
## Out of the Bin

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#### CONVENTIONS: "CONTINUUM" REPORT


The first convention I attended was in Sydney, I think in 1954 but even after checking reports in the old MSFC magazine ETHERLINE I am unable to confirm if it was '54 or '53, 2<sup>nd</sup> or 3<sup>rd</sup> Natcons and it indicates how my memory has faded and my lack of keeping records of trips and such. Alas, con reports never indicated that I had attended. However it certainly is around fifty years since my first con.

I have a box full of con badges and a shelf of booklets and altogether I estimate I have averaged attending one almost every year, and more often in the 1970s and 1980s. So as well as being now in my 70<sup>th</sup> year it is my 52<sup>nd</sup> year in SF fandom and I reckon I have seen between thirty and forty conventions. I am sure many American fans could beat that by a mile, but I guess it is not a bad tally for an Aussie fan.

I have always said that meeting friends at cons is the best part of it, so when I have not been impressed by the programme, talking to other fans at the cons has made them all worthwhile. At CONTINUUM however, there were items, talks and panels that were of real interest and we also got to meet friends that we only see at conventions or otherwise infrequently. Many people from Melbourne fandom, the MSFC in particular, know me but I have a very bad memory for names, I always have had. Consequently many people say hello and I do not have a clue who they are or where they are from, so my apologies to you all. One fan I did want to say hello to was Edwina Harvey from Sydney, but I left it too late to get someone to point her out to me.

Anyway, it was great to see all the Melbourne fans from the MSFC, costumers Robert Jan and Gail Adams whom we have encountered in Star Trek and SF fandom, longtime friend and associate Robin Johnson from Tasmania and organiser of the 2005 Natcon, THYLACON; along with Marilyn Pride, Lewis Morley and Nick Stathopoulos, artists and model makers from Sydney, whom we have also known for quite a few years. These three fans were Guests of Honour of the convention, and it was great hearing them describe their careers and relate their experiences working for movie makers on such as Dark City, The Matrix movies and the upcoming Star Wars 3.

The con was sponsored by publishers Harper Collins and Random House and there was a whole group of Australian authors in attendance and a few book launchings. GoHs Kate Forsyth and Chris Lawson, whose book WRITTEN IN BLOOD was launched on the Saturday evening first up, along with Lucy Sussex, Trudi Canavan, Jennifer Fallon and others. There was a predominance of fantasy writers, emphasising the remarkable rise of fantasy literature writing and publishing in Australia, consequently much of the programme dealt with fantasy. But not all and as SF and media fans we found enough of interest. Organiser Danny Heap, who has a talent for putting together visual presentations for the opening of conventions, miraculously found time to do another good one for the start of the con on Friday evening. Panels and discussions included Miriam English giving a presentation on computer animation in Virtual Reality Fiction. The Mega Panel was a crazy goonish presentation that would have done credit to the infamous, now entirely gafiated fan Paul Stevens, who presented such affairs ("The Paul Stevens Show") back in the 1970s and 19780s. A little bit too crazy for me now, indicating that I must be getting old. We didn't see it all, as we had to leave to catch a train.







In fact Nick pointed out that some composers blatantly use whole phrases of classical pieces in their soundtracks. Many sound tracks in fact use similar orchestration and phrasing. It was great to know that somebody else shared my interest; movie music has been my passion for years.



The Art Panel


Continuum 5pm Saturday 12<sup>th</sup> July 2003
