The faults of this scheme are obvious -- and are probably fatal. In . first place . you wouldn't be receiving the fanalnes, a circumstance which I would hardly expect you so approve. In the second place, my theoretical reviewer remains to be found. I'll admit that I've sold myself on the plan, but I rather doubt that I could find the time to

for the reviewing and incidental oursesponience. I would probably talk nyself into trying for time, but I den't think I'll worry about it, as I doubt you will approve of the whole thing anyway. But the suggestion may offer a few fresh limit.

In the first place, I'll make it clear that the fanzine index will primerily be an index, reviews being put in according to the space allowed in each issue. Neviewing each leave of each fanzine, crudzine and cludshed in existence would be not impossible, but impracticable. It would take too much room, that would/should be done, would be to complete the listing and spotlight the items that are likely to remain of interest.

Sometimes this won't be possible; as Jim and I have jubout enought time now to get FT out on a resconable regular schedule.
