Very sorry for long delay in most M-Press publications, but 1977 was a particularly bad year for us and our ailing mimeo. We've completely reorganized, and will (barring complete failure of health of mimeo or publisher) keep all magazines on schedule in 1978. (Have started funds to replace mimes and typer--see pg. 2)) But, as you will see from Info Sheet (pg. 9), THE GAMESLETTER/THE GAMING NEWS, SON OF THE WSFA JOURNAL/THE JOURNAL SUPPLEMENT/THE SF&F NEWSLETTER/THE SF&F INFORMANT and THE MYSTERY MONITOR are no more ... we are going to concentrate on getting the larger publications -in all three categories -- out more frequently (and on a schedule), publishing supplements along with the major 'zines to help pick up the slack, and using TGN--which includes news and info from the three categories -- to get out news and other dateable material as it is received. TGN will be at least monthly (we have enough for two issues per month, but will have to squeeze until everything fits, as we can't devote that much time to it); this issue was very squeezed for many reasons, many of which will not be true for future issues, and we will have to put another issue out later this month to get the rest of the Jan. info in. Issue f^2 and subsequent issues will go only to subbers, so if you want TGN sub (or transfer some of your current creditsee enclosed form) by Jan. 15. This issue is weak on gaming news; future issues (after #2) should be better balanced; we are also not too happy with the organization--we'll improve with practice. (This issue, we should note, is going to everyone who is a subber to any of our 'zines; if you have enough left in your accounts to receive the next TG, TJS or TMN, and the last TMM (16) or TGL (2 issues together---,'s 86 & 87), you will find this issue has cost you nothing, as TJS #90 will have extra pages and TMM #16 (22 pp) and the two TGL's will count against your accounts as only 1 issue; for the rest of you, it counts as one Sub Unit.) T6Lis 86 & 87, TMN #16, TSJ #90, and TG #8 are all on stoncil, ready to be run off, and TMN #12 will follow. TG #8 and TGL's should be mailed out by end of Feb., TSJ #90 by mid-March, and TMM #16 and TMN #12 by early April at the latest. (TGL's will be mailed with TG, and TMN with TMN; TGL's and TMM were typed in '76 before mimon trouble...as were most of TG & TSJ.)

We urgently need reviews of books & stories by Kendell Foster Crosson/Bennett Barlay/M.E. Chaber/Richard Foster/Christopher Monig/Clay Richards/Kent Richards by end of Feb. And we need Murray Leinster/Will F. Jenkins reviews by end of May.

We are also very much interested in bulk deals -- we'd like to sell the entire lot at once, to a dealer or fan, and will consider all reasonable quantity offers (since we're not sure just how many we do have at the moment, it's best to make bulk offers per book (e.g., 15¢/pb)). Deadline for individual offers is March 15 (we'll start pulling and mailing indiv. orders on March 1); anything unsold on March 15 will be sold in bulk, if there are any bulk offers. Anything on hand as of Apr. 1 will be taken to local dealers, as we must have basement work done in April. A few more words about TGN and rest of changes: Thisissue of TGN is not representative of future issues. For example, we didn't have room to include any of the "Steady Stream" ... descriptions and/or reviews of books, magazines, games, fanzines, ads/flyers/catalogues, etc. rec'd during Jan. This will be in #2, and thereafter we hope to be able to get it in each month. We will, in most cases, list clippings of book/film/TV reviews rather than extract them in TGN; they will be extracted in TMN or a supplement as space permits -- we will ask you to let us know which you'd like to see extracted, and will use our own judgment on the rest. Supplements will also comprise checklists/biblios (it's probably better to publish them separately, so recipient won't have to dissemble large 'zine to file them and use them -- for contributor's credit, however, they'll still be counted as being in large 'zine (and will be included in ToC of large 'zine) and "overflow" material of various kinds. Lots of projects under way in all fields -- more on these in 'zines as they appear. We expect TMN #12 will include Crossen section; Leinster issue of TSJ should be #91 (we will be working on it along with next "regular" issue--if latter is ready first, Leinster issue will be #92). Our plans call for one "regular" issue of each 'zine every 4 months, plus one "special" issue per year (four quarterly issues of TG, most likely, in 178), with at least one 10-page supplement with each issue. Subs to TGN will be handed separately from other subs. As of now, of course, we have no subbers to TGN; we will need at least 30 by Feb. 15, and 100 by end of March if TGN is to survive (it's too much work for less than 100 people). Those who are interested in 2 or more of the subject-matter groups will find TGN a boon; we hope others will find it of enough interest to try it for a year (or 12 issues, preferably--Plan B subs were intended more for libraries who sub thru agencies, rather than individuals, although individual Plan B subs are welcome -- just remember that we both take risks with Plan B which are not there for Plan A or C -- if we publish more issues than we planned, we loso--but if we publish less, you lose....). ## Enough for now. We hope you'll be satisfied with the new set-up once you've had a chance to study it--and that you'll write us if you have any questions about it (don't be afraid to ask--you may be doing someone else a favor...). --- DLM

SUBSCRIPTION ADJUSTMENT FORM

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SF/Fantasy & Mystery subbers should already be aware that all subs were switched over to "Subscription Units" (one S.U. = 10 pages & costs 25% in U.S., 30% elsewhere) during 1977--but Gameszine subbers never got the word because TGL #'s 86 & 87, which were to be accompanied by 4/77 Info Sheet--never got out. Plan C in Info Sheet of 2/78 is basically same as old S.U. plan. All current subs to TG/TGL have been converted to S.U.'s at the rate of 1 S.U. per issue of TGL or 4 S.U.'s per issue of TG remaining (subs to 'zines in SF/Fantasy & Mystery subject-matter groups were converted earlier). This form contains a statement of the current state of your account, after 1 S.U. has been deducted for TGN #1. All subs will remain in terms of S.U.'s until TG #8 (or TSJ #90, or TMN #12, depending upon whether your account is in the "G", "S", or "M" subject-matter group) is out, after which it will be converted (or refunded to you) according to your specifications on this form. (You will also receive TGL 86/87 with TG #8, / a supplement, TMM #16 with TMN #12, / a supplement, or a supplement with TSJ #90, if you have enough S.U.'s; so this should be bourne in mind when computing how much you'll have left after S.U.'s for these issues have been deducted--figure 5 or 6 S.U. for TG/TSJ/TMN, 1 S.U. for ea. supplement, TGL 86/7, or TMM #16; note that you will not receive TG/ TSJ/TMN if you have less than 7 S.U.'s remaining, but will receive only TGL or TMM and supplements until your S.U.'s are exhausted.)
