EXPLETIVE -- (Bjo) "It's no use when you can't grumble you know."

RABANOS RADIOACTIVOS -- (Patten) It's not so much that amateur comics are a waste of time for the publisher as that they waste a reader's time. Professional stuff by people like Charlatan (and at times DC) is unreadable; so how can you expect an amateur strip to be any good? The ones I've seen (mostly browsed at out of your collection at odd moments) are characterized by extremely poor artwork and lousy dialog. I'll admit that they sometimes show imagination not present in pro stuff, and clever use of a cliffhanger situation, but they still look like crud to me. (reference material includes Star Studded Comics and several others which titles I don't remember). As for satire strips, to my mind the best ones don't concentrate on satirizing the actual comic book, but use the comicbook as a vehicle for some other satire. God Comics was an illustration of this as was Tower Comics and my own SFPA-Fen (with art by Staton). Help's Wonder Warthog is an example of a pro satire strip which is fairly successful. Bill's strip is moderately amusing, but suffers from lack of depth, being a satire on Thor alone. Even the great EC-Mad comic satires rang in outside topics to make fun of, although they stand as the best example of comic satire for its own sake. Other enjoyable comicstrip satires which come easily to mind are Bjo's Actifan Comics, Supersquirrel, "T.C" and the ones TeW, Reiss and Stewart did in Void, all of which have fannish motifs. Frankly, I can't think of one serious amateur comicstrip which approaches any of the above as far as its ability to entertain is concerned ... you'll have to take me on a deeper tour of the comic fmz to find the excellent ones.
