



were pleased to be told recently that copies were being sold at the remainder book fair for only \$7.00 and we are very pleased at last to have a copy to read and to see our photos in print.



Early in April we saw HIDALGO, starring Viggo Mortensen after his stint as Aragorn in The Lord of the Rings. It was loosely based on a character said to have performed in Buffalo Bill's Wild West shows in the late 19th century and featured him competing in a horse race in Arabia. It was quite entertaining, though the claim that it is 'based on a true story' turns out to be shaky indeed. ('Pony Baloney' was the heading of one among numerous scathing articles on the subject found on the Internet.) This differently placed Western was nicely filmed, though, and had some spectacular scenery, even if it was not actually filmed where the story was set. It was great to see Omar Sharif as the Arab chieftain and it reminded us of his role in Lawrence of Arabia. It will appeal to horse lovers, with the hero's pinto pony Hidalgo a real scene stealer, along with his efforts to save the wild mustangs used by the American Indians. The mistreatment of the Indians, in particular at Wounded Knee, as depicted also in The Last Samurai and Dances With Wolves, was a significant part of the plot.

I did see THE HAUNTED MANSION, the Disney production which was obviously aimed at kids, but had some quite adult angles to it. Then what could you expect from Eddie Murphy, but Terence Stamp as the butler ghost was great and certainly did look like death warmed up. The witch in the glass ball was also great, but the mansion itself was the real star of the show. It almost deserved an Oscar for set design. Over all a bit silly and it obviously pinched ideas from various other movies featuring ghosts in haunted houses.

Well, we have certainly seen a host of movies in March and April 2004, but obviously our normal finances will not allow this to happen again for a while, so we will have to be more careful in deciding



on what to see from now on. There will be a few movies I/we will particularly want to see over the next few weeks and I hope to mention them all herein. We still don't know why March seems to be the choice for the big movie chains to make their special offers, but it was the same last year - all of the cut-price deals came in March, coinciding with the special offers during Seniors week, with nothing else throughout the rest of the year.
