+ apa news + :

There always seem to be a few people out there in Osfan's vast readership (oh, yah) that don't know what an apa is. An apa is an amateur press association or alliance. There is at least one, perhaps more than one, that operates outside of fandom -- but for the most part they seem to be something that science fiction fans do. The members, numbering anywhere from a handful to 65, send their material to the elected head of the organization -- usually called an official editor, or OE, who in turn collates a "mailing" which each member gets. The mailings are quarterly sometimes monthly, even weekly, depending upon which apa you happen to belong to. Some of the best fan writing and art around appears through the apas. Many fans find that the degree of response and communication between members of an apa much more rewarding than the response generated by a general circulation fanzine, though of course there are also many fans who prefer this general publishing to the smaller-circulation apa fanzine. If you think you might be interested, I suggest you write to the Official Editors I mention in the monthly apa news in OSFAn, they can answer your questions and sell you sample mailings.

APA L is a weekly apa. (Oh, yah.) Fanzines for distribution are brought to the weekly LASFS meetings in Los Angeles. To participate, you need a West Coast representitive. If you don't know anyone in LASFS, you probably wouldn't want to be a member, anyway. Apa L folded for a while, when the LASFS genzine, Shangri L'Affaires was revived, and was very recently started up again.

THE SOUTHERN FANDOM PRESS ALLIANCE recently arrived at the Basement with its 30th mailing. There were only 137 pages, and 86 of those pages were from St. Louis fans. While short, most of the fanzines looked fairly interesting and well done. And there isnot any waiting list, as of this mailing. The Official Editor is Lon Atkins, Box 444, Northridge, California, 91324. In case you are wondering why the "Southern Fandom Press Alliance" has an OE in California -- When Lon first joined the apa, he lived in the South, and since moved, retaining his status as a southern member. The apa allows a certain number of Northern memberships, by the way.

FAPA is the oldest and biggest science fiction apa. It also has the longest waiting list, 41 people were listed in there most recent mailing. If you think you might be interested in joining some day, you might as well start waiting now. To do so, send a buck to Bill Evans, Box 1015, Langley Park, Md, 20787. There were 346 pages in the November mailing, including a 53 page Warhoon from Richard Bergeron, a 24 page Horizons from Harry Warner, and a 24 page Dynatron from Roy Tackett. And, well, yes, there was a 40 page Different from Sam Moskowitz. I almost forgot that.

N°APA is the amateur press association of the National Fantasy Fan Federation. The most recent mailing went out just a few weeks ago, with 193 pages, with longer fanzines from Wally Weber, Joanne Burger and Jerry Lapidus. Eighteen members either resigned or were dropped from this mailing, including OE Roy Tackett (Art Hayes is the new OE), and most of the St. Louis contingent -- Leigh, Lesleigh and Chris Couch, and Hank Luttrell. There cettainly isn't a waiting list -- write Art Hayes, Box 1030, South Porcupine, Ontario, Canada for particulars.

KAPA-ALPHA is a comic book apa, with monthly mailings. The November mailing had 115 pages. For information, write Fred Patten, 8943 East Arcadia Ave., Apt. 14, San Gabriel, Calif 91775.

QUIP 10 (Arnie Katz) When I first picked up the envelope this was in, and felt how soft and mushy it was, I thought 'Oh no, he's actually put a Pineapple in it!" But when I dropped it out on my hand and it went 'quish', I knew it was only the third annish. Quite a good annish, too. Harry Warner,'s "All Our Yesterdays" column is on Claude Degler's Cosmic Circle. The CC is always an interesting subject, and Harry's writing makes a fascinating article. Steve Stiles begins his report of his TAFF trip to England this issue. The first installment is somewhat uninspired, but it looks as if it will get much more interesting. GRANFALLOON #5 (Linda Eyster & Suzanne Tompkins) I was amazed to see how much Connie Reich's artwork had improved with this issue. Up until now, her material had been made up mostly of thick, ugly lines. Now her artwork is much more graceful and well-proportioned, and Granfalloon looks much better for it. Other things in Granfalloon have improved in well. The material is better balanced than in the past, and the letters are interesting and better edited. And there is one piece of material in this issue that is really good. Ginjer Buchanan wrote a convention report on the Baycon that is strange, humorous, and just a perfect description of Baycon, as well as a top-notch piece of fan writing. I think that now the Granfalloon group have developed a personality that they transmit through their fanzine.
