ANZAPA NOTES

After the massive tome that was the 828-page ANZAPA 338 had thumped onto my hard drive in April, I sent out a message to all ANZAPAns noting that I wouldn't be including my personalzine **Perryscope** in future mailings. This didn't come about just because of the size of that mailing, nor because David Grigg expressed dismay at the size of the thing and the amount of work it took to get it into shape; I had been thinking about making the change for a while. Here are a few reasons:

- 1. I appreciate that **ANZAPA** was originally set up, partly, as a way of distributing members' fanzines to a receptive audience, and thereby, hopefully, ensuring the costs of distribution were lowered. This was in a time when such fanzines were generally smaller so the overall effect was not as much of an impact as it is now. I note that recent issues of my perzine have been pushing up towards 30 pages, and with a monthly publishing schedule the total page count is starting to get rather big. Of the April mailing I was responsible for 78 pages, or a touch under 10% of the total. That's way too much of me I reckon.
- 2. I'm of the view that the heart of an apa is the mailing comments, the discussion back and forth between members that makes up the community. The more of these there are the better. A similar property also makes for a good general fanzine. When the letter column is lively (such as in Nic Farey's **This Here...**) it lifts the mood and overall quality of the rest of the zine. But I also believe the two of these shouldn't cross over. I've never been a fan of those fanzines I receive that, in the main, consist of mailing comments on an apa of which I am not a member. As much as a fanzine editor might say that the comments are generalised and can be read by anyone they tend to lack context and it feels like a large part of the conversation is missing. How can I follow that? If someone's apazine sparks a writer to produce a long mailing comment in response I'd prefer they turned it into something that can stand alone and be appreciated as such. The two types of discourse are similar but very different at the same time.
- 3. I started **Perryscope** back in August 2020 with the idea that it would be just an apazine destined for **ANZAPA** alone. But I soon started to realise that there was a whole lot of stuff I wanted to write about that I thought a wider audience (family and friends and other fans who were not members) might appreciate, and so turned it into a standardised perzine with a wider distribution. It didn't "outgrow" **ANZAPA** it just morphed into something else, something that I hadn't forecast when I started it. By the time you read this I will, probably and hopefully, have sent out issue 44 and that is something I would never have envisaged four years ago.

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4. It appears that a number of ANZAPAns really want to write mailing comments on everything in a mailing, to respond to every apazine and genzine alike. But the current size and number of contributions of the apa make that a very difficult task indeed. It's rather like painting the Sydney Harbour Bridge, in that once you finish it's time to go back to the beginning and re-start all over again. I don't think I should make the task of producing mailing comments any harder for anyone. I think that just reduces a member's enjoyment. If a mailing arrives and you inwardly groan at the prospect of reading all of it and wonder how you are going to get through it all in the two months available, then I think it has gotten too big.

Therefore, I won't be sending in issues of **Perryscope** to ANZAPA any more, but I have noted the comments from a number of ANZAPA members that they do want to see the fanzine so I've taken the liberty of adding everyone on the current mailing roster to my contact list and to the **Perryscope** mailing cohort. You will have started to receive those issues already. If you don't want to keep receiving it, just send me an email asking to be removed from the list and I will then do so. I know it's not for everyone. As I said to Marc Ortlieb recently, I really only produce it for an audience of one, ie "me". If anyone else happens to enjoy it as well then so much the better.

[As a final note on this subject, please be aware that the comments here pertain to my thinking only. I make no judgments on, and offer no advice to, anyone else. What they decide to do is up to them and will reflect their thinking. Everyone is different and everyone's view is valid.]
