


Nailing My Colours to the Mast of a Sinking Ship

Since I have an ordination in the Universal Life Church, and have been acting as Clerk of the Heathen Freehold in British Columbia for a few years, it might be entertaining to consider what kind of spiritual statements I might make, if I were really licensed to do so. (I was raised not to discuss politics, religion, or how I manage my money, but that was another culture back then, wasn't it.)

If we have to believe anything, let us believe that human lives have worth, and value, and meaning. That meaning has something to do with learning, and growth – in personality, in maturity, in wisdom and character. This is an arbitrary proposition, but then we're going to take something on faith, won't we? That's what humans do.

Let us also believe that respect for ourselves means respect for others. If we value our own capacity for learning and growth, we will value the capacity in others, and foster it. Of course this value is honoured more in the breach than in the observance – as witness the behaviour of many parents – but that mainly says something about the half-blindness or emotional baggage that many of us carry around. The judgment and disdain we pass on other people usually has to do with our own faults, which we see in others.

If there are facts of life that most of us had better know, one of them is that people are diverse. For some reason my family seemed to believe that every sensible person grew up pretty much the same way and had much the same personality, or behaved and reacted to events similarly; but this could not be further from the truth. My experience of family, and friends, and teachers, and co-workers, and employers is that there are scores of different personality types, with unpredictable outlooks and confounding emotional baggage.

You cannot decide what is sensible, correct behaviour on the basis of the people around you, only on the basis of the real situations around you, and your personal boundaries. The famous "bell curve" may be a good model to apply here, if we assume that some measure of personal character could be defined, and that it would show the general population is distributed on a classic bell curve, from saints to villains.

Another fact of life is that some people are simply dangerous to others. We call them psychopaths and sociopaths these days, instead of "evil" or "sinful." A distinction without a distinction. It can take time to recognize the dangerous ones, and to extricate yourself from contact with them. It can take too long. Con artists and Internet scams and disinformation mills are mere nuisances by comparison.


Another fact of life is that some people are simply problems looking to happen to you. They may merely be very stupid, or professionally helpless and dependent and looking for others to use, financially or emotionally or sexually. It can also take too long to recognize these ones.

Other facts of life have to do with the natural world, rather than people. There are prevailing beliefs going around now that things happen to us for reasons, and at just the right time, and we only face trials that we can bear. I don't believe any of these

propositions: environmental and economic bad news happens when it happens, for no reasons connected with us, and completely out of proportion to our ability to withstand them. If there is a God, apparently it is not his job to protect us from events we will not survive, and our part is to pray for strength and resources to make what we can, of good fortune and bad.

If there is no God, it is our job to lend meaning to life. We do this by learning to become as great in character as we can be, and assisting others to do so as well. We do this by daily works and by providing for a better future, if we can. Time and chance tend to destroy a lot of human works. We just have to set to work again, knowing that a little of what we create will endure.

Also I think we're living in a virtuality so badly-coded that cats cause gravity by lying on things, but that's another story.

The idea of taking over a non-media convention so that you can change it to a media convention sounds a bit strange to me. As Lloyd recounts, any goodwill attached to the name of the convention goes up in smoke if you keep the name but change the content. Why bother? It's a mystery. Or am I getting old?

Cliff Samuels, who is now the Grey Eminence of Calgary fandom, told me that the longstanding Conversion convention ended after a new committee thought it a good idea to make it a Star Trek convention ... which drew a lot fewer people and, I gather, did not cover its costs. That's just one example of misunderstanding your congoers' interests; there are doubtless many others.))

Lloyd's suggestion of putting CUFF funds into an account and allowing interest to accumulate until interest in the idea of a fan fund revives ... put me in mind of Magrathea in THHGTTG. The inhabitants of that planet had to sleep for hundreds of millions of years waiting for the galactic economy to return to a state where there would be a demand for their services. Hopefully, not an indicator of how long you'll need to leave the CUFF funds in an interest account. Still, look on the bright side. After hundreds of millions of years the CUFF funds could be used to order a custom designed planet ...

((One respondent, when I last asked for people's opinions on this fan fund, welcomed the idea of a travel fund assisting members of one fandom to represent it to other fandoms. It may not take that long to repurpose the fund. The question now is whether mediafans and costumers and gamers, etc., etc. are going to support a travel fund.))

I see that I mentioned Magrathea in a loc on *Obdurate Eye* #39. Is this repetition a sign that I am getting old?

((I am resigned to the fact that I will sometimes repeat myself. In an attempt to prevent repetition I have been accumulating my fanwriting into a growing folder, so that I can index topics covered and try to avoid flagellating any more expired equines.))

One-word answers to some questions. "Should the Bible be banned in public schools?" No. "Is evolution a religion?" No. "Is atheism a religion?" No.

Is it wrong to sack someone or to refuse to hire them for their sexual orientation? In Australia, both of these courses of action are generally illegal. However, Catholic schools and other religious institutions have some exemptions from anti-discrimination laws. The right-of-centre parties generally don't have a problem with this, because secretly they are not fans of anti-discrimination laws. There's also an argument that if someone's personal opinions, or lifestyle choices, are inconsistent with the religious doctrine of the institution, then the institution *should* be able to discriminate against the individual. The main left-of-centre party doesn't have a problem with such discrimination, because a significant number of voters send their children to Catholic schools.

My impression is that twenty-five years ago it was relatively uncommon for the children of non-Catholic parents to attend a Catholic school. For starters, part of the application process typically required you to provide a reference from your local priest. Today ... I wouldn't say it was common, but more Catholic schools are opening their arms, at least a little bit, to non-Catholic students. The reason for this is that are insufficient Catholic children to support Catholic schools.

Your suggestion of making your [life skills] "manual a satirical handbook" sounds like a basis for an entertaining book. And possibly a very popular book. I am sure that there are many people who feel that they do not fit in with societal norms and want to know how to do so.

Is transcribing minutes from Zoom meetings different to transcribing them from regular meetings? My first academic position, as a postdoc, was in the Department of Fuel and Energy at the University of Leeds. (I also had a position in the Department of Applied Mathematics.) Postdocs were NOT invited to the school meetings. However, I knew the person whose job it was to make [sic] the minutes – it was the job of the most recently appointed member of staff. He told me that the procedure was as follows. He wrote the minutes. He emailed them to the Head of School. The Head of School then rewrote them to make them 'correct,' i.e., the minutes had to reflect what the Head of School thought should have been said, rather than what was said.

((The difference between transcribing minutes from Zoom meetings is only that I can go back and replay things I didn't quite hear the first time, which is a little more clumsy on Zoom transcripts than on dictation transcription machines. The last time, though, I had to make handwritten notes as the meeting went along – no recording would be available. The procedure you describe is de rigueur for transcriptions. Even as an experienced secretary, I am liable to misunderstand or just not understand what people said, if it's at all abstract to me; so I'm just as happy to send my draft to the chair of the meeting.))

I'm already a member of two APAs. Sometimes I think it would be fun to join a third APA, but only if it had a low number of members and it was quarterly so it didn't involve much additional work... A monthly apa sounds like too much work.

((I cheat by copying a fair amount of my opinion pieces from one zine to another.))

Following up on a comment by "RailFan Zine." In my old age, if 56 be old age, I have come to the realization that I prefer writing literature reviews rather than original research.

White Dwarf Books hosted the Meet Nalo Hopkinson Book Launch on Tuesday Nov 5th 7 pm for *Jamaica Ginger and Other Concoctions* (Tachyon Publications, \$21.95 trade paperback).

About the Book

"Caribbean-Canadian author Nalo Hopkinson (*Brown Girl in the Ring, The Salt Roads*, *Falling in Love with Hominids*) is an internationally renowned storyteller. This long-awaited new collection of her deeply imaginative short fiction offers striking journeys to far-flung futures and fantastical landscapes. Hopkinson is at the peak of her powers, moving effortlessly between art, folklore, science, and magic. Hailed by the *Los Angeles Times* as having an imagination that most of us would kill for, Nalo Hopkinson and her Afro-Caribbean, Canadian, and American influences shine in truly unique stories that are gorgeously strange, inventively subversive, and vividly beautiful. In 2020, Hopkinson was named the Damon Knight Grand Master by the Science Fiction Writers of America, and is the youngest and the first woman of African descent to receive this lifetime honor. As a professor of Creative Writing at the University of California Riverside, she was a member of the Speculative Futures Collective. Hopkinson is currently a professor in the School of Creative Writing at the University of British Columbia, and she lives in Vancouver, Canada."

"I'll give you to a count of ten, and if you can't come up with something, I'm walking out of here..."

So the Balkanization of fandom is still a current topic? I thought I had beaten it to death, Nic. It's good that people like Bob Jennings and Heath Row would prefer civil discourse and a united *agora* between different fandoms; but there are several factors militating against them.

Now, I'm not talking about the closed-mindedness Bob Jennings reports, or the imagined feuds or slights that people hold against fanzine fans, or other fandoms. I'm thinking about demographics and small-group dynamics and sociological issues – just the kinds of issues I struggle to deal with in person, but keep trying to master. (I call it "practicing sociology without a license.")

The major factor is that any single-interest fandom, whether it's some kind of anime or comics or gaming or media franchise, is now large enough to satisfy any fan's hobby interests, and social needs. Perhaps as important is the fact, as Ulrika O'Brien pointed out, that nothing serves the role of a focal point fanzine these days. Perhaps nothing can.

You and I date from decades when fandom was "We few, we happy, happy few, we band of brothers" (and sisters) – and, let's be honest, SF fandom in those decades was a much smaller interest group, so despite being globally distributed, fans tended to interact in correspondence somewhat like a small community. It was also very much a refuge for social marginals.

And then, in the early 1970s, Star Trek fandom happened. Suddenly the fan population blew up by at least an order of magnitude. Little wonder if fans since then are first exposed to post-1970s definitions of clubs, conventions, fanzines, and for that matter social media.

Since the Internet and the World Wide Web happened, the overwhelming size of contemporary fandom naturally leads people to focus on much narrowly-defined fandoms. People can only handle so many social connections. As the social distance (lack of communication) increases, it's natural for different fandoms to make their own little worlds, and imagine anything at all about the other fandoms.

Of course that means that different fandoms simply *don't* share the same points of reference. It has come to the point where I have to explain what "fannish" fandom means.

And all the foregoing is a twice-told tale. It somewhat parallels the phenomena of red shift and galaxies apparently accelerating as their distance in the universe increases, and something about the heat death of the cosmos, too, but I've never quite worked it out into a functional comedy routine.

No one, to my knowledge, has asked what comes next? A stage where manga (and hentai) fans are considered Old Farts by a new generation of AI-enabled independent animation artists? College courses based on pulp adventure writing, requiring term papers tracing the market expectations shaping Golden Age science fiction?

Onward.

Ulrika O'Brien does a service by naming journalists who haven't gone along with pandering to a demographic segment's biases; I am still trying to find such sources in order to make informed judgments, in my odd neck of the woods. Maybe she has offered a clue. (And a warning about being too obviously skeptical and contrarian.)

Something related to demographics occurs to me, while reading Ulrika's article. Do we form biases and prejudices and stereotypes because it just seems like too much *work* to actually meet all kinds of people, in all kinds of occupations or from all kinds of backgrounds, and actually find out what they're actually like?

Onward.

Rich Coad's article on his movie posters sparked some other tangential thoughts. (Credit where credit is due.) Rather than B-movie posters, maybe I can print out fan posters and inspirational quotes from Discordian, fannish and heathen websites.

Onward.

Ian Sales' profile of Scandinavian fandom is very welcome, after receiving a long string of Ahrvid Engholm's apazines but, somehow, not acquiring a lot of context.

It was amusing to spot Ian Sales' mention of *Garth*, a British comic strip I have only seen in tangential references. One day I must find out what my name really means to Britons, if anything in particular. (Yes, I know the etymology already.)

It is interesting that Ian Sales' lactose intolerance disappeared some time after he moved to Sweden. I have heard a rumour that North Americans who suffer from gluten intolerance have no problem with wheat products from Europe. Reasoning by analogy, I have to wonder whether Swedish dairy products are processed differently than British dairy products.

Lee Wood's article started out sounding so much like Lyn McConchie's farm stories, I wondered at first if Ms. Wood was the same person under a pseudonym. I was soon disabused of that idea. 

Story Contest Rules and Entry Blank

(Jefferson Swycaffer)

Now and then, it has been suggested to open the N3F Amateur Short Story Contest to professional writers, writers who have had one or two sales. I've never favored this. It is my opinion that we want new blood. We want to reward the new kids on the block. To be blunt, we want writing that is not that good. We want stories from people who don't know their object from their subject, who don't know where commas go, and who use apostrophes to denote plurals – but who have a story to tell. I want stories from guys nobody's ever heard of ... but in the years ahead, we will. Those who are already successful don't need the encouragement of our little contest. If they were to enter the contest, the danger is that they'd win, every time, and crowd out the promising newcomer.

- 1. This contest is open to all amateur writers in the field, regardless of whether they're members of the National Fantasy Fan Federation. For the purposes of this contest, we define an amateur as someone who has sold no more than two (2) stories to professional science fiction or fantasy publications.
- 2. Stories entered in the contest must be original, unpublished, not longer than 8,500 words in length and related to the science fiction, fantasy, or similar genres in the opinion of the judge.
- 3. Email attachments of Word documents are acceptable for submission. Manuscripts on paper should be typed, single-sided, on 8½" by 11" white paper, double spaced, with pages numbered. The name of the author should not appear anywhere on the manuscript to ensure impartial judging. Photocopies are acceptable, if they are of good quality. Computer printouts must be legible.
- 4. Contestants can enter up to three stories. Enclose a Self-Addressed, Stamped Envelope (SASE)¹ if you would like your story returned at the end of the contest. Stories will not be returned without a SASE. <u>Do not</u> send your only copy in case of accidental loss. We are not responsible for lost manuscripts.
- 5. Email entries will be accepted. Send to Jefferson P. Swycaffer at abontides@gmail.com. No guarantee can be made of email receipt. Privacy and property rights will be absolutely respected. No one other than the Short Story Judge will ever see the submission.
- 6. There are no entry fees.

- 10. Stories will also be reviewed by the Editor of the N3F Fiction zine *Eldritch Science*; authors of suitable tales will be invited to submit their tales for publication in our zine.
