REVIEWS, REVIEWS, REVIEWS, and such (F. Jordan, Gulprit)

This past few months and the months to come has seen explosion of movies with either science fiction or fantasty themes. I will endeavor to give my impressions of the movies I have seen to-date listed in chronological order if nothing elske. Please forgive if I do not give the leading characters or actors for some of the movies since my memory id rapidllllleeeee phading (what was that) and quite frankly some of the characters are not worht remembering.

THE SWORD AND THE SORCEROR

This is an attempt to bring a Sword and Sorcery plot to the silver screen whiched failed in almost every aspect but the name of the flick. The plot involves the takeover of a kingdom by a treacherous duke with the aid of a resurrected sorceror who is eventually betrayed. The sword of the film is a tri-bladed construct which can shoot one or both of the outer blades toward its intended victim (Really!?).

The main body of the plot involves a rebellion against the duke and a mercenary who now has the SWORD and is revealed as the son of the former king. This is a confusing point since the rebellion is led by a son of the king, but the story beforehand had shown that the entire family e except for one son had been eliminated. (I must have missed something!)

The rebellion succeeds with the aid of the mercenary and the vengeful sorceror who has disguised himself as one of the duke's trusted ministers. The movie was poorly written, poorly acted, and poorly produced. It tried to exploit the fans of the sword-and sorcerory genre

I do not recommend it when it shows up again.

CONAN, THE BARBARIAN

The long awaited translation of Conan to a motion picture had finally arrived, and I was not too disappointed by the effort. Arnold Schwarenegger is suited for the role only in his physique and strange accent(?). His acting ability still leaves something to be desired, but he evidently had fun with the role. Again a sword and a sorceror were important aspects of this movie as in the previous flick.

The sword was forged by Conan's father who told him that the only thing he could trust was steel, an almost magical metal. The sword was then stolen by the sorceror, Thulsa Doom, who is also the high priest of Set, God of death. After his Father and Mother are murdered and his village destroyed, Conan is sold into slavery where his physique develops (?). He is subsequently sold to a promoter of pit fights and becomes the greatest pit fighter of his time first through his superior strength and then later through his skill as a fighter. His owner releases him and he becomes a thief. He meets his love, another thief played by Sandahl Bergman, and they are hired by the local king to rescue his laughter from the clutches of Thulsa Doom. Conan was responsible for the death of his parents so his quest becomes one of revenge as well.

Overall, I thought that the movie was well done and the legend did not

suffer too much from the effort. The only disapointment was that L. Sprague De Camp was not mentioned as technical advisor on the film. He mentioned that he was engaged with the film when he was here for Just Imagicon in '79.

E.T. The Extra-Terrestrial

A beautiful movie from the mind of one of the two greatest filmakers of our time. A young(?) E.f. is left on earth by accident and he must try to survive on his own. He meets a boy of ten or eleven years of age who realizes who or what the E.T. is. The boy, Elliot, is determined to protect the being from harm or exposure to the authorities, who appear at first in the film as faceless adults. In Fact, the only adult we can truly identify in the first two-thirds of the movie is Elliot's mother. Elliot recruits his older brother to help and then his young sister stumbles upon the secret and is enthralled by E.T. The being is shown to weaken because of his inability to adept to Earth's ecology. The most frightening aspect of the movie is when the AUTHORITIES move in and try to prevent E.T. from apparently dying. The subsequent revival of E.T. and the final scenes except for the last are perhaps the least effective of the movie. The farewell scene is a tear-jerking moment and is worthy of inclusion with any of the other great farewell scenes of movie history.

POLTERGEIST

The word poltergeist is from the German for noisy ghosts. The title characters of these movie live up to their name and much more. The younger daughter of the family of the house is the first to encounter them. She hears them when their t.v. is tuned to a channel on which there is no station broadcasting. They eventually leave the t.v. and enter the house and wreak their havoc on the family. The son is almost the first victim of the ghosts in a ruse to kidnap the young girl. The rest of the plot is a rescue story to bring the little girl back from the other plane (plain) of existance with the aid of a team of parapsychologists and a psychic. They are successfull, but the poltergeist are not through.

The movie was written and produced by Steven Spielberg, but not directed by him. I believe it suffered because of this, but he was busy with E.T. The movie was not as frightening as I thought it would be and some of the special effects were not as well done as they possibly could have been. This was was surprising since they were fabricated by Industrial, Light, and Magic, Inc.

However, the premise of the movie was convincing and was well presented.

STAR TREK: The Wrath of Khan

This movie is a continuance of a Star Trek t.v. episode called "The Space Seed". Come with us now to those thrilling days of yesteryear relive those wonderful times. The t.v. plot involved the Enterprise finding a seemingly derelict spaceship. When the crew investigates they find a group of humans in total hibernation. When the humans are revived we learn that they are a band of genetically superior men and women who started the geneticwars on Earth during the latter parts of the 20th century. Khan Noonan Singh is their leader. Khan tries to wrest the Enterprise from its crew for his own purposes and is punished when he fails by being exiled on a planet with a harsh climate. The Movie starts as the Enterprise is taken out on a training exercise for Academy cadets and recent graduates, among whom is Lt. Saavik, a most interesting person. Khan seizes an oppurtunity to take revenge on Admiral Kirk since the planet on which he was exiled had a catastrophic change in its climate from not just harsh but to deadly. His obsession to avenge himself on Kirk is his undoing especially since he lacks the experience that Kirk has in combat between starships.

The story of the movie shows many aspects of having returned to the original atmosphere of the series. The constant verbal battle between Spock and McCoy and the confidence that Kirk displays as he tries and succeeds to outwit Khan are two examples. Theeffects are adequate for the story including some computer graphics animation in the unveiling of the Genesis Project to Kirk, McCoy, Spock and the audience. I will admit that the second movie doses stand above the first in story and in being more like the series, but I still like the first ome, and I believe it has its own good points.

BLADE-RUNNER

This is the movie made form the novel by the late Philip K. Dick called "Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep". Harrison Ford, in route from the 1930's to a galaxy far far away, made this stop in the early 21st century. Ridley Scott of ALIEN fame was the director of this opus and it definitely shows hisinfluence if ALIEN can serve as a guide. About the only time it's not raining and gloomy is toward the end of the film when when Ford's character, Deckard, is fleeing the city for good with his companion. The story revolves around Deckard's pursuit of six escaped replicants whom he has to 'retire'. Iwo are already dead form an attempt to enter the facilities where they were incepted (made?), The rest, two women and two men, are the subjects of the remainder of the movie. The complications of the plotconsists of another replicant named Rachel whom he falls in love with and must protect from his partner. The action is a fairly straight detective story with a strong flavor of the Mike Hammer stories. The culture of Los Angeles at the time isshown to be a real 'mixing bowl' of Chinese, Mexican, Japanese, Arabic, and Western cultures with the added trappings of a very sophisticated technology. These aspects dend creedence to the story. The only detractions are the somewhat surrealistic characters of the creators of the replicants.

Deckard's main antagonist, replicant Roy Batty, made what I believe to be the main statement of the movie as he was dying form an implant that keeps most of the replicants lives short. He recounted to Deckard the sights and experiences he lived through when he was off Earth.

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He saw more and experienced more wondrous things in his four years of life than virtually all humans do in all their life. This statement was put across very well for some of the audience at the showing I attended for I overheard some of the confusion as I left the theatre. This may have been due to the fact that Batty was trying to kill Deckard before he himself died and that the statement was made close to the end of this crisis.

On the whole I recommend this movie for it shows that a bachelor's life in the 21st century is not much different from that of the 20th century bachelor. PELABOLE 761-2380


These were donated to the club by KAY HUEY-JOHNSON, Tom's widow.
