Vote now!

Janice Murray and Art Widner are the candidates for this year's North-America-to-Australia DUFF race. You'll find a ballot with this newsletter. The voting period is short, so please get that ballot into the mail right away. The deadline is January 15, 1990.

The winner will travel to Brisbane, Queensland, and attend Suncon '91, the Australian National Convention, on the weekend of March 29–April 1, 1991; will travel around as much of fannish Australia as time and DUFF money permit; and will take over as North American administrator of the fund.

Both candidates have active connections already with Australian fandom, and both would make good DUFF representatives. We can't send both, however; you'll just have to vote, and choose which of them gets to go. (Well, you can always donate without voting, or vote "No preference" if you just want to support the fund. "No preference" votes, by the way, are not counted in calculating the number needed for a majority.) The fund is fairly healthy right now, but it'll be depleted in paying for the next trip, so please donate as generously as you can.

The voting fee is still \$2. I heard various opinions about whether to raise the fee, which has stayed at this level for years. Almost everyone who votes sends in at least \$5, as it happens. But this really means that it's not necessary to raise the fee, since most people donate \$5 anyway; and this way we keep the actual requirement low, so as not to

discourage anyone who wants to vote.

Suncon '91 just sent me their third progress report, which is where I learned that the official dates for the con are March 29 through April 1, not March 31 as I'd thought (and as it says on the ballot). The PR also reports, unfortunately, that Leigh Edmonds and Valma Brown will not be able to attend as Fan Guests of Honor, because of work commitments. All the more reason to include Perth in this year's DUFF tour.
