# Minutes of the SunCon 91 Business Meeting

## Prepared by Jack R Herman

Held in the Burke and Wills Rooms, Gateway Hotel, Brisbane, Sunday 31st March 1991 at 10:30 am.

PRESENT: Jack R Herman (Chair) and 45 members.

### 1. MINUTES.

Roger Weddall (Secretary of Danse Macabre Business Meeting) informed the Meeting that the Minutes were unavailable, probably in the possession of the Meeting Chair, Mark Loney.

### 2. MOTIONS.

(a) Ian Nichols moved and Jonathan Strahan seconded: "That, due to the unconstitutional nature of the Australian SF ('Ditmar') awards this year, to wit that there were six categories, not five, as provided

that there were six categories, not five, as provided for by the Consitution, the category 'Best Fannish Cat' be declared a 'Special Award of SunCon'."

Roman Orszanski moved and Eric Lindsay seconded a foreshadowed motion:

"That, in view of the category nominating and voting process in 1991, this Business Meeting recognises that (1) there were faults with the process and (2) too many Australian SF ('Ditmar') Awards were given and recommends that future Australian Conventions comply with the Constitutional limits."

After detailed discussion of the two motions, the substantive (Nichols/Strahan motion) was carried overwhelmingly (c. 37 to 8) & the foreshadowed motion lapsed.

(b) Dave Luckett moved and Jonathan Strahan seconded:

"That this Business Meeting believes that the actions of the 'SunConDitSubCom' in the selection and nomination procedure for the Australian SF ('Ditmar') Awards categories and in the choice of the shape and form of the Award trophies were against the spirit and tradition of the Awards and expressed a contempt for them and for fandom in general, and that the Subcommittee should be censured."

Diane de Bellis moved and James Allen seconded an amendment which would have the effect of adding the words, '...and spanked' to the end of the motion.

After another lively debate in which much was made of the process whereby the categories and nominations for them were held simultaneously and wherein many fans supported the traditional shape (black monolith mounted on native wood) for the Awards, the amendment was overwhelmingly defeated and the original motion passed by a large majority (c. 38 to 7).

#### 3. BIDS FOR THE 1993 NATCON.

The Meeting heard bids presented by Dave Luckett on behalf of PERTH IN 93 and by Eric Lindsay (assisted by Roman Orszanski) on behalf of MEDLOW BATH IN 93 (OR SOMETIME). Question were asked from the floor to both Bids and a vote for the Site of the 33rd Australian SF Convention was, then, taken. PERTH IN 93 was selected unanimously.

Dave Luckett announced that the con would be called SwanCon 18 and would be held at Easter 1993 (8-12 April) at the Ascot Inn in Perth with TERRY PRATCHETT as Guest of Honour and CRAIG HILTON as Fan Guest. The theme will be Apocalysee Wowl. Currently memberships are available for \$40 (attending), \$20 (supporting). The Committee address is PO BOX 318, NEDLANDS 6009.

### 4. GENERAL BUSINESS.

Jeremy Byrne moved and (by tradition) Jonathan Strahan seconded:

"That the Business Meeting recognises and acknowledges that blame for the non-attendence of Harlan Ellison at SunCon 91 in no way rests with Mr Ellison and that the Meeting endeavours to communicate that aknowledgement to Mr Ellison."

The motion was carried without dissent.

The Meeting closed at 11:40 am.

# A SunCon Report

Thursday we checked in to the Gateway Hotel, and entered convention mode. The con started quietly, and continued the same way. In the end it was a reasonably pleasant relaxacon. Patrick Tilley was an OK Guest of Honour, especially considering that it was made apparent to him at the opening ceremony that only about half-adozen of the attendees had actually read anything he had written!

I think that the following high(low?) lights might sum up the formal part of the convention fairly well:

Roger Weddall was (according to the program) to chair a 'pun panel' immediately after the opening ceremony. No-one told Roger. James [Allen] and Danny [Heap] from the MSFC contingent co-chaired an off-the-cuff substitute, which resulted in quite a few fake Roger Weddalls walking around the Con over the following days. Roger turned up on Saturday.





The Masquerade rehearsal (Saturday, midday) was cancelled when no-one entered. The Masqerade itself, on Sunday night, was rescued by the efforts of Nick Stathopoulos (MC) and the MSFC contingent (particularly Danny Heap) who provided the audience with not so much a Masqerade as several (well-received) comedy skits.

The Fan Olympics, the sole program item on Monday morning, just didn't happen. No entrants at all. A total lack of organisation.

And then, of course, there were the Ditmars. Congratulations to ANZAPAns Bruce Gillespie (Fan Writer & Atheling) and Ian [Gunn] (Fan Artist). And, I suppose, to Typo (represented at the Con by Roger) who won 'Best Fannish Cat', an award retrospectively declared by the Business Meeting to have been a 'Special Award of the Convention' rather than a Ditmar per se. That award, and the design of this year's awards (Stuffed Cane Toads??!!?) provided the subject of several discussions into the wee small hours of Sunday morning, as those fans who either had a different concept of humour to that displayed by the awards sub-committee, or a total lack of any sense of humour, sharpened their knives in preparation for Sunday's Business Meeting. But more of this in the next issue of THYME...

And yet, for all of this, I had a good time. It was an enjoyable con, just not what is normally expected of the NatCon. And certainly not a good way to generate interest and involve neos in fandom.

# Modest Proposals and Ships That Pass in the Night

The Foundation has received the first of what may (or may not) be a considerable number of forms espousing 'A Modest Proposal' for a global Australian fannish newsletter. The source of this proposal is (Eric Lindsay tells TI) Roman Orszanski. In the course of conversation with Eric, it developed that the current idea is not so much a 'regular newsletter' as a periodical information sheet. But here is the text of the 'Modest Proposal':

## 'A Modest Proposal To Improve Communications Within Fandom

'Fandom is being increasingly Balkanised. There seems little flow of information between the various 'fandoms'. Something must be done to improve the situation and encourage flow of information between these various groups. Here is our proposal.

'We suggest a regular newsletter, distributed throughout clubs, shops, meetings and fannish groups—in short, wherever fans and potential fans gather—could provide the vehicle for the spread of information and the exchange of news.

'For this to happen, we require that a group or individual within each state or region take responsibility for the collection and forwarding of information to a central editor.

'Beyond this, we require that this central editor produce and organise the distribution of the newsletter through whatever means should prove appropriate (rail, mail, electronic means etc) back to the regions, where local distribution would take place.

'We envisage that this newsletter would take the form of a FREE Broadsheet (at least initially), the production costs of which would be borne by grant subsidy or sale of advertising.

'It seems to us that the Australian Science Fiction Foundation is the ideal body to launch and administer this project. As the Foundation produces a newsletter already (THE INSTRUMENTALITY) it would be natural for it to develop to fill this role.'

The foregoing proposal has not yet been considered by the ASFF Committee and so an official response is not available at this time. This limits my response. However, the ASFF is and has for some time been aware of the gap in news coverage that the departure of the fannish news magazine THYME would cause. It is also aware of the need to improve dissemination of information between as well as within the various fandoms. The changes in this and the previous issues of THE INSTRUMENTALITY reflect preparation for the ASFF to take on a more direct role in the spread of news, if necessary.

This preparation is divorced from the ideas in the 'Modest Proposal', which, as you will see from the sample sheet Eric sent us and which we have included at the back of this TI, is both wider-spreading but also more limited than a news magazine. It cannot replace THYME.

Some Committee members (acting privately) have approached the current *THYME* editorship regarding taking up the production of *THYME* after the current team step down. At present, it seems that this will happen. There is also a proposal on the agenda of the next Committee Meeting that the ASFF take on the production of *THYME*. TI could then be attached to the back of *THYME* for distribution to members and others, just as has been happening in the last year.

These are the proposals currently under investigation. The solution may be one of these, none of these, or a modified version of one of these. When the Committe has discussed the matter and made a decision, the decision will be reported in TI. We hope that this satisfies your queries in the interim.

# **Editorial Commentary:**

Mark Loney has advised 77 that the Minutes of the Dense Macabre Business Meeting were typed up and distributed last year. Included in the distribution were copies sent to SunCon 91, SynCon 92, and Jack R Herman.

The decision to declare 'Best Fannish Cat' a 'Special Award of SumCon 91' rather than a 'Ditmar' should be examined carefully. It has extensive ramifications. Nor is it clear whether the SunCon Business Meeting had the authority to make such a determination. Consider the following:

(a) A precedent has been established for retroactive alteration of the Ditmar Awards by the Business Meeting.

(i) This alteration may strip any category of the 'Ditmar' title.
(ii) The Business Meeting can overturn, after the fact and without recourse by the voters, the democratic and legitimate decisions of the Ditmar voting process.

(b) The Constitution of the Australian SF Convention explicitly grants the Business Meeting the authority to select the sites for future NatCons and to amend the Constitution. The administration of the Ditmars is explicitly vested in the Committee of the current NatCon. Interference in the Ditmars by the Business Meeting is not sanctioned in the Constitution.


