Incidentally, if any members are also interested in the collecting of "Old Boys Books", i.e: Gems, Magnets, Plucks, Chums, Boys Friends, Scoops, Nelson Lees, Sexton Blakes etc. there is an "Old Boys Book Club" which meets regularly in London, the Secretary being:

Meetings are held regularly at different spots in London, Wood Green, Greenwich, Dulwich &c.

They have a good idea in connection with their Club in that different members are specialists in a particular sphere or magazine and are expert on say Nelson Lee or Greyfriars Stories,

## or St. Jims Stories and so on.

It might be considered by the General Committee of the S.F.S. that the B.F.L. could be split up into its component magazines with a member volunteering to run one section, say " The Astounding Stories Section "; " The Amazing Section "; " The Wonder Section " etc. etc. Each member if not an authority to start with would soon get to know all the mags. in his keeping. and could advise members as to which years stories by particular authors or in a certain series appeared. B.F.L. members would have the addresses of the eight or ten Sectional Librarians and could send direct to each for the particular mags he required. The General catalogue could be made up at H.Q. yearly as desired. To avoid members having too many mags out at one time, members could be issued with either one or else two membership cards which could be sent to the sectional Librarian with their want list and a ninepenny P.O. to cover postage on their parcel. On finishing with a section a S.A.E. could be enclosed when returning the last parcel for return of members card.

Librarians could be notified with a list of members from their E.F.S. Directory, each six months or yearly.

I hope members will consider the suggestion, and write and let me know what they think of it. It would require eight or ten volunteers, and the idea has the additional benefit that not much room is required by each of the Librarians as for example, the Astounding file could fit into a couple of drawers in a chest of drawers, or a trunk (with plenty of room to spare) and assuming that 20 members at the most each week sent for books to the Library as a whole it means that an individual librarian would only send off one or two parcels in a week which would not take more than ten minutes a week. It will give more members a feeling of activity in the interests of Fandom, and even if it were only the PLANET Stories Section with 2 dozen mags to look after, the interest is there, and the Librarian member for Planet Stories would be a mine of information in future years, as well as making new friends among his borrowers in the Fen World.
