Coming up very soon will be the 100th issue of NEW WORLDS and I would like to congratulate Nova Publications for a fine performance. I believe that the 100th issue will be something special with a return to interior illos and other features. The US magazines AMAZING and FANTASTIC also are to make some changes in the near future. These mags have shown an improvement this year and is to be expected I think, that seeing there are only (ASF, F&SF, Am, Pn, Gl, If, Nws, SFA and SFy) 8 magazines being published regularly, editors should be able to be a bit more choosy. Consequently, the quality of stories in all the mags should be of a higher average standard. That's my opinion at any rate and I would be interested to hear any body else's views on the matter.

Reference has been made in various quarters to the undue emphasis being placed on sex in some of the current US pb titles. Only with some of the magazines in the past has this method been resorted to to sell sf and just when we think that sf is improving its reputation a little these Beacon Books, Gold Medals and Chariot, start to appear on the market. Everybody is entitled to their own reading likes and dislikes, we include but I object to the mucking about of perfectly good existing stories.

FILM NEWS & REVIEWS

As usual very little has been seen here of late in the way of sf or fantasy films at our theatres, despite the fact that we hear about so many being made overseas. JOURNEY TO THE CENTRE OF THE EARTH was pleasant to watch and quite effective in parts, but as is usual in Hollywood it had very little connection with Jules Verne's original story. We have heard very good reports of I believe George Pal's TIME MACHINE which we will probably see around Christmas time if we are lucky. As yet I have seen no reports on JOURNEY TO THE MOON or similar title taken from the Jules Verne book, which may not have been released yet. If this sticks to the original story it should be quite a curiosity piece and probably very funny in the light of current knowledge, but if they have attempted to modernise it, I don't know what we can expect.

A picture you must not miss is Disney's latest fantasy DARBY O'GILL and THE LITTLE PEOPLE. Most of the film was quite suitable for juvenile consumption, but the latter part of the film featuring the traditional Irish 'banshee' would give some kids nightmares for weeks. We have seen some weird effects in films over the last few years and even in some of the old films like METROPOLIS. The new process dreamed up for the SEVENTH VOYAGE OF SINBAD was very effective and there was some memorable scenes in THIS ISLAND EARTH and WAR OF THE WORLDS, but the few scenes in the latter part of DARBY O'GILL take the prize.

Amongst the films announced this year is the usual monster epic GORGO presented by King Brothers. I think the Japanese films RODAN and the other titles which I cannot recall at the moment are the best we have seen on this theme. One that does show some promise is the English production starring Kenneth More THE MAN IN THE MOON. This one is apparently treated as a comedy but it looks as though the scientific side of it may be at least accurate.

On TV we are still enjoying MEN INTO SPACE which except for an occasional small lapse is very good. The Bonestall backdrops, the trick photography and William Lundigan who to my mind suits the part perfectly, all add to the enjoyment. We also see the occasional fantasy and sf story on ALFRED HITCHCOCK PRESENTS and CHALLENGE is another one of particular interest to sf fans. As yet we have not yet seen the very popular in the US series THE TWILIGHT ZONE, though a book collection of the stories by Rod Serling has been on sale.

Other films we have seen on TV include THINGS TO COME - which I had been waiting years to see and was fully up to my expectations, ROCKET SHIP X-M - which was fully as bad as everyone had warned me it was, THE LOST CONTINENT - expecting to see a story at least based on the Conan Doyle, there was no connection but it could have been worse, DR CYCLOPS - was short and may have been cut for TV but was very effective, and THE UNINVITED - which is the best Ghost film I have seen.

Finally I would like to mention a book which was lent to me on fantasy films called LE FANTASTIQUE au CINEMA by Michel Lacroix. The publisher I believe is Jean-Jacques Pauvert. This is a photographic history of the fantastic movie including sf, but is unfortunately printed in French. The collection of stills from a range of films from 1897 to 1957 is really terrific not to mention the list of many films at the back, which if not complete is at least representative of the field.

BITS & PIECES

Another film to see is the VILLAGE of the DAMNED from the book The Midwich Cuckoos by Wyndham.

BOOK NEWS & REVIEWS

The British publishers list of sf and fantasy titles for the next few months is not very promising. Quite a number of books are being put out in the US at present but most of the better ones get a mention in US editions of Astounding and F&SF, so I won't go into details about these. The British list includes: SLAVE SHIP by Fredrick Pohl - now why of all the titles that must be held by British publishers must they pick on this. It is not a bad story I admit but at least 75% of readers will have already read it if not in the original serial then in Ballantine pb, which has been on sale here at any rate. The new Charles Eric Maine title is CALCULATED RISK on which I can give you no information at this stage. This is coming from his usual publisher Hodder and Staughton and the former title mentioned Slave Ship, is coming from Dobsons. From Peter Davies is coming SKRINE by Kathleen Sully - yet another story about what might happen after an atomic war. One which sounds interesting at any rate is THE PAPERS OF ANDREW MELMOTH by Hugh Sykes Davis coming from Methuen, which is about a chap who studies the habits of rats and discovers that rats are about to evolve further than humans.

A further off beat title from England is The PURPLE ARMCHAIR by Olga Hesky which is a humorous story about a visitor from outer space who looks like a purple armchair. The publishers, Blond, claim this author is a real discovery. A few months back we mentioned a title called ASPECTS of SF by Doughty which is a collection of stories with a very good forward explaining sf - the stories are all first class by the way, though anthologised many times before - but the book is really a text book designed for school use. I fully recommend this one to anybody who would like to introduce a new reader to the field. Another collection designed for juvenile readers is OUT OF THIS WORLD edited by Amabel William - Ellis and Mabley Owen. Stories include titles by Clarke, Wyndham and other topliners but have all been chosen with juvenile readers in mind. Publisher - Blackie.

The last two titles mentioned are of course already on sale, but another one to come is a Russian epic supposedly written back in the late twenties or early thirties. BEYOND THE PLANET EARTH by K. Tsiolkovsky is coming from Pergamon Press. Another Russian title received recently was ANDROMEDA by Yefrenov

It is curious how sometimes a number of authors all seem to get the same idea at the same time. Longevity is not a new theme but two of three new titles make a worthwhile attempt at presenting the problems that such a discovery as 'a cure for death' would produce. John Wyndham's THE TROUBLE WITH LICHEN is by far the most polished of the two I have read though more subdued. The second title is ACCURE FOR DEATH by Victor Valentine. The former published by Michael Joseph and the latter by Sidgwick and Jackson. The Wyndham book tells of scientists who are lead to a means of prolonging life through their search for a cure for cancer. This is worth reading but is nowhere near Wyndham's best. A Cure for Death is a much more involved story and would probably have more popular appeal. The means of prolonging life in this story is by atomic or some such rays and goes on to show that longer life may not be such a good thing after all. Though not particularly well written it is definitely worth reading.

Another new author to the field is Australian John Igguldon, whose BREAKTHROUGH from Chapman and Hall is to my mind one of the most original stories I have read for a while. Well written it holds your interest all the way and I think that is as good a test of a book as any. Briefly the plot deals with overthrow of a dictator who has a means of controlling peoples actions by radio.

A book that everybody must read is A CANTICLE FOR LIEBOWITZ by Walter Miller from Wiedenfeld and Nicolson. Originally published as separate parts in F&SF, the story of the efforts of a band of monks to keep intact a small store of knowledge while man continues on his merry way to self destruction, is brilliant. Only one other story has to my mind had real literary merit in the sf field and that is EARTH ABIDES. Most people may not entirely agree with this statement, but when you read this book, and you will, you must agree that it is one of the best and most important sf books so far written. It should win the International Fantasy Award but I believe, but I do not know for sure at this stage that another F&SF original story Starship Soldier or STARSHIP TROOPERS as the book is titled by Robert Heinlein is this year's winner.

The third title on longevity which I forgot to mention before is BID TIME RETURN by James Haddon coming from P.R. MacMillan. This is not published yet but from the blurb I would say that it came somewhere in between the other two titles mentioned.

Two books published by Hutchinson recently I think are very well done. Coloured illustrations on the cover, fly leaf and inside by Pagram match the theme of the books perfectly. The books, GREAT GHOST STORIES edited by H. V. Ventral and GREAT TALES of MYSTERY and IMAGINATION edited by R.C. Bull

Commenting briefly on other books received; ALL OR NOTHING by Powys is strictly for Powys fans, crazier even than Fraser or Vonnegut. The DEEP BLUE ICE by Langston Day is about a mountaineer who is dug up after spending sixty years buried in a glacier. A.C. Clarke's new title The CHALLENGE of the SPACESHIP is a collection of articles on a variety of subjects, which make interesting reading. Two readable titles but nothing special THE NIGHT of the BIG HEAT and THE GIANT STUMBLES by John Lyndington from Hodder and Staughton. Well written but not what I would call entertaining is L.P. Hartley's FACIAL JUSTICE on the 1984 theme.
