Dear gang--I bet you didn't know the Tape Bureau was headed by a Lady Rat! I have been called that recently, by a 'lady'. I went to Multicon (late in June) knowing I was taking a chance, and I lost. I was called at 1:30 am and told to report in for work at 7 am. I didn't quite make it by seven, but I did get back to Freeport that morning (and it is expensive to travel in a hurry). I had a good time at Multicon, and met Tim Holt and Lum & Abner, I didn't tape either talk, but saverappeople there did.

The unions at Dow went out on strike on June 24, and they are still out as of today. At first I was working 12 hours a day, 7 days a week, but as the 'm emergency work force' learned its job our work day has shortened. I am now working 10 hours a day 5 days a week, in the Glycerine Control Lab. Each shipment of glycerine out of the plant has to have my personal seal of approval. It give you making and the a feeling of power. After all, they fill a ship with a million and a half pounds of glycerine, and if I say the quality isn't up to par they would have to unload the shipmaxama and try again.

The 'women of the workers' have been demonstrating at the gates of the plants and they have been mattank shouting at us poor working people as we wan cross the picket line, and occasionally they even climb on cars, and get violent. A thrill kinnakank twice a day is what we have when we cross the picket lines. For awhile, the unions were claiming that the Dow people were trying to run khum down the pickets with their ar cars (and, after all, if a man jumps out in front of a moving veichle, he is likely to get hit), and Dow people have had windshilds broken in with pitatax picket signs. But Dow has been treating us well--we are well paid--the withholdings on my first strike check was larger than my regular take-home pay. I don't get as much now since It I'm not working as many hours a week, but it is still worth doing fur for.

The unions and Dow have been k kwk talking for all week, which is really the first time they have gotten together for more than 30 min since the strike started. And it does look like the strike will be over in a couple of weeks (after Labor Day at the earliest, tho). And I do hope so. It is tearing up the community. That is one bad thing about living in a company town.

I have not been doing any taping since withe strike started--z and this is the first time I have had the chance to get Replay out too. Not satisfied with working long hours, my ceiling decided to fall down

(and I do all my typing and taping in the living room, where the ceiling was drooping) and I had to have it replaced—which really disrupted things. And then I got the flu which ruined another week, I'm fine now, and I hope to get started on taping soon. I will be doing complete reels

first, then cassettes, and then I will do the tailor made reels. There is nothing like a three month (it seemslonger) k break to really get behind, I will get the tapes out as soon as I can, and a suppliment to the catalog too.

A clipping from the Library Journal: Cassettes can be expected to eventually replace phonodiscs in libraries, says R Noel Ryan of Ontario. Cassettes though presently more expensive keep their quality thru innumeral playgins, are light and easy to handle, can be used on library playing units even by children with no staff super vision.

A Ryan found two problems in a circulating tape collection experiment: pilferage and mangling of the tape due to minor imperfections in the plastic housing which can jam the spindles. Byan avoids the jamming by running all new cassettes tapes at high speed back and fauxth forth k a few times in the library's big machine.
