


## A Look At The Past: The Fanscient #7, 1949

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#### SilverConned Highlights of the Con

Approximately 60 fans gathered at the Katz for Thursday afternoon and evening's kickoff party. The convention itself was housed in the Mardi Gras Inn. Sadly, the hotel fertilized the Courtyard lawn the day before Silvercon, wreaking havoc with the outdoor events planned, and causing Tucker to nickname this "The Manure Con". But the stench didn't stop the fun.

Fans took excursions around the city to see the sights and try their luck at the tables. There were a few winners, and apparently no one lost too much.

Hooper's play starred a bevy of fans, and the performance was judged quite entertaining. Thanks, Andy, for doing this.

Bob Tucker was available for fine discussions of fan history, and able to answer some of the Mysteries of the Ages, with a first-hand description of Al Ashley, the straight skinny about the Chicago Science Fiction League, and inside info about fandom's past.

Joe Haldeman similarly made himself available to the fans, ready to discuss everything from VietNam to serious science fiction, to the future of fans in the age of giant conventions.

It was a tough con for the committee; too much to do, and not enough helping hands. But for the attendees, it was a jolly event, filled with fine fans, good cheer, and lots of cameraderie.
