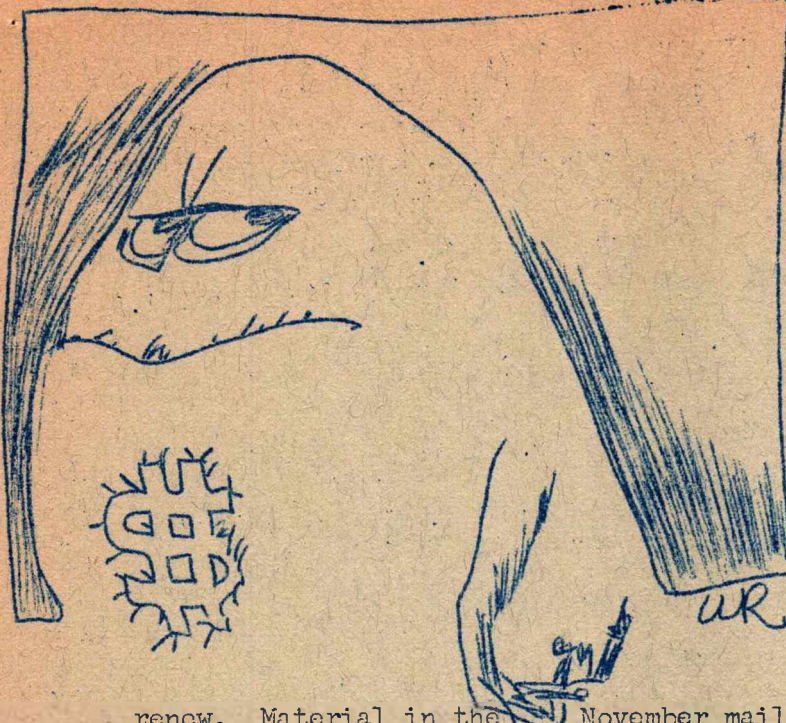

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It's a good thing that the treasury looks healthy, because costs are certainly going up. My move to Walnut Creek is not only having an effect on my costs of living but FAPA's as well.

The big increase is in jiffybags for the mailings, which have come to be an absolute "must" as far as the bundles are concerned. (I wouldn't even take the job if the OE had to go back to brown paper and twine!) I called all of the stationery stores that I could find in the phone book and got prices

ranging from 35¢ each with a 10% discount for orders over a dozen, to a low of some \$21.73 per 100 including tax. I was paying roughly half this amount in Bakersfield, although I must admit that I always had a sneaking suspicion I was getting them at wholesale due to a slight mix-up. I was always reluctant to ask, but now I guess the answer is clear enough.

You'll note the new covers...blue on blue, this time, on considerably lighter paper stock. I had them printed for nothing the first time, using Standard Oil machines, but this time I don't have the access in San Francisco that I did in Bakersfield. However, I don't think it should be up to FAPA to pay for my own special brand of covers for the FA, so I am paying for the printing out of my own pocket and all FAPA is paying for is the paper.

Next, apparently postage rates will be going up again in the near future. I hope I don't have trouble up here in breaking in a new post office. Bakersfield didn't give me a bit of trouble with my special fourth class rate, and there was an outlying substation into which I dumped all of the bundles late Sunday night, leaving no clerk to argue with. But here I haven't seen any outlying box big enough to hold a mailing so I suppose I will have to haul them to one of the main post offices for mailing. Here's hoping I don't run afoul of an extra-officious bureaucrat.

That leads to the dock strike. When I was buying the stamps for the mailing the other day, the PO had a sign posted to the effect that they were not taking mail for foreign countries other than Mexico and Canada because of the dock strike. This will affect 4 Aussies, 6 Swedes, 3 Limeys and one bogus Frog. (Or, at least, it would have when I was planning for the mailing, before the S-T report came in the mail. Whatever happened to the Swedish contingent? If they were dropped for non-response to the FA, Bill, you might have to give special consideration to their postal problems.) These bundles and FAs will be mailed as soon as the strike lifts, of course, but who knows when that will be?
