Gene Roddenberry has moved back into his old offices, and is currently writing the script. Rumors are the subject will be on how the Enterprise was built, the origins of the crew, etc. (From a press release sent to ST clubs, March 1975; and from GR's speeches at Rensselaer Polytechnic Inst. & Rice U.) ## All the original cast will play, including William Shatner, who has been negative in the past on playing the role again, and will be in his own series the Barbary Coast, in Sept. ## Leonard Nimoy will play Spock, despite rumors that he wasn't interested. Obviously holding out for more money. He's currently writing a book on playing Spock. ## In a recent speech at Bowling Green State U, LN said the networks were after Paul Newman for Capt. Kirk, and unbelievably, Dustin Hoffman for Sulu. From the SUNDAY HERALD PICTORIAL LIVING, LN said he will play, unless they want Robert Redford in pointed ears. ## No contracts have been signed; however, this is usual, as the script must ne finished first, in accordance with union rules." Containing citations to about 14,500 reviews, SFBRI is a unique aid to the study and research of science fiction authors and their works. ## SFBRI is arranged alphabetically by author, with books listed alphabetically by title under each author's name. Full information on coauthors is furnished in the bibliographic data for each book. Pseudonyms are shown as part of the data for particular books; cross references for pseudonyms are provided. Books entered under the main title entry are filed in a special title entry section, and are cross-referenced in the title index. ## For each book reviewed these details are given: author; title; pseudonym, joint authors, or joint editors; place of publication; publisher; date of publication; number of pages; L.C. card number. Citations to reviews are listed following each book and give magazine code; volume and issue numbers, or whole number of issue; pagination of review; date of magazine issue; reviewer. ## A complete listing of the magazines indexed is included in a two-part appendix. Part 1, a record of the science fiction magazines from 1923 to 1973, includes all available data on each magazine: title, title changes, editors, variations in publisher, indexes covering the title, indexing code, special notes, and an issue-by-issue checklist of the magazine. Part 2 is a title checklist of the general, library, and amateur magazines covered by the index, with date coverage started. ## Two brief listings follow this part: a list of the major science fiction indexes, and an editor index to the science fiction magazines (with magazines edited and dates under that editorship). The title index covers all of the approximately 6,900 books reviewed in the 216 magazines indexed in SFBRI."

Amphigorey: Fifteen Books, by Edward Gorey (Berkley Windhover Book #E2867; pb; 8" x 11"; 6/75; \$4.95; copyright '72; no pagination, but book consists of 112 sheets, 20 of them blank on one side) -- A "compilation" of 15 books first published between 1953 and 1965: "The Unstrung Harp", "The Listing Attic", "The Doubtful Guest", "The Object-Lesson", "The Bug Book", "The Fatal Lozenge", "The Hapless Child", "The Curious Sofa", "The Willowdale Handcar", "The Gashlycrumb Tinies", "The Insect God", "The West Wing", "The Wuggly Ump", "The Sinking Spell", "The Remembered Visit". The "books" consist of b&w illustrations (color in two books), with short accompanying text in the form of a brief paragraph, limericks, poetry, single lines, or, in the case of "The West Wing", no text at all. As for content, well...Gorey's brief preface that the title "is taken from amphigory, or amphigouri, meaning a nonsense verse or composition", which definition fits the 15 "books" in this volume nicely. Not really SF or fantasy, but fantastic--a book to be enjoyed!
