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BrickCan 2024 Announces Winners Jason Hunt





A Flood of Praise for *The Moon Pool* Robert Jennings



In June, 1918, Abraham's Merritt's groundbreaking story "The Moon Pool" appeared in the June 22 issue of *All-Story Weekly Magazine*, creating a sensation among readers that the editorial staff had never anticipated. In fact, the cover of that issue didn't even mention the story title or its author, but it became apparent almost immediately that "The Moon Pool" was the highlight of that issue for an overwhelming majority of readers.

A flood of letters from readers poured into the Munsey editorial offices praising the story and asking when a sequel would appear. This in turn caused the editors to pressure Merritt to come up with another adventure in the same setting as soon as possible. Merritt was happy to oblige. A much longer tale titled "The Conquest of the Moon Pool" ran as a serial beginning in the February 15th 1919 issue. Again, the reader response was wildly enthusiastic.

Merritt immediately considered joining the stories together as a feature length novel. Based on the overwhelming reader reaction the magazine stories had received, G. Putnam's Sons rushed the novel into publication in late 1919, just in time for the Christmas season.

It is difficult to overestimate the impact this novel had on the world of science fiction/fantasy. It immediately established Merritt as one of the pillars of twentieth century stf writing, and created a sub-genre of mystical fantasy high adventure that has endured well into today's fantastic fiction.

Essentially a type of fantasy lost race story, the hero is Dr. Walter T. Goodwin, who encounters a strange race of beings who had developed within the earth's core. These beings evolved super science linked with cosmic metaphysical powers and created an offshoot embodying great powers for

good and equal powers for evil. Over the course of eons, selfish greed and egotism has caused this being to become almost purely evil. Originally referred to as The Shinning One, now he is most often referred to as The Dweller.

The Dweller periodically comes to the surface of the world where it captures men and women to be used as a sort of nourishment and a source of knowledge about the world beyond its realm. Goodwin and his pilot Larry O'Keefe trace the paths into the depths of the earth where they learn of the Dweller and encounter two beautiful women; forceful, evil Yolara who serves the Dweller, and Lakla, handmaiden of The Shinning Ones who is good and tries to counteract Yolara and thwart the plans of The Dweller.

Laka has an entourage of toad-like beings who obey her every command. Yolara commands an army of handsome, extremely strong dwarfs who somewhat physically resemble Polynesians. Both these women are infatuated with O'Keefe, and are determined to win him as their mate. A major battle breaks out in which the forces of The Dweller hope to invade the outside world and subjugate the entire human race to the evil dominance of The Dweller, a battle that may shake the entire cosmos.

Lost Race stories were hot stuff in the world of stf during the latter half of the 19th and early third of the 20th centuries, pioneered by writers such as H. Ryder Haggard. What separated Merritt's writing from the other authors of the era was his extraordinary command of visual language. Using prose imagery that elapses the boundaries of the story itself, he established a dynamic written mastery that both enhances the story and also weaves an aura of ethereal weirdness that immediately creates an overwhelming exotic cocoon of other-worldliness: the very essence of sense-of-worder style writing.

Abraham Grace Merritt was born in 1884 and originally aspired to become a lawyer. He studied law, but got sidelined into the world of journalism. He was a reporter for the *Philadelphia Inquirer* when he suffered some sort of near-death experience that he refused to discuss the rest of his life, but it changed his entire career.

He got a job with Hearst publication *The American Weekly*, where his writing skills were immediately noticed. He could turn out folksy, down to earth homespun write-ups of family love and heroism, or exciting features about adventure and exploration in the far parts of the world, or lend realistic tension to articles about sports personalities or politicians.

He rapidly because an assistant editor of the magazine, where he wrote uncredited feature stories for the publication almost every week. For this work he was paid handsomely. He was earning \$24,000 a year in 1919, and his salary grew steadily so that by the time he took over as the fulltime editor of the publication in 1937 he was making \$100,000 a year (equivalent to \$2,200,000.00 in 2024 money).

His editorial position and his generous salary enabled him to pursue his interest in world travel, the occult, primitive anthropology, and the bizarre. He grew his own orchids, along with exotic plants thot to be related to witchcraft or occult properties such as wolfbane and belladonna. He owned real estate in the Caribbean, and had a library of over 500 volumes considered to be one of the largest collections of books and publications about witchcraft and the occult in the entire United States.



He was also a hypochondriac who complained often and long about his various ailments, most of which did not exist, and he played multiple musical instruments. He kept an assortment of musical instruments in a closet in *The American Weekly* offices that he would take out from time to time and play for the office staff, ending all work until his impromptu concerts were finished. This kind of behavior along with his friendliness with everyone, and his fairness with editors and freelancers alike made him very popular with the magazine staff. He also reportedly hated to fire anyone no matter how badly the person had screwed up an assignment. He was always willing to give people a second, or even a third or fourth chance to make up for mistakes.

He was so busy writing and editing for the magazine, plus his travels and horticulture experiments, that he had not much time left over for writing fiction, which was a great source of frustration for his millions of fans. He was well aware of the adoration of science fiction/fantasy fans, who sent him letters telling him how much they loved his stories, sent him copies of their fanzines, and constantly asked when his next story would appear.

His comments appeared from time to time in selected fanzines during the 1930s, and in 1936 he may have contributed a chapter of the famous round-robin fantasy adventure *Cosmos* that was organized by Ray Palmer and written by famous science fiction

authors. (There are persistent rumors that Merritt took so long turning in his chapter that the actual story might have been written by Ray Palmer instead). Merritt also hired fan favorite artists Virgil Finlay and Hannes Bok to do regular illustrations for *The American Weekly*. Hannes Bok became a close friend, and when Merritt died in 1943 of a heart attack in his Florida vacation home, Bok completed Merritt's unfinished final novel *The Black Ship*.

Over the course of his career Merritt wrote a total of eight novels, most fantasy or science fiction and one *Seven Footprints to Satan* that was so close to the format that nobody seemed to bother separating it from his other output. He also wrote fourteen stand-alone short stories, and a lot of poetry. Most of the poetry was unearthed after his death by SF fan and researcher Sam Moskowitz who published it as a separate volume in 1985. In between writing new fiction, several of his novels were turned into feature length movies, with a few, such as *Burn, Witch, Burn* being filmed multiple times over the years.

Most of Merritt's fictional work originally appeared in Munsey publications. *All-Story Weekly* eventually merged with *Argosy*, and even the Merritt was very slow to turn out new fiction, the Munsey editors, well aware of how popular his material was, made up for the long gaps between original works by reprinting his stories on a constant and regular

basis. The Munsey fantasy/SF magazines *Famous Fantastic Mysteries* and *Fantastic Novels* also reprinted every single Merritt story.



In addition, after Better Publications bought out Munsey and turned *Argosy* into a men's slick-paper magazine, they established *A. Merritt's Fantasy Magazine* in 1949 that ran five issues. The Avon Books division of the Hearst publishing enterprise under the guidance of long-time fan Don Wolheim established the Avon Murder Mystery series of digest sized paperback books that reprint all of Merritt's stories despite none of them being murder mysteries. Avon reprinted all of Merritt's novels on a regular basis in paperback from the early 1950s thru the end of the 1980s, whereupon Carroll & Graf took over the franchise in the 1990s.

The influence of *The Moon Pool* in the world of science fiction was long and enduring. H.P. Lovecraft was heavily influenced by the novel and incorporated many of its plot elements into his own writings. Lovecraft openly praised Merritt in letters to friends and collogues. Richard Shaver, creator of the so-called Shaver Mystery stories and hypothesis, was a long-time fan of Merritt, and often expressed his belief that the story elements in *The Moon Pool* were true, but Merritt was compelled to present the facts in the form of fiction. Shaver's own stories of underground caverns and the Deros, degenerate gnome-like creatures, was taken directly from the premises established in *The Moon Pool*.

Today *The Moon Pool* and all of Merritt's other fiction has fallen into public domain and can be read for free at Project Guttenberg and many other on-line free fiction sites. Many parts of the story appear hopelessly

dated. Larry O'Keefe, the stalwart male figure who

becomes the object of desire by the two women inside the hidden caverns beneath the earth emerges as pretty much a lunkhead, unable to believe things he sees with his own eyes and unwilling to accept the fantastic reality of the situation even as it unfolds. Dr. Goodwin is more human, but is reserved and eventually emerges as little more than a cardboard narrator for the adventure. But the writing itself, the way the story unfolds, the mystical counterparts sand the overwhelming sense of eerie other worldliness still holds strong and compelling more than a century after it was originally written.

The Moon Pool was a stroke of genius that established the reputation of A. Merritt, and directly affected the entire science fiction and fantasy genres. It was far from being Merritt's best story. Burn, Witch, Burn; Creep, Shadow; and Dwellers in the Mirage are far better plotted, better written, and certainly feature better characters. But The Moon Pool was the cornerstone that launched Merritt's fiction career. If you have never read this story, you should do so. Read it in paper format or read it at Project Guttenberg or at any of the other on-line sites where it is posted for free. And if you read this story a long time ago, pick it up again and reread it, and learn again what sparked that original sense of wonder, and why this story became a legend as soon as it was published.
