## Well, that was Amazeballs!


The League of Fan Funds newsletter August 2024

So, Glasgow 2024, a Worldcon for Our Futures turned out to be a wild event: one of the largest Worldcons ever, and full of wonders. It was certainly great for the fan funds.

And of course we'd like to thank Glasgow 2024, a Worldcon for Our Futures. They have been unstinting with their support for the funds, in big and small ways, including making a major donation of leftover merchandise shirts.

Thank you all; you are all wonderful and help to perpetuate the funds.

Third, we're sure you're all agog to learn how much money we raised.

- We already announced that bids were taken of £4,420.20 at the Worldcon auction, although that ignores the prosaic reality of card fees (which we do not resent at all, since card payments undoubtedly mean more money raised overall) which makes the total raised by the live auction £4,390.47.
- The silent auction raised another £603.52 (£610 before fees).
- All the other activities over the table, plus other donations including cash raised in the bar, came to £1,670.49 after fees, plus US\$120.
- And so there's a honking, unprecedented, total of £6,664.48 plus the dollars for all the funds involved.

The LFF has decided to distribute it – taking into account earmarked donations, fund requirements, other fundraising plans, and the subtle movements of space currents – as follows:

TAFF: £2,464.48 + \$120

GUFF: £1,700 DUFF: £750

The Science Fiction Encyclopaedia: £750

European Fan Fund: £500

Con or Bust: £500

We'll be transferring monies in the next couple of weeks.

Fourth, what's next? One things fan funds need to persist and thrive is good candidates. If you know people who'd make great fan fund delegates, encourage them to consider it and to stand in future races. Meanwhile, we're making plans for Reconnect, the 2025 Eastercon, where we'll have an auction; and for Eurocon 2025, Archipelacon 2.
