NO PREFERENCE? A couple of people have asked me why there is no No
Preference (NP) option on the current GUFF ballot forms.

There is a easy answer to this inquiry, which is that NP has bever actually appeared on a GUFF ballot form, so there is nothing new with this race. But the absence of NP has never stopped some people writing it in.

On the other hand, there does seem to be some confusion about NP. Some fan fund administrators have counted them in as votes, others putting them aside when tallying up the votes. Justin Ackreyd, for instance, is in the former camp: in the 1987 vote he counted in NP and then eliminated it as if it is a vote. (In fact, at least one person went from a NP 'vote' to preferring one of the candidates. Strikes me as an Odd State of Affairs.) I, however, take the alternate view, that NP is not a vote but a donation to the fund. A NP voter is supporting the fund but is abstaining from the actual vote. If someone can't decide between the candidates or feels they don't know enough about the candidates to make an informed choice, then NP is for them.
