# **Proposed Constitutional Amendment**

John Bangsund proposes: (a) That the words 'and not more than seven' be deleted from the third sentence of section 4, that sentence then to read 'The committee shall consist of at least five persons, who must be financial full members of the society.' (b) That the following sentence be altered to read 'The president shall be elected as such; the committee shall either be elected as a whole, and subsequently allocate among its members the offices of secretary, treasurer, speaker secretary, newsletter editor and such other offices as are thought desirable, or elected individually to specific offices.' (c) That a new section be added to the constitution, to read '9. Publication of constitution This constitution, as last amended, shall be published each year in the society's newsletter.'

#### MEMBERSHIP FEES

Membership in the society is open to any person actively engaged in editing or publishing; associate membership is open to any person interested in the society's activities.

### TUNES FOR THE 'TITANIC'

Or: The Profession of Editing and the Business of Publishing in Australia

At the May meeting of the Society of Editors
Richard Walsh, Chief Executive and Publisher,
Angus & Robertson Publishers, described the
Australian publishing industry as 'an intellectual
tent city'. Thirty-five people turned up at the
Osteria ar Dente to hear all about it.
Richard's subject was 'The Politics of

Richard's subject was 'The Politics of Publishing', and as background to his argument he outlined the history of Australian publishing, which he said falls into three distinct periods.

The first period was that of 'supreme national confidence', the 1880s and 1890s, during which the firm of Angus & Robertson was founded. In the second period, which lasted until the early 1970s, there was little confidence or interest in Australian publishing and writing, and most serious writers, from Miles Franklin on, were published overseas. Those few writers such as Vance and Nettie Palmer who did publish in Australia between about 1900 and 1970 were largely ignored by the reading public and had to battle to find local publishers for their work. Modern publishing had begun to develop here during this time, but it was a 'grace and favour' situation, with British and American firms setting up local offices more as 'shop windows' than as serious publishing operations.

A new nationalism began to emerge in the early 1970s, and independent Australian firms

developed and flourished in this climate. But as a result of its earlier history, Australian publishing had acquired two major characteristics: local publishing programs had a supplementary rather than a competitive role in relation to imported products (no significant commercial fiction program has emerged in Australia, for instance, because of this competition), and the Australian Book Publishers Association has been dominated by overseas-owned companies.

Friction developed between Australian and overseas-owned firms in the early 1970s. The local companies broke away and formed the Australian Independent Publishers Association in 1975 (the name was changed to Independent Publishers of Australia in 1976, and the organization has since disbanded); at that time the ABPA gave no support to Australian Book Week, nor to the notion of Australia-only rights in territorial copyright clauses. Until very recently the ABPA has been reluctant to gather statistics on local publishing, and still goes about it slowly.

The present-day effects of this background are, first, that Australian publishers are to a large extent distribution houses rather than strong and active publishers of local work; second, because publishing here is such a fringe activity, that there is a great discontinuity in people, in programs and in the orig-

ination of books.

The editorial function is not at the heart of the publishing industry here as it is in overseas publishing. The emphasis here is on marketing, sales and distribution, rather than on origination and development; management regards the editorial department as something that can be 'turned on and off like a tap'. This leads to great instability and high turnover of editorial staff, and means also that publishing is struggling to maintain quality in top management.

Thus Richard's comment that Australian publishing is an 'intellectual tent city' - an activity undertaken by a nomadic tribe of peripheral people: 'literature on wheels'.

The task of developing strong local management is made harder by the 'remittance men sent out by overseas companies to manage their colonial outposts'. These people make the major publishing decisions, and thus local publishing becomes derivative, lacking force and character.

This situation has a bad effect on authors, too. Because sales and distribution are overvalued in relation to editorial departments, many authors think that publishing decisions are made by people who are not sensitive to the creative process. On the other hand, some authors are over-indulged, with payments out

of proportion to overseas standards.

Authors in Australia tend to be more hostile to publishers than those in most other countries. They are usually ignorant of the editorial and publishing processes. They see no reason to be loyal to local editors and publishers, to the idea of entrusting their work to people with their own cultural background. And the Australian Society of Authors, in promoting self-publishing, seems to believe that editors are dispensable.

The effects of all this on editors are

depressing. Editors are seen as a disposable part of the publishing process. They are let go when the company is in difficulty, and rehired when the crisis is over. Because of this, half of our most capable editors are freelancers -'literary taxi-drivers'.

Because the editorial function is treated as peripheral, editors are very rarely given the opportunity to understand the total business of publishing. This leads to lack of job satisfaction, and very few editors get the experience necessary to become managers, thus perpetuating the domination of the industry by salesmen and

accountants.

Editors are poorly trained for their work. Perhaps they learn the minutiae of the job, but they are not trained in shaping the book for the market, in the creative aspects of the work. The publishing industry itself, Richard said, is guilty in not providing this training. And because so few people are experienced in the originating and creative side of editing, the product lacks originality and diversity.

So what was the message for us, as a Society of Editors, in all this?

Richard emphasized that he did not mean there was no place for overseas books in Australia; nor did he mean to suggest that there is anything wrong with working for an overseas firm. But, he said, the Society of Editors, as an organization, should be more aware of the situation of Australian publishing, and more concerned with the issues. The possibility of continuing our working lives as editors is tied up with the health of the industry, and many of us have no other way of earning a living.

Australian publishers must keep on publishing good Australian books. The Society of Editors should display its concern for the industry on a formal level. We should be a watchdog on the activities of the ABPA, which is not concerned with the state of the art of editing, publishing or originating books in Australia. Perhaps we should consider forming a national body, Richard suggested. Government shows no concern for publishing either. So if we care about where we and Australian publishing are going, it is up to us to do something. We must, said Richard, move our arses.

Richard's address was followed by a lively question-time, after which we settled down to some more 'planning tunes for the orchestra on the Titanic', as Richard described our social activities. The meeting enthusiastically supported a vote of thanks to the proprietors and staff of the Osteria, which some of us leave with sorrow, for a year of fine food, good service, hospitality and patience. And it was generally agreed that Richard's talk had been neither too long nor too serious, as he had suggested in his introduction, nor had he lost any friends as a result. Thanks, Richard, for an excellent evening.

They are the rates agreed to by publishers' and editors' representatives in Sydney and Melbourne, and have still to be agreed to by the Conciliation and Arbitration Commission. My apologies to Sir John Moore and everyone else concerned. As a 'literary taxi-driver' who earns less than the lowest of those figures I may perhaps be forgiven for not knowing the score exactly. As secretary of the local AJA Book Editors Group I will be less readily forgiven. Anyone want a job?

WHAT SHOULD FREELANCE EDITORS CHARGE? is the question I am asked most often by editors and publishers alike. In the next issue of the newsletter I will go into this matter fairly thoroughly. For the moment you may care to know that, on my calculations, to match the top three salaries quoted above (I assume that freelancing is an undesirable form of training for editors without experience) freelance editors should be charging at least \$20.16, \$16.98 and \$14.79 per hour. Publishers in Melbourne are beginning to agree to \$15.00 per hour for competent freelance editors, which is a good deal more than most of us are used to but still a long way short of what the same

publishers pay for their in-house editors.

Hang on! (I hear you say) \$15 an hour is about \$600 a week - \$31 200 a year! And you did that without a calculator: congratulations. But I wasn't talking about what editors are paid. I was talking about what publishers pay for their editors.

Anyway, the full story next month.

# THE CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY OF EDITORS As amended at the Annual General Meeting 1982

The name of the society shall be The Society of Editors.

2. Objects

The objects of the society shall be:

- to promote contacts between its members;
- to promote the exchange of ideas and dissemination of information on matters of professional interest;

to assist in establishing and maintaining c.

high standards of editing;

to establish and maintain liaison with other d. organizations in all matters affecting editors

Membership

Full membership shall be open to those who are engaged in editing or publishing. Associate membership shall be open to any interested person. Associate members shall not have the right to vote or to take office in the society. Membership is at all times at the discretion of the committee, and shall become operative on payment of the appropriate subscription.

New members joining the society after 1 January shall be eligible for full membership rights on payment of half the prescribed

fee for that year.

Members whose subscriptions are one year in arrears shall be deemed to have resigned.

Members living outside a 50 km radius of the GPO, Melbourne, shall be entitled to a discount on their subscription at the discretion of the committee.

Subscriptions shall be payable in advance and fall due on 1 July.

The business of the society shall be carried on by a committee elected by a simple majority at an Annual General Meeting. The quorum for such a meeting shall be ten.

The committee shall consist of at least five and not more than seven persons, who must be financial full members of the society.

The president shall be elected as such. The committee shall distribute among themselves the following offices: treasurer, secretary, speaker secretary, newsletter editor, freelance register editor, training

Nominations for offices and elections shall be held at the Annual General Meeting.

The committee may co-opt additional members as necessary.

A simple majority of the committee shall constitute a quorum for committee meetings.

Casual vacancies in any of the offices shall be filled by invitation of the committee and the persons filling such vacancies shall hold office until the following Annual General Meeting.

Distribution of funds

The society is not carried on for the purpose of profit or gain of its individual members and the income and property of the society wheresoever derived shall be applied solely

towards the promotion of the objects of the society as set forth in the constitution document; and no portion thereof shall be paid or transferred directly or indirectly as dividends, bonuses or otherwise howsoever by way of profit to any past or present member of the society, provided that nothing herein shall prevent the payment in good faith of remuneration to any officer or servant of the society or to any member of the society in return for any service actually rendered to the society.

If upon winding up or dissolution of the society there remains after the satisfaction of all debts and liabilities any property whatsoever, the same shall not be paid to or distributed among members of the society, but shall be given or transferred to some other fund, authority or institution having objects similar to this society and which shall prohibit distribution of its or their income and property among its or their members.

Amendments

This constitution may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the full members present at any Annual General Meeting, provided that such proposed amendment has been submitted to the committee and that a copy of the proposed amendment shall have been mailed to each member of the society at least ten days before the meeting at which it is to be considered.

7. Meetings

General meetings The society shall hold general meetings, including the Annual General Meeting, up to ten times a year.

Special meetings Special meetings shall be called on fourteen days notice on the decision of the committee or at the written request of at least ten members.

c. Annual General Meeting The Annual General Meeting shall be held not later than the last day of June. The notice calling the Annual General Meeting shall be sent to all members not later than ten days prior to the date of the Annual General Meeting.

Quorum

A quorum for general, special and Annual General Meetings shall be ten.

- A bank account shall be opened in the name of the society. Cheques shall be signed by any two of the following: president, treasurer and secretary
- b. The financial year shall end on 30 June. C. A balance sheet shall be presented to the

Annual General Meeting.
