C.S. Kilby has agreed to be the Guest of Honor at the Convention, baring unforscen circumstances. Professor Kilby is very possibly the formost scholar on Tolkien and Lewis. He has written two books on C.S. Lewis: The Christian World of C.S. Lewis, a survey of his writings, and A Mind Awake, an anthology of short passages from Lewis' writings. Kilby has also written several essays and papers on Tolkien, and went to England in the Summer of 1966 to assist Tolkien in catching up with Tolkien's correspondence, so that Tolkien could spend more time.

PL Travers speaks

Mrs. Pamela L. Travers, the author of the Mary Poppins books, Spoke m Garrison Auditorium at the Claremont Colleges on February 16 on the Subject "In Search of The Hero, the continuing relevance of myth and fairy tale." About seven members of the Society were able to hear her talk. Her ideas are in the same fundamental area as the mythopoeic writers, saying myths never were and alvays are; we live in myth. Myths do not have one meaning, but are many sided like symbols and jewels. She invited us the turn the diamond, seeing it sparkle. She also spoke on the development of the hero. A hero seeks to rediscover that which is lost, he becomes a channel for the Gods to come to man. She ended by saying "everyone has to be the hero of one story - his own."
