Confiction - 1990 WorldCon

The Bel Air is a five-star hotel, which means it's about equal to a Holiday Inn, except in price. Someone will have to explain to these European hotels about convention room sharing. There was only one key per room, no matter how many people were sharing, and they expect you to leave the key at the desk when you went out. What they thought you should do when you were going to sleep and your roommate was out partying is a mystery to me.

Thursday I spent a few hours doing setup on the history of fanzines exhibit. The convention had not exactly got their logistics planning down; there were not enough pegboard hangers for the art show, let alone the fanzine exhibit and the photo gallery. We eventually got some paper clips which I was able to engineer into something better than the "real" hangers (mine

didn't leap out of the pegboard at the slightest excuse).

Opening ceremonies were marked by a rather strange, rambling speech by con chairman Kees Van Toorn, with the guests of honor rising up from underneath the stage. (They couldn't get the dry ice they needed, unfortunately.) There was someone from the Dutch government to welcome us as well.

I did not go to much of the programming. The Congressgebouw is not in a very interesting area, but I did make a few sightseeing excursions while in the Hague. One was to a large miniature city about a mile away called Madurodam. Sat Dec 08 -- Unofficial confirmation has been achieved. The following information is subject to change, but it probably won't. To wit:

ConCerto '91 will be held June 28-30, 1991 at the Cherry Hill Inn. in Cherry Hill, N.J. Note the change in date and venue from last year. The Cherry Hill Inn is located in a much better area than last year's Holiday Inn, being across Rte. 38 from the massive Cherry Hill Mall. The hotel itself is absolutely beautiful! It sits on a 14-acre site, much of which is covered by hotel. It sprawls, in other words. You may have heard the filk about the Red Lion Inn... this hotel may eclipse that. Room rates start at \$68/single and range up thru \$84/quad. These room rates, however, include a breakfast buffet in the hotel's main restaurant, which by itself is a \$7 value... so, for four people sharing an \$84 quad, the effective room rate is \$56 if you don't include the value of the buffet (which is of highest quality). The hotel itself could be considered a resort hotel; a getaway weekend in late June might be all the excuse you need to come, especially at these rates. Oh, and by the way, there will be filkers present. Lots of them.

We have two ballrooms on a lower level, just below the lobby and near the spa. One will hold the main programming and the dealer's room, and the other across the hall will be secondary programming. The con suite will be a suite in the guest rooms area. Anticipated guests of honor, pending confirmation, will be a filk/folk group from the D.C. area, "Peregrine". They have become very popular in the Maryland/ Virginia area, and we are pleased to give them what might become their "big break." (Actually, most filkers we know who came last year would come again even if the GoH was Barbara Bush... a See Concerto on Page 2.

Con-Chord Report

Well, I've about recovered from Con-Chord 6. All in all, it was a fun convention. My particular blessings on Liz Martin and whoever else was responsible for the Kibitz 'n Kids room (also the closest thing we had to a con suite.) Thanks also to those who brought food. Though the sound level from the TV often left much to be desired, most of the time it worked so well that even though I spent a lot of time in there, I saw more of the concerts than I usually do when I come without Vicky. In fact during the one-shots, a number of us used it for an impromptu green room. The TV also alerted me to the fact that I'd won a Kazoo Award in time to come in and claim it - since it was for Communications (the Filk Echo to be precise) this was peculiarly appropriate! Said kazoo, complete with modem plug, is now sitting on top of the computer when my four year old isn't using it. With the exception of a few typoes and one misattribution the convention songbook came out very well, especially considering that it was almost a last minute addition. We'll have to do this again next year! Notable inclusions: "History 2001", Jane Mailander's filk of Billy Joel's "We Didn't Start the Fire"; "The Hound of the Filkervilles", Bob Kanefsky's filk of Jane's "Hound of the Baskervilles" ("If you value your serious lyrics, my friend, For God's sake, never sing'em to Jane!"); "The Ballad of Brave Indiana and Knights of the Museum", Jane again, picking on Monty Python this time; "Filkin' Danny Davis", by Nick Smith to "Danny Deever"; "The Heralds Said To Me", by Joe Bethancourt & C. McCray Bethancourt to "The Twelve Days of Christmas"; "The Meta-Morph's Carol", by Chris Weber to "I'll be Home for Christmas" ("And you can be... the tree!"). I even finally got "Rudolph's Ride" (to "Moreta" by Anne Harlan Prather) and "Moreta" (to Rudolph the Red Nosed Reindeer) published together (where they belong.)

Con-Chord 6 Wrap Up Posted by Eric Gerds

Con-Chord 6 had 138 members, including con-com and guests. Seventy-five of them were pre-reg, the rest were at the door or supporting.

The Hotel said that we had 77 room nights, while our records showed that we had 80. Since 75 was the break point, we are not going to fight over the last few rooms. We are talking with the hotel for next year and the first draft of the contract should be in my hands in a week or so. I'll let everyone know.

Julia Ecklar did a two hour concert on Saturday night, a record for a filkcon, to my knowledge. I've heard very few complaints about the hotel, other than they should have had more staff in the coffee shop on Sunday morning. The only real major problem with the hotel was that they lost several people's reservations, but they were given rooms when they got there.

I want to thank everyone for the kind words about the program book. I put a lot of time and energy into making it and I am proud of how it turned out. Kay Shapero did a great job collection most of the songs over the bbs lines. She is going to do it again next year.

I didn't have a room at the hotel, so I cannot comment on that, but as far as I could see the Holiday Inn was a very good hotel for a convention of this size. The staff were very friendly and courteous, the conference rooms (four of them) were right next to each other (no chasing wildly about the hotel, map in hand, trying to find the Shangri-La room in time for your next panel), and the restaurant was right across the hall from the concert room. The food was decent, the prices about what you'd expect from a hotel restaurant, but the fact that they provided kid's meals for \$1.00 each meant that with Vicky along I probably didn't spend any more than I would have if we'd gone to the McDonald's located conveniently across the street. Styles of Filking An East Coast View

Most of the discussions on various styles of filking that I've heard or read do not accurately reflect the East Coast experience (for instance, the myth that we prefer the singalong). Here is a description of some of the different styles of filk that I have encountered (please note that the definitions are based solely on my own experiences):

Bardic Circle - This used to mean a strict pick-pass-play circle. I felt the term meant any filk circle. However, "Bardic" now means anything from singing to drawing pictures and hasn't much to do with filking anymore.

Filk Circle - (This is the term filkers are now using instead of "Bardic".) Any circle of any style where filking is done.

Modified Bardic - A pick-pass-play circle with the chance to jump in with an "I can top that" song.

Performance Circle - Several Big Name Filkers (BNFs) holding court. This happens more than most people would like at East Coast Filks, since, as most of the East Coasters are **not** BNFs, this allows very few filkers a chance to sing.

Sing-Along - One filker leads everyone else (mostly neos) in a hymnal sing. This is not the favored style of most (including East Coast) filkers. It is rarely encountered outside the Boston area.

Encounter Circle - Two or three filkers are asked before the filk starts to jump in with a song and keep the circle going only if it bogs down. This is a term created for Noreascon.

<u>Demi-ghod Circle</u> - One or two filkers take charge (usually a committee member of the con you are at) and keep the circle going. This is especially helpful if you have a large group.

Chaos - There is no particular order to who performs, anyone can jump in and sing when the previous song is done. However, if you don't have a loud voice you may not be heard and accidently get "stepped on". (When this happens in a circle I'm at I, will usually speak up [since I don't need a loud speaker to be heard] for the quiet person so things can stay fair.)

At Philcon we have a fairly large contingent of neo filkers and those who just like to listen, so we have come up with a compromise circle. We start with an inner "Filk Circle" [see above] (which is allowed to grow when needed) for those who want to sing. We add rows of chairs either to one side or around the outside of the "circle" depending on how the room is shaped for those who like to listen to filk, but don't want to sing. Our "Demi-ghod" (usually Crystal Hagel or myself) makes sure that the "audience" knows they are invited to give input to the circle. As the filking progresses around the circle the demi-ghod will point to each individual in the "audience" rows behind the current performer and ask them if they want to sing, pick a song/subject/tune/etc. for the next person to sing, or request a particular filker in the inner "filk circle" to sing. We also incorporate the "Modified Bardic" style into this strange compromise circle. This style works for us only because of the odd composition of mostly non-performers at large filks.

I've been to Con-Chord and to OVFF (1989) and had a wonderful time at both. The filking at Con-Chord was similar to circles I've encountered on the East Coast which helped me feel comfortable at my first Filk convention. My impression of the style was that of a "modified Bardic" with a bit of a "performer's circle" thrown in. OVFF, on the other hand, was a jam session most of the weekend utilizing the "Chaos" style which worked because most of the local filkers had sung together for a long time and could jump in with a harmony or an instrument at any time. (By the way, this is a form of "sing-a-long" even if no one admits it.)

Right after she finished the song, which involved pulling various items out of a satchel on stage, her small daughter Madeleine capped it by calling from the audience, "Put that back in the closet when you get home, Mommy!" Colleen Savitzky as Miss Piggy doing "Do You Know The Way To San Jose" and (excuse me) hamming it up wonderfully. "Captain Sidney's Malady" as presented by Nick Smith, Barry Gold and Mary Creasey. Nick played the long suffering captain, seated on an ice chest, complete with magazines and "the negatives" in an envelope... the song's in Xenofilkia 13 if you haven't seen it!

I remember enjoying the one-shots, though at this point I'm rather hazy about what was sung at them; probably the effect of being nervous before I went on and self critical afterwards. I do recall Mara Brener doing a splendid presentation of "The Night the Bed Fell". I think Thurber would have approved her musical version! I don't suppose I did that badly, modulo feeding Dan Deckert to the python by mistake for Dan Davis during an impromptu performance of "Snakes Alive". So much for last minute interpolations! I also joined in on the performance of "Green Hills of Earth" as directed by Mark Bernstein after a rather hectic rehearsal of one hour. It turned out rather well, all things considered (even if we were a mite flat, according to Rod O'Riley, who taped it); first time I've ever been on the receiving end of a standing ovation. Thanks, folks!

Fliktape Review

Wackademia by Jane Robinson

About three years ago, Off Centaur Publications put out a tape called Dr. Jane's Science Notes which had a number of marvelous humorous songs about science. Since then, OCP has gone out of business, and thus the tape is no longer available. THOR Records, however, has now re-recorded most of the songs from that tape, and released them on "Wackademia". The advantage now is that one can hear and understand all the lyrics, and the arrangements fit better with the content. There is also a sense of vitality and spontaneity in the presentation here, something that seemed to be lacking on the previous incarnation of the tape.

Dr. Jane Robinson wrote and performed all the words and music (except the music to "Drivel", written by Dave Van Ronk), with the help of The Primordial Oohz. Her science background enabled her to poke fun at science and academia. In "Drivel" she looks at the "act" of writing papers. The frustrations of registering for classes and other administrivia are summarized in "Anthem to Bureaucracy" and "Song of the Middle Manager". Other topics include cats ("The Overflowing' Catbox Blues"), research ("The 'I Don't Know It' Blues", "We Can't Find...[The Creature in Loch Ness]", and "A Look at Things That Don't Exist"), geology ("Dooda Rock Rock") and chemistry ("Battle with the Elements").

For anyone with an interest or "bent" for science, these songs are right up your periodic table.

The flight test program of the JLBC 1 will begin immediately at Edwards AFB, CA. Testing will proceed in a standard buildup fashion beginning with crying, drooling, and diaper-soiling, proceeding through walking, talking and reading, and continuing to an eventual conclusion of going to college, making a heap of money, and supporting her parents in luxury in their old age. Estimated cost of the test program, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, is believed to be approximately 250,000 dollars.

Advanced Features

The vehicle in question incorporates many stealth features, appearing to most observers as a cute little baby. nide to the cheese market at Alkmaar, northwest of Amsterdam. Unfortunately, the cheese market was filled with tourists, and it was hard to see much.

The filking was a British affair; there were just five other American filkers besides myself. While there were a number of appreciative Germans in the audience, apparently filk has only recently reached the non-English-speaking world, and they haven't produced any of their own. To help introduce people to the concept, Roger Robinson of Beccon Publications was the castaway on "Desert Island Filks" where he got a number of filkers (including me) to do a sampling which covered the different facets pretty well. The concom did not provide well for the filkers; only two nights were allocated in the Congress Center, and while the Bel Air function rooms were supposed to be available for the other nights, the hotel manager shut down the function space one night. Shades of Brighton!

As for the rest of WorldCon, there were only five hundred-odd Americans out of a total membership in the 2500-3000 range (including day memberships). I wasn't sure about why it was so low, though some people suggested that the weak dollar coupled with layoffs in the computer and

defense industries had a lot to do with it. There was a fairly large eastern European contingent - many East Germans, a bunch of Poles, some Czechs, Russians, and Hungarians and at least one Bulgarian. One Russian and one American couple were victimized by thieves (the Americans in Paris, the Russians I don't know where) and had to make an appeal to fandom at large for donations.

Overall, it was not as slickly run as Noreascon (but then, what else could be?), but there were come interesting things done there. One was the "Dutch Treat" - a small area where people could buy drinks or a meal (depending on the time slot) for various Pros and talk to them. I sat in on the one with Chelsea Quinn Yarbro and found it fascinating. The masquerade was a real flop; there were only thirty-something entrants and they were really scraping the bottom of the barrel. I'm not too surprised; if I were spending the money to go to Europe, I'd leave my costuming stuff behind in favor of what I'd be willing to carry when I started touring.

Food was not well provided for. There was one cafeteria in the Congressgebouw itself, and a few restaurants within a reasonable distance, but nothing like the cheap fast eats we're used to here. Actually, the best place for a nutritious and inexpensive meal in Holland is at a herring stand - I love the little fishies, and downed a fair number of them. You can get them smoked, but the purist's way is raw salted herring, called nieuwe. In the Hague, one vendor told me that I was the first American to sample his wares. I told him how to get the Yanks to buy - just tell them it's Dutch sushi.

San Francisco learned a valuable lesson from the failed D.C. in '92 bid -- keep your hotel problems secret until after you win. Immediately after the results were announced, we learned that due to another convention they would not have all their function space until Friday. Had that been known beforehand, I think the Hawaii write-in (which finished second) would have won. Major shock: Zagreb finished third, ahead of Phoenix.
