THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Within the last few weeks five major science fiction films have been released in the United States: E.T., The Thing, Blade Runner, Tron and Star Trek: The Wrath of Kahn. That's a surprising fact in itself. Even in these boom years since Star Wars there have not been many seasons with so many big-budget sf films appearing all at once.

What's more surprising is that most of them are doing exceedingly well at the box office--both E. T. and Star Trek: The Wrath of Kahn set new records for early box-office returns, and all of the others look promising. Most surprising of all, the level of quality is very high. It's possible to find flaws in all the films. The Thing is almost revoltingly gory--but quite faithful to the original story; Tron is pretty juvenile in theme and treatment--but spectacular in its videographic special effects. But each one of them would have been cause for rejoicing in the streets a decade or two ago . . . and the end is not in sight: at least a dozen important new science-fiction films are in the works right now.

If World SF needs drastic improvement in any one area, I think it is in the science-fiction film--which makes it all the happier that our meeting this year will be in conjunction with the Ars Electronica festival in Linz. I'm looking forward to discussions and displays which will give us some glimpse into the future of science fiction in visual form--as well as, of course, the opportunity to discuss all of the other areas of science fiction world-wide.

So much for the future--but there is something about the past that I have been meaning to mention in this column. A couple of years ago I was asked to narrate a documentary on the science-fiction film of past years for the International Communications Agency. The I.C.A. (which used to be called the United States Information Service) is a branch of the U. S. State Department, and so the emphasis is on American films -- but there are many examples from the rest of the world as well and actually, when I saw the documentary, I thought it was well worth seeing. (I can say this in all modesty since I had very little to do with its creation; I simply read a script for the narration). World SF members abroad who would like to see it (and who have facilities for showing a

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videotape, because that is the form it comes in) need simply contact the nearest U. S. Embassy, consulate or information center—it's free, and the purpose it was made for was exactly so that it could be loaned to people like us. (Provided only that we live outside the U. S.—by law, the tape may not be shown in the United States, I'm sorry to say.)

This will be the last opportunity I have to write to you as President of World SF, so in a sense it is a farewell. I am grateful for the chance to work with all of you, and particularly grateful to the many members—Betty Hull and Gerald Bishop are only two, but two who are especially prized—who have worked so hard and done so much to make the organization work. And I'm looking forward to even greater strides with Brian Aldiss at the helm.

In another sense, of course, it's no farewell at all—I'm retiring as President, but I have every intention of continuing to be active as a member in what I firmly believe to be the most important organization in science fiction today!

BOOK EXHIBITION

Osterreichischer Rundfunk and the City of Linz are mounting an exhibition of science fiction books and posters from around the world to co-incide with our meeting and Ars Electronica, to be mounted in the Stadtmuseum Nordico.

Apart from the exhibit being shown to the delegates to the World SF meeting, the exhibition will be open to members of the public. Publishers are being asked to send a selection of their science fiction books, with some loose illustrated dust jackets, any posters advertising SF lists, and a note of their company name and address (including country!) for display to:

After the exhibition, the books will be donated to specialist research libraries in Central Europe, to form the core of a representative collection of international Science Fiction.

The presentation of Video programs will be to private groups with no publicised program, so it will not be necessary to obtain full public performance rights.

Speaking of the initiatives of WSF ITALY, we have to point out the literary concourse organized in order to make a choice of the story which will represent Italy in the International Anthology of WSF. In the competition, 13 authors took part; the judges were the 23 members scheduled as writers. The winning story was "Quo Vadis Francisco?" by Lino Aldani, which has already been sent to Sam Lundwall. As far as the publisher of the anthology for Italy is concerned, we have already pointed out to Lundwall that the Editrice Nord of Milan is available for the publication, and the contract's terms have been communicated as well.

WSF ITALY has moreover planned a project to realize a National Directory of professionals in SF and Fantasy. A booklet will be printed and directly sent to all the WSF members all over the world within the next month.

In 1983, to promote the works of its members, WSF ITALY will organize a great National Exhibition of Fantastic Art and a Studies Meeting on SF and Fantasy Literature. The Executive Council had already contacts with the Public Authority of Milan, which promises its help, both economically and in organization.
