Comments on MZZL-355.

Vixen (DR 19) - Daisy was the first song ever "taught" to a computer. By now it is traditional.

Larry Nielson (GTTW 21) - The early 40's AMAZINGS and FANTASTIC ADVENTURES did include my favorite series - the Lefty Feep stories. They were "written" by Bob Bloch and featured improbable titles, even more improbable plots, wildly colorful characters and language, and the highest density of atrocious puns ever seen in the English language. Two titles I remember are "The Goon From Rangoon" and "The Pied Piper Meets The Gestapo." The phrase "His beady eyes became unstrung" was a MITSFS catch phrase for a while.

Glenn Mitchell (CC 3) - Very neatly reasoned, sir. You obviously have the makings of a great experimental scientist. You no doubt have also observed that light objects fall more slowly than dark objects in the sun's gravitational field because of radiation pressure.

Make rosters of who will be on when. Make some provision for the expected

unreliability of your volunteers. Put up BIG signs.

Hotel - One of the things that the Noreascon committee did was to hold a meeting with the Hotel staff which was to be on duty during the con and go over with them what they could expect and what would be expected of them. This particularly to key personnel such as the day and night managers. You should know these people beforehand they should understand quite clearly what the con is going to be like and what to expect. KNOW your security captain. I have just completed reading the second installment of Isaac's novel running in Galaxy/If. My reaction to it is quite simple - it is the best thing that has been written this year. The first installment was somewhat disappointing but I wasn't too surprised. After all he has not written a novel for many years and most of his short fiction over the past few years has been rather minor. Consequently I rather expected that the novel would be weak. The first installment bore out my expectations - it is slow talky, poorly characterized, and rather cranky.

I sort of expected that the second installment would be much the same, but it's not - it's BEAUTIFUL!! It is set entirely in an alien universe; the characters are three alien mates of a trisexual species. The characters are totally alien and yet are well and warmly characterized. There is a rather moving description of a trisexual mating that is written better than most human love scenes. The second installment of "The Gods Themselves" is the best thing that Isaac has ever written and is the best piece of SF about aliens ever written. My only regret is that the installment is so short.
