Good work with crayolas? I've actually seen one gorgeous interplanetary abstract done in crayolas. I mentioned crayolas & dimestore watercolors to Freeman, because he had limited time & money, & wanted to see if'n he did have talent before deciding to spend effort developing same. Crayolas &cheap watercolors are good enough for that purpose, whereas I'd recommend plastic paints for you. They would cost \$5 to \$10 for an initial set, of course, but would be well worth it. I am familiar with ANYONE CAN DRAW! by Zaidenberg. Check out an armload of artbooks from the library (no one Beginner's Art Book will cover all the necessary data). Your first exercise is to tell me three major things wrong with Zaidenberg's illustrations.

I said Scn. demonstrably raises I.Q. and then discussed how I.Q. is related to intelligence and how I.Q. testing is limited in scope. I didn't claim that Scn. would produce Einsteinian geniuses.
