Copies of the Fanzine Activity Achievement Award final ballot are enclosed. If you were active in fanzine publishing of any sort last year you are probably eligible to vote. You can vote even if you did not nominate. And you may vote in all categories on the final ballot. Please support these peer awards with your vote and donations (\$1 if you did not nominate). Deadline is Aug. 1. Awards will probably be presented sometime at Iguanacon this year.

HUGOS

540 Hugo nominating ballots were received. The spread in each category was 95 to 25 novel; 104-160 novella; 49-13 novelette; 82-11 short story; 338-8 dramatic presentation; 55-31 pro artist; 92-29 pro editor; 53-15 amateur magazine; 42-10 fan writer; 23-14 fan artist. Non-Hugos: John Campbell Award 36-12; Grand Master 56-12; Book-Length Fantasy 96-14.

According to the committee, there was some foulup with foreign nomination ballots. Even though they were mailed in time they were not received. The Iggycon wishes to apologize to its out-of-U.S. members. I don't know what the problem is, but Worldcons seem to have this difficulty every year. I hope future con committees learn to send out ballots early, and mail foreign ballots letter mail/air mail. Final ballots will be sent out in PR4 which should be in the mail by now. PR4 will be sent airmail out-of-U.S. Only members of Iguanacon will be eligible to vote in the final ballot. Attending memberships are \$20 until 7/1, then \$25; supporting are \$7 at all times. (Editor's Note: This is probably the last time I'm going to sound off about the Hugos, but I just can't resist the opportunity. The above results show the poor voting for the Fan Hugos. In my opinion it is time to abolish them. LOCUS & SFR are not amateur amateur magazines. DON-O-SAUR used to be worthy of a nomination, but a couple of thin issues last year were not worthy of nomination. That leaves only JANUS and MAYA which I voted for 1. and 2. Where are MYTHOLOGIES, SIMULACRUM, MOTA, SPANISH INQUISITION or others? Fan Writer? What a farce - Charles Brown? Are you kidding? Geis? Thompson for a few slim fanzines? Susan Wood's fan writing has been declining in the past few years and I really think other writers were better choices, but she is certainly more deserving than the aforementioned. That leaves only Don D'Ammassa, who has and does deserve the award. Fan Artist? This is really sad. Where are Shiffman, Streff, Schirmeister, Taral, Carter? Foglio had only a few illos published last year, Gommol's work is good but only appears in JANUS, Canfield and Shull are great but haven't been very active recently, Gilliland as always is prolific and good.

Seriously people, doesn't this make you mad! Do something! Or in another couple of years STARLOG will be getting Best Fanzine (Amateur Magazine, the title will be different next year), Charlie Brown will win Best Fan Writer, and Phil Foglio will end up with as many undeserved awards as Tim Kirk has. This whole thing really makes me sick.

As for the non-Hugos, they make me mad. Where do these awards come from? Mhy do the Worldcon committees let themselves in for these? The Worldcon constitution only provides for awarding of Hugos and some special committee awards (non-Hugos). Now the Campbell and Gandalf awards are being awarded on a regular basis. The Worldcon has to take the time and money to count votes, it may pay for trophies, I don't know if it does. It lends its prestige to these awards, and people are beginning to confuse them with the legitimate Hugos. Who, except perhaps winning authors, needs these proliferating awards? Now a book-length Gandalf has arrived. Who arranged that? Will we see a short story Gandalf, a novelette, a best fantasy artist? These awards ought to be given out in conjunction with the World Fantasy Convention or some other group, not the Worldcon. Why should the Hugos be diluted by their presence? What will happen if a fantasy or science fantasy work ends up as both a Gandalf and Hugo contender? Why should the Worldcon members have to pay to support these awards?

All in all, let's get rid of these things. Would someone like to propose such a motion at Iguanacon? (I probably won't be there). Or are you all too apathetic to care!

IGUANACON NEWS

As mentioned last issue, the Iggycon committee has had some difficulty. Greg Brown has now resigned. He was put on a 3 week probation and resigned instead after a couple days, all of this after it was learned that he had never signed contracts with the hotels. Tim Kyger is back in Phoenix and he is the new chair. The central committee now consists of Kyger (chair and publications), Bill Patterson (publications), Carol Hoag (registration), Jim Corrick (programming and Hugo sub-committee), Curt Stubbs (jack of all trades and hotel liason). The Webberts (treasurers) have between them 1 vote on money matters and on central committee votes. A contract has been signed with the civic center and the final hotel contracts are being written (basically just a few minor details have to be written into them).

The 3rd progress report is now out. It was put together last December and much of the information on programming is out of date. It was delayed at the printers. The 4th PR should now be in the mail. It will include the final Hugo ballot and the 1980 site selection ballott. As far as I know, only Boston and Baltimore have serious bids. I support Boston.

Czech author Nesvadba won't be able to come to the con. People who've contributed money should write Iguanacon if they want their money back; that is, people who contributed to the fund to bring Nesvadba over. (I got a call the other day from Alan Bostick, he's now helping with Iguanacon. I made some notes, but I can't find them. Woops. Well, the major thing he mentioned that I haven't said is that several names were mispelled in PR4, and Iggycon wishes to apologize to those persons whose names were mispelled. Sorry I can't tell you who they were without my notes, but you know who you are. Sorry folks. -LeB)

Some problems have arisen in membership processing. Due to

great influx of memberships, etc., supporting members of Seacon who were also pre-supporting members and who should, therefore, be attending members, have been receiving membership cards marked SUPPORTING. To avoid disappointment and to enable the hotel rooms to be booked before the general holiday season booking rush, it is essential that the forms be returned promptly. If you want to receive PRs, vote for the Hugos, etc., you should get a supporting membership now. If you think you'll be going to Seacon, get your attending membership now. Leigh Brackett died on March 18 of cancer. Writer, editor, script writer, widow of Edmond Hamilton, Ms. Brackett in recent months worked on the script for the STAR WARS sequel. She did finish the rough script before her death, and presumably it will be used as the basis for the movie.

Postal rates are going up again, probably to 15¢ 1st class at the end of May. There is also talk of charging a surchare on oddly shaped envelopes and letters. This could effect those of us who fold fanzines and mail them, so you should check with your post office.

Electronic Stencils: I will continue to do electronic stencils for fans after KARASS folds. But I've had to increase rates because of postal and material cost increases. For U.S. and Canada rates are now \$1.50 each for 1 to 4 pasteups (electrostencils) plus \$1 for postage and handling. Five or more stencils at a time will cost \$1.50 each, including postage. Out of North America fans should write for rates. Pasteups should be done on plain, thin white paper using rubber (paper) cement only, do not use scotch tape. I use 9-hold Gestetner headed stencils and I'll corflu out extraneous lines and dots unless otherwise instructed. Image area is 8 1/2 x 14, so if you are doing a pasteup of many illos to be cut and pasted into regular stencils, you can do a larger pasteup and save money. Write me if you have any questions. I will normally return the stencils within 1 week and will use 1st class mail.



Margaret Brundage, artist whose work appeared in Weird Tales, died in late 1976. Bob Juanillo, fan/pro artist, died Dec. 27. Bill Ggante, Toronto fan, died recently.

MEDIA NOTES

A big press conference was held announcing a film series based on Osamu Tezuka's <u>PHOENIX</u> novels (a multi-volume series). Hinotori Productions of Tokyo will do one film for each volume, with those set in the past as live-action and those set in the future as animated cartoons.

STAR TREK also had a big press conference. All the major stars, including Nimoy, have signed, and the movie will cost \$15 million, more than all the 79 TV episodes. Roddenberry will produce, Robert Wise will direct, and screenplay is by Roddenberry and Harold Livingston based on an original story by Alan Dean Foster and Roddenberry.

STAR WARS will be lifted from release when current contracts run out and re-released in the summer. Shooting for the sequel will start Feb. 1979 for release by Xmas 1979. Gary Kurtz is producer, Irvin Kershner will direct. Fisher, Hamill, and Ford will continue their roles but Alec Guinness will probably not be present. FRODO, THE HOBBIT II, is a two hour motion picture for ABC-TV from Rankin/Bass Productions. Evidently it is a sequel to THE HOBBIT done for NBC TV.


CLOSE ENCOUNTERS OF THE THIRD KIND has generated more than \$63 million. STAR WARS has over 205 million in domestic box office receipts.

ALIEN is in pre-production. It is described as "an interstellar space thriller," and is budgeted for 3-5 million. Script is by Walter Hill and David Giler.

Those of you who saw the <u>ACADEMY OF SF FANTASY AND HORROR FILMS</u> presentations on TV may have wondered about the group. I've found an address for them. John Dykstra, who did the special effects on SW is the producer. <u>LORD OF THE RINGS</u>, Ralph Bakshi's animation, will be a 150 minute film and will cost \$6 million.

Screen Actors Guild has filed a \$25,000 lawsuit against <u>Gene Roddenberry</u>, his Norway Corp. and Paramount Pictures for what the union says is an illegal exhibition of a "Star Trek" TV pilot and seeks an injunction against Roddenberry's showing of the blooper reel. The reel "makes the actors look ludicrous." The article in VARIETY gives no mention as to why the actors are complaining now, 10 years after the blooper reel was first shown.

GETTING A PASSPORT

There are at least 50 people out there planning to go to Seacon from North America, perhaps more. This small article is to give you some early warning about the things you should do before you go, or else you may not make it to Brighton.

The first thing needed to get out of the country is money. Though you could go swim in the ocean and say you were out of the country without money, you wouldn't get far unless you were picked up by a passing boat, and who knows where that would leave you? Anyway, without making an enormous list of legal and illegal methods to aquire money, I have no advice to give.

Once you have money you can buy a ticket. There are currently rumors about several charters in the early stages of planning. I would suggest reading the newszines (LOCUS, FILE 770, SPANG BLAH, CHECKPOINT) for further information. Seacon is not taking responsiblity for any charters, so there is always the possibility they will not occur. The charters will probably be scheduled so that they return in time for the NASFIC in Louisville.

Finally, to get out of the country you need a passport. If you were to arrive in England without a passport, you would not be admitted to the country. Several people who would otherwise have gone to Heicon or Aussicon were left in America because they neglected to get a passport in time.

The Seacon committee are preparing for several hundred North American fen. They would much prefer you were in Brighton than waiting by your mailbox for a passport or sitting on a ship in the harbor staring at the flashy lights. I'm only going to discuss getting a U.S. passport, but since governments and red tape are the same everywhere, this will give you an idea of what is involved.

To get a U.S. passport you must prove to the State Department that you exist as a viable U.S. citizen. You need a completed passport application, two identifical photos, and some money.



WHEN TO APPLY: This is very important. Apply early, preferably a few months in advance of your departure date. Although it usually only takes a couple months to process the application, you may run into problems with your identification papers, and may have a delay. I'd advise you to apply by May 1, 1979, sooner if possible.

IDENTIFICATION: This is the hardest requirement to fulfill. The easiest method is to show a previous passport, but if you had one this article would be superfluous.

There are two segments required to identify you. It must be shown that there is a valid U.S. citizen with your name. Then you must prove that that citizen is you.

The usual (and easiest) method to prove the first is to show a notarized birth certificate. This will usually have an embossed seal on it. This is different from the standard paper given you at birth, which is usually merely a record of birth. Pennsylvania, for example, only gives out a certificate of birth registration, this is not a valid birth certificate, and the passport office will not accept it. So be careful, get your certificates from your parents now, there is a good likelihood that they are not valid birth certificates, and you

will have to write away for one (or visit a local office).

If you can't get a birth certificate, secondary evidence such as babtismal records, records of birth abroad, witnesses to your birth, sworn statements (notarized), and other such are valid. If you've changed your name you should have proof that you changed your name. If you have a fannish and a real name you should be careful about such things as having booked under your fannish name and your passport being in your real name. A lot of foreign hotels require that you surrender your passport when you check in.

The easiest method to prove that you are that person listed on the birth certificate is with a piece of identification bearing both the name and your picture or physical description, i.e., a driver's license or a work identification. If you don't have any of these, then you should bring someone with you that has known you for three years or more and they will swear that you are you. Then they must prove who they are and sign a certificate.

APPLICATION: You must complete a passport application. The last one I saw also asked if you had belonged to any communist organizations and you had to swear to uphold the constitution. Generally you must apply in person, unless you have a previous passport issued within 8 years prior to the date of a new application, in which case you can mail in a form.

PHOTOGRAPHS: You need two identical photos. The easiest way to get these is to have a regular passport photo place take them. It usually costs \$5 for three. They must not be smaller than $2 \ 1/2 \ x \ 2 \ 1/2$ nor larger than $3 \ x \ 3$ inches, and must withstand a mounting temperature of over 200 deg F. Both photos must be signed on the front on the left-hand side without marring the features. They require street attire, so put away the masquerade photos. Most vending machine * photos are no good.

MONEY: Unless you have had a passport in the past eight years, you must go to the passport office and pay them \$13. If you had a passport, it will only cost \$10 by mail. People that work for the government and are going on official business or people in the armed forces can get them free.

WHERE TO APPLY: There are agencies in Boston, Chicago, Honolulu, Los Angeles, Miami, New Orleans, New York, Philadelphia, San Francisco, Seattle, and Washington, D.C. In other places you may be able to use a large post office. You can call the passport agencies for more information. A brochure YOU AND YOUR PASSPORT is available from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, DC 20402. Price is probably 75¢.

It takes at least six weeks to process a passport application. It also takes a certain amount of time to get the birth certificate. It takes time to fill out the application and get the photos, though usually not as long as either of the former.


The above is a brief overview of what you'll need. Contact your local passport agency for more information. I hope that you manage to make it to England without getting Shanghaied or lost at sea. I'll be expecting to see you.

(Linda's note: Visiting Europe no longer requires smallpox or other vaccinations unless there is an outbreak in the area. You may want to get smallpox, tetanus, and typhoid, as a precaution. As a general rule, Western European countries do not require visas for vacationing US citizens for periods of stay up to three months. Passports can be obtained for family groups, rather than individuals. This saves money, but in the event that you are separated, you may prefer individual passports.

Since August is the main tourist time, you should probably reserve all rooms in advance. Cheap bread and breakfast hotels are available and they can be booked in advance. Definitely get your passport early, and reserve rooms at Brighton as soon as the booking forms are available. You can always cancel the rooms later. If you can't make the trip, the most you'll lose is the passport fee. But if you decide to go at the last minute without having a passport, you probably, won't be able to go.

British Railpass and European Rail Passes are available if purchased in the U.S. before your trip. There is also a special pass available which admits you to museums and stately homes in England free, after you pay for the pass. Check with your travel agent if you can't get the information elsewhere. Generally the railpasses are only worthwhile if you are doing considerable travel over large distances.

I know it is difficult for fans to do advance planning, but it is highly recommended for a trip to Britain in the height of the busy tourist season. . Hope to see you there -LeB)
