UNDERSTANDING YOUR MAILING LABEL

Besides the basic address-lines, there are two code-marks; one alphabetic and the other numeric. The A or C indicates why you are getting this issue. A=active member, C=contributor. (If neither appears, you may assume Editorial Whim). The numeric code is YY/MM/DD for your expiration date. DD is always the last date in any month, so of YY/MM falls between 30 days before and 60 days after the postmark date on this issue, you need to renew NOW to be sure of getting the next issue. Foundation membership remains \$15 per year.

Filkharmonics), lap-harps, Sally Childs-Helton's drums, various synthesizer and keyboard players (I noticed at OVFF that an electronic keyboard got abandoned when the fellow discovered we had a Real Piano' in the room), the annual Chambanacon Irish Jam, 60's songs at 3 in the morning -- how can anyone get bored? I'm waiting for a rock band to get organized. ((Catch a WisCon sometime and look for a hirsute person named Christopher Fisher [a.k.a. Baron Niall Morbius])) The arguments about "It isn't real filk" remind me of the arguments about amplifying acoustic folk accompaniment. And now we're lucky if we get to hear any folk at all. Or we're filkers, and we sing it ourselves.

I would rather hear seventeen different styles of music than drive people away (some even before they join in) because what they do isn't "real" filk.

got acquainted with Jane Robinson and Kristoph Klover, who with Melissa Mar were the Off-Centaur reps at the con, while we and they were setting up. Jane was the star of the convention. We were among the very few fans who had heard her tape "Dr.Jane's Science Notes" before the con, but after she performed a few songs from the tape, everyone wanted a copy. Not only did we sell out, but Off-Centaur did as well, and presumably they'd brought a lot more than the 10 copies we had. Jane is also a very pleasant personality, a trait which doesn't always go with musical talent.

It was discovered the hard way that the hotel, a relatively small Holiday Inn, had assured the concom that there was no live

entertainment in its lounge; and then promptly changed management and brought in a live combo. The lounge, of course, was almost directly across the hall from the filk room. There was some talk of acquiring amps of our own and blasting them back, but nothing came of it. Saturday's program was hastily shuffled, to put the panels at night, opposite the combo, and the singing in the afternoon, when most mundanes stay at home where they belong. I hope that Wail Songs got enough usable material for a tape; Bob Laurent was working under extremely adverse conditions.

As usual, I didn't go to the panels, and can't report on them. I was too busy huckstering and partying.

The wedding of Bill Sutton and Brenda Craven happened Saturday evening. It had been planned as a genuine wedding, but then Brenda's divorce papers didn't come through in time, so it had to be, technically, a display of intentions. There was a lot of music, suitable for a filk wedding. At the finale, Bill and Brenda jumped over a guitar, in lieu of the traditional broomstick. Interestingly, the wedding went out over one of the computer networks as it happened.

Saturday night lasted a long time, with filking again, despite the competition from the lounge, and more partying. At about 1:00 AM. Moonwolf said he'd talked Misty Lackey's brother (old buddy of Wolfie's) into buying a copy of "Rifles and Rhyumes", but he had to leave at 5:00 AM to catch his plane. Someone said the back door of the huckster room was probably open, and it was, and we went in and I sold a couple of tapes. Then I told Sally Smith about the open room and she looked horrified and saw to getting it locked. Fortunately, most filkers are honest, and filk tapes aren't in much demand by hotel employees.

I spent the rest of the night in a room party with Jordin Kare, Mitchell Clapp, and TJ Burnside, plus a few listeners like me. Jordin and Mitch were seeing how many old MIT and CalTech songs they could remember when I arrived, but went on to other things. Mitch said he'd been turned in to Air Force Security for performing a mildly anti-Russian song (Air Force officers aren't allwed to engage in politics) but that Security listened to the song, said "That's not so bad" and ignored the complaint. This led to a discussion of what songs might be dangerous in which communities, which was capped by TJ, who said she can't perform Stan Rogers' "House of Orange" in Boston. Well, nobody said the Irish-Americans are liberal and openminded.

On Sunday, the noon checkout time for the hotel coincided with the scheduled opening of the huckster room. Our handtruck was in the huckster room and we needed it to move our luggage behind our huckster table before checkout time. I asked Emily Vasquez if I could get into the room to get it, and she asked Kathy Hamilton, who was co-chairman, and Kathy simply opened the room at 10:00 instead of noon. People came in immediately, and we did a fairly rousing

business. Barry came down at noon, and said rather bemusedly that the program book said this was the time the room opened. (I explained to him that since I was sleeping with 3 of the 10 committee members, was the father-in-alw of a fourth, and had performed the marriage of a fifth, I had a certain amount of pull with the committee, and had gotten in early).

Mitch came in briefly to announce that he'd been transferred to Edwards AFB, so this was his last midwest filk for the forseeable future. Look for California to go Australian next year.

Eventually we had to pack up our remaining tapes, load the car, and head for home, making plans for Windycon along the way. Incidentally, our gross income at OVFF, with 150 attendees, was a good \$150 more than our gross at Windycon the next week, and Windycon had at least 1800 people. That was sort of the icing on the cake for us, but we'd have enjoyed OVFF it we hadn't made a nickel.

We were doing fine, but the smokers and nonfilkers down in the elevator lobby area and consuite were dying, and we had to allow the blower to be turned on intermittently, out of the generosity of our hearts. As Wulfie said, there's a reason why it wasn't unbearably smoky in our room, and why didn't the chimneys go and do likewise? But... We may be in a different filking room next year. Our choice, Marsha Brim hinted.
