The title of this newsheet comes from a short story by Robert
Heinlein where it is the title of a newspaper column used by the central
character to combat a corrupt and inefficient administration. The administration of the proposed ULU Science Fiction Society is not so much corrupt

PRESENT UNIVERSITY SOCIETIES

UNIVERSITY COLLEGE - This is the largest of the College societies. It has organised lectures by Samuel Delaney and Chris Friest as well as a number of Discos. Cynics have attributed their large membership to last years lady president shirley who proved equally able to lure audiences and lecturers along to their meetings.

This years president Phil Appleby may have a lot more difficulty if he tries to use the same tactics.

THE ELIZABETH COLLEGE - This is the other London SF society and therefore the second largest. However according to their president, Phil Shaw, they try harder. So far this year they have organised lectures by Chris Friest and Harry Harrison. Their committee are a determined bunch as proved by them living in a tent outside Newcastle to attend last years British convention.

They also run a book lending service to their members which proves their courage (if not their sanity).

ROYAL HOLLOWAY COLLEGE - So far this society is even more non-existant than the ULU society but it does at least have a name. FANZINES

A surprising number of fans produce their own magazines containing reviews, fiction, poetry and articles. These range in quality from duplicated sheets like this to very professional productions with their own artwork.

SONF? - This contains a mixture of articles and reviews together with a promising foray into fiction by the author, Howis Rosenblum, one of the few 2'nd generation fans around. Howie works for the London School of Hygiene and tropical medecine which probably makes him the first person to publish a fanzine from London University.

BLACK HOLE - This is the fanzine of the Leeds University SF society and contains reports of their events throughout the year as well as reviiews and fiction. The Leeds group is thriving with a membership of 125. They have originated the great idea of inviting authors to lecture them in pairs. So far they have had Bob Shaw and Samuel Delaney a combination which apparently produced a wild and enjoyable evening.

OTHER UNIVERSITY SOCIETIES

STRATHCLYDE - Way up north in barbarian country a fan called Bob Shaw (yes there are two of them) is taking time of from defending the battlements against the Picts to run a Strathclyde SF society.

ASTON - The Aston group is strongly connected with the extremely active Bimingham group of fans. The Birmingham group has even managed to run their own convention for the past 4 years.

OXFORD - A group at exford has been in existence for some time we now. It publishes a magazine called SFINE which is probably the best magazine of amatuer fection around at the moment. One of the aims of a London group must be to put an end to this state of affairs.
